### **Newspaper Exclusive YCFD members excel during 2022 FireFit Championships**

(YC) Throughout the 2022 FireFit fitness and real-world skills. season, Yellowhead County firefighters competed in several events and made the Yellowhead County Fire Department proud.

Yellowhead County, AB (December 5, 2022) - With the conclusion of the 2022 season of the FireFit Championships, two of Yellowhead County's firefighters took a moment to reflect on this year's achievements. Andrew Kencis and Tristan Meade participated in the events, which are designed to test a firefighter's skills and endurance. They competed in regional events in Edson and Calgary, and in the Canadian and World Championships.

Andrew has been a FireFit competitor for more than 10 years, and has the greatest respect for the sport. "It keeps us focused on maintaining the high level of fitness required in our profession," he says. "One has to remember that we have to perform sometimes extremely strenuous tasks in all sorts of environments and conditions." This was Tristan's first FireFit season ever. "This is gonna be easy!" he thought. "[But] it was immediately apparent how wrong I was," he laughs.

FireFit competitions are based on common tasks that firefighters must perform in emergency situations. Firefighters wear full protective equipment while completing several tasks, including climbing six flights of stairs with a 42-pound fire hose, simulating a forced entry, and carrying a dummy weighing 175 pounds for 100 feet. Billed as the "toughest two minutes in sports," FireFit is a challenging test of

Walk Grow Lead

At the Edson regional, Tristan was the first-place rookie, completing the course in under two minutes on his first run ever, with a final time of 1:57.00. He and Andrew also competed in the two-person technical relay, winning bronze.

In the Canadian and World Championships, Tristan competed against his friend and fellow rookie Joseph Dostaler in a close race that saw him achieving an impressive time of 1:37.17, but losing to Joseph by just one hundredth of a second. The neck-and-neck race was one of the highlights of the championship. His relay team in the men's hybrid open won silver.

Andrew won silver for his individual run in the men's over-60 category. His over-60 relay team won gold, setting a new world record with a time of 1:41.89. Tristan and Andrew also competed in the two-person technical relay, and improvised a new technique that allowed them to shave precious seconds off their finish time. The technique was noticed by other firefighters, who have introduced it to their teams both in North America and Europe.

In October, Andrew travelled to Utah for the International Firefighter Challenge, where firefighters from over 14 countries gathered to compete. Andrew won bronze with a firefighter from Slovenia in the over-60 tandem event, and then won silver with his four-person team in the over-60 relay event.

### Town joins effort to improve regional rail service

During the Edson Town Council meeting on December 6, Alberta Forest Products Association (AFPA) representatives Brock Mulligan, Senior Vice President and Natalie Peace, General Manager of Weyerhaeuser raised concerns regarding the impact of diminished rail capacity.

In response to an increased number of circumstances whereby the rail system, owned by Canadian Pacific and Canadian National, has been unreliable or failed to meet service obligations, the AFPA states, it is approaching affected municipalities to highlight the issue and lobby all levels of government for support.

The group contends that, "poor railway service is having a negative impact on communities throughout rural Alberta. Our most important industries, including energy, agriculture, and forestry, are suffering from unreliable service. This undermines competitiveness, tarnishes our reputation as a reliable supplier, and harms local jobs. While Canada's railway duopoly continues to make record profits, they are failing to invest those profits back into the people and infrastructure to fulfill their service obligations."

Rail capacity issues can have a direct and adverse effect on Edson's economy

Together with local municipal partners, AFPA's plan is to lobby at the federal and provincial levels, and with railways themselves, for better service. "We are seeking both advocacy and financial support from our municipal partners to execute the strategy and stand up for our communities and industries."

Led by Mayor Jackie Clayton of Grande Prairie, the coalition seeks to include a diverse group of representatives from municipalities and industry. Already 8 different communities have agreed to be a part of the delegation. This number includes towns such as, Whitecourt, High Level, and Slave Lake, and counties such as Northern Lights County and Northern Sunrise County. Mayor Zahara has been working with representatives from other municipalities and industry to discuss railway service in Alberta over the past few weeks.

