Town offers free tax clinic for area residents who need

Edson and area residents still have until the end of April to take advantage of the free tax clinic offered by the Town of Edson.

From March 1 to May 1, Edson Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) in partnership with Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) are offering the service free for those who need it.

"While it's FCSS employees that facilitate the program, we have five very dedicated and invaluable volunteers that share the responsibility of working in the clinic," said Lexi Abbott, Community Development Coordinator with the Town of Edson.

Each year the clinic helps over 500 people complete their tax returns. "We offer people of Edson and surrounding area an opportunity to get their taxes done for free, if they fit the criteria. As long as they bring all of their information, everything is completed on site," said Abbot. "Clients will complete an intake

sheet with one of our volunteers and we will enter the client's information into the electronic filing system. Once we're done, we will print out confirmation that it has been filed, place it in an envelope with all of the clients other information, and send it home with them. Then they're all done until next year."

The clinic only handles simple tax returns. They are not able to file taxes for people with business income, capital gains, depreciation, or death returns. There are also income thresholds that are dependent on family size. 1 person income \$35,000 or less; 2 person income \$45,000 or less; 3 person income is \$47,500 or less; 4 person income is \$50,000 or less; 5 person income is \$52,500 or less and increases by \$2,500 per individual per family thereafter.

All who want to use the service can prepare by checking their previous year's tax return to be sure they will be bringing the correct paperwork. Then they need to compile their donation and medical receipts.

Appointments, drop-ins, and drop-offs can be done Monday through Wednesday from 9am to 2:30pm, closing at 3pm, and Thursdays from 11am till 6:30pm, closing at 7pm. You can also call 780-723-0872 or email edsoncvitp@gmail.com to book an appointment.

County to pave lot adjacent to Administration building

In an effort to improve safety, beautification, and functionality, Council approved full asphalt paving beside the County's Administration building in Edson. This will provide additional parking spaces and improve safety and convenience for visitors and County staff. The project has an estimated cost of \$380,000.

Parking lot pavement options for the vacant space between the administration building and Yellowhead County operations center building was presented to the Council on February 21, 2023, for review and discussions. Based on the Council directions County Administration revised the plan.

"The revised safety, beautification, and functionality plan which entails aesthetically pleasing parking space, pedestrian safety initiatives and environment friendly landscaping, while ensuring safety and convenience for visitors and the county staff," stated Sabhago Oad, General Manager of Infrastructure and Planning Services with the County, during the April 11 Council meeting.

Paving the parking area will also mitigate soil pollution from the vehicles, add value to the area, and improve functionality. The plan will include dual row parking on west side of the Administration building which will provide 40 additional parking spaces, pedestrian walkway connectivity, a concrete median on

Redesign underway for Victim Services

Colleen Talpash, Program Manager with the Edson and District Victim Services, stated recently that some changes have been announced.

"In July 2022 there was an announcement regarding a redesign of Victim Services undertaken by the Alberta government, due to be implemented on April 1, 2024. Rural Victim Services Units (VSU) will no longer be run by boards within their own communities. The new model will have a regional approach, dividing the province into four quadrants," says Talpash.

"Each area will have its own board overseeing the region, each region will have a centralized management staff, and there will be caseworkers working out of RCMP detachments," Talpash says. "Our highly valued volunteers will continue to have a major role in the redesign."

"The participation of volunteers in Victim Services is crucial to provide the level of services needed. Services to victims of crime will not change," Talpash emphasizes.

"In conjunction with the redesign announcement, the

financial benefits program has been greatly enhanced and is now called the Victim Assistance Program (VAP). This will provide better financial assistance to victims of crime including counselling, medical expenses, protective measures, and emergency assistance, "Talpash adds.



WE NEED YOUR EXPERTISE

Members are needed for the Inter-Municipal Assessment Review Board. Members of the Board must be 18 years of age or older and be current residents of Edson.

In accordance with the Matters Relating to Assessment Complaints Alberta Regualtion 210/2017, assessors, tax agents and employees of the Town of Edson are ineligible to be members of an assessment review board.

All eligible citizens may apply, however preference will be given to citizens with a background in:

- Real Estate
- Property Management
- Property Appraisal
- Assessment

• Law

In addition, experience with a quasi-judicial board or administrative tribunal is considered an asset. Individuals with good analytical skills, the ability to be fair and open minded, and a capacity to work collaboratively with the general Chair and other Board members will be beneficial.

Board members are responsible for issuing decisions on disputes relative to property assessment. They may be required to issue decisions for the Town of Edson and the surrounding municipalities of Hinton and Jasper . The Town of Edson will organize and schedule the mandatory training sessions from Municipal Affairs. Being a member provides the opportunity to network with like minded individuals within the region. Some travel may be required. The number of hearings held for the region will vary on an annual basis.

Letter to the Editor

Writer concerned overuse of road salt causing deterioration of Hwy16

I am a business owner whose storefront is on Hwy 16 west through Edson, and my family has been doing business here since 1987. My desk is adjacent to the front window, so I am very familiar with the condition of the highway, traffic habits, and maintenance that takes place year round.

I do believe that I know why the condition of the highway has rapidly deteriorated in the recent years, and I have been collecting data on this for quite some time. In all the years that we have been located on Hwy 16 it seems that year after year the amount of salt being used for winter ice control on the hwy increases.

When my brother used to clean the snow bank away from the front of the store 20 years ago, it was white and fluffy, now it is a horrid mess of brown slop. The purpose of the salt is to raise the melting point of the snow and ice, something that seems useful, but they don't realize all of the down sides to this.

When the salt melts the snow into water during the warmer temperatures of the day, it then freezes at night, splitting apart the small pours and cracks of the asphalt road surface breaking it away, exponentially creaking these massive pot holes and cracks we see today.

This melt and freeze scenario without the excessive use of salt would only happen in the spring time, but instead is happening every single day all throughout the winter. I have documented the highway maintenance company spreading

this material upwards of a dozen times a day on the hwy through Edson, even during periods where it hasn't snowed in weeks.

This can be seen right now in spring time with the accumulation of sand in the shoulders of the highway, in some places 2" deep. On top of this non necessary damage to the road surface, it is also creating environmental and public health concerns.


Often out front of my store I have been able to taste the salt in the air. and I have taken multiple water samples of run off, with test results indicating that the water would be harmful to anything that ingests it, including children, pets, and wildlife.

The salt mist from the highway is causing visible rust and corrosion to adjacent infrastructure, the sign structure and downspout screws are rusting on my building. The grout of the tiles on my showroom floor has become permanently stained from the mixture tracking in on customers footwear. The sand/salt mixture plugs our storm drains, and eating up tax dollars both in the cost of the material itself and the cost of cleaning it up.

The cost both direct and indirect to taxpayers for this de-icing program is much higher than anyone realizes, and the Government of Canada's policy on use of road salts is based off information from 1999.

Yellowhead County Development Permits are also posted online at www.yhcounty.ca. The public is considered officially notified of approved development permits once posted online, in accordance with the Public Notification Bylaw.

The Yellowhead County Land Use Bylaw NO 09.21 provides that any person claiming to be affected by a decision of the Development Authority may appeal to the **Subdivision and Development Appeal Board or Alberta's Land and Property Rights Tribunal** dependent on jurisdiction of the appeal authority. Appeals under the jurisdiction of Yellowhead County's Subdivision and Development Appeal Board require a written notice of appeal and a payment of \$300.00 payable to Yellowhead County within 21 day of the publishing of the Notice of Decision. 

Trends that will shape the grocery industry in 2023

"In 2023, the lingering impact of inflation, the growth of online shopping and the full return of the store shopping experience, will have a significant impact on shaping the grocery industry," says Jeewani Fernando, provincial consumer market analyst with the Alberta government.

"In 2020 and 2021, health and safety concerns driven by the global pandemic upended the grocery industry. In 2022, the health crisis took a back seat to soaring inflation and prolonged period of supply chain disruptions. While inflation continues to impact consumers, plenty of other trends in the grocery industry may emerge in 2023.

The latest 'Trends in retail', which contains items that analyze developments in the grocery sector, looks at some of these trends in more detail. The trends that this analysis looked at were:

- impact of inflation on consumer behavourial changes and some grocers' actions (increasingly introduced private label products, shrinkflation and price freeze on selected products)
- growth of online shopping/e-commerce and

delivery in the grocery sector

- full return of in-person grocery shopping Grocery price changes are highly important to consumers since they shop so frequently. Combined with the fact that food is one of the most inflationary consumer categories, shoppers are aware of rising prices and are adapting to this new reality. At the same time, grocers have responded in various ways to these changes in consumer behaviour.

"The impact of e-commerce is becoming clearer," says Fernando. "Rather than replacing grocery store visits, online shopping will supplement in-person shopping. Grocers that integrate the online shopping experience will likely resonate best with grocery shoppers." E-commerce and online grocery purchases were growing in Canada pre-COVID, and this growth accelerated during the pandemic as consumers were restricted to their homes.

"Canadians are once again shopping in-person more often rather than stocking up and limiting their trips. This highlights one of the fundamentals of the industry: in-person shopping is not going to disappear. As the industry is built upon habitual and frequent shoppers, the grocers that have the most effective value, quality and convenience offerings will thrive in any environment."

While grocery retailing is built on fundamentals such as value, quality, convenience and in-person shopping, there are opportunities to differentiate. Specifically, when competing retailers offer similar service, local sourcing can be a way to stand out. Grocers are also using many innovative ways to stay competitive. These include updating their fresh departments and centre store aisles, updating their in-store dining options and introducing new technology like ordering kiosks, smart carts and app-friendly functions. "Grocers are also investing heavily in new ways of doing business to retain shoppers, grow their business, and help protect their margins," says Fernando. "New technological innovations are paving the way for a new customer experience, where shoppers can use mobile apps and internetenabled devices to take advantage of promotions and a more convenient experience." 