The AFPA asked the Town for \$2000 towards the coalition for the implementation of the advocacy plan compiled by Canadian Strategy Group. The budget from CSG to execute the strategy is \$35,000 over 4 months. Potential travel expenses for participation in a delegation to Ottawa is estimated at approximately \$1,300 (assuming two nights accommodation).

Councillor Ed Moore began the open discussion by asking, "How long has this problem been around and what do you think are some solutions to it?"

Peace answered by saying that the issues are usually seasonal, happening more often in the winter and that they have existed since she came to Edson in 2018. "As for solutions, I think we really need to lobby and work with the rail services and make sure they understand our needs. And then, how do we prioritize the forestry sector when they're planning and reach out to



them for solutions as well."

"It's a problem every winter," said Mulligan, also in answer to the question. "One of our asks for railway is going to be that they need to figure out how to deal with this because it's not like winter is a surprise phenomena. The service is consistently poor during those months. So this is a big part of the ask —for them to make the proper investment in people and infrastructure to make sure the service is delivered in the months we need it the most."

"You mentioned eight communities that signed on in favour. Have any communities not, or been hesitant, or haven't gotten back to you?" asked Councillor Peter Taylor.

"There are a handful of communities that we don't have confirmation from," answered Mulligan. While no specific names were given, the call went out to most of northern Alberta and they are waiting for all responses.

"Regarding lobbying the federal government," said Councillor Krystal Baier, "have you had any successes with them so far?"

"Our conversation as AFPA with the federal government are in their early stages," replied Mulligan. "We're planning, as part of this lobbying effort, to have more in-depth conversations. The recommendations are there, and now it's time to put some resources and actions in place to help them stick."

Mulligan and Peace ending the open question time by thanking Mayor Zahara and the Council for being supporters of the process. "That support means a lot to people all over our industry," said Mulligan.

Following the presentation council put forward three different motions relating to the matter presented.

First, that Council contributes \$2000 to the Alberta Railway Advocacy Coalition. That Council appoint Mayor Kevin Zahara to the Alberta Railway Advocacy Coalition. And that Council approve Mayor Kevin Zahara's participation, along with associated expenses, in an Alberta Railway Advocacy Coalition delegation to meet with government officials in Ottawa to further the Coalition's advocacy efforts, if required.

Councillor Gean Chouinard asked, "Since this is federally funded, with CN, have we brought this to the attention of our local MP?" Mayor Zahara replied by saying that doing so is a part of the whole strategy.

All three motions were then carried unanimously by council.

During the discussion on the first of the three motions Councillor Baier presented the idea that the issue should also be presented to Alberta Municipalities. "Maybe this is something they could advocate for us as well." The idea was supported by the rest of council. This led to the creation of a motion that council direct administration to bring back a draft resolution for Alberta Railway Advocacy Coalition to be considered at the 2023 association convention. This motion was also carried unanimously.





AHS defines domestic violence as the abuse of power within relationships of family that endangers the survival, security or well-being of another person. It's important to remember that abuse isn't just physical, but can also be verbal or emotional.

While it is difficult to find any reliable, national study linking the holidays with an increase in domestic violence, this violence

### New program to improve access to hip surgeries in region

(AHS) HINTON – Northern Albertans now have increased access to hip surgery with the opening of a new surgical program at Hinton Healthcare Centre.

An orthopedic surgeon is visiting the Alberta Health Services (AHS) site for four days per month doing hip surgeries and eventually knee surgeries. Hinton becomes the fourth site in the AHS North Zone providing hip surgeries, joining Grande Prairie, Westlock and Bonnyville.

"The Alberta Surgical Initiative opened the door for this kind of surgery to be done in Hinton," says Minister of Health Jason Copping. "Albertans across the province say reducing surgical wait-times is among their top priorities for their health system and, through programs like this and other strategies, we are working toward ensuring all Albertans, regardless of where they live, get their surgeries within clinically appropriate wait-times."

"This is a great example of innovation that provides more options for patients," adds Martin Long, West Yellowhead MLA. "Our government is committed to strengthening our publicly funded health system and reducing surgical waittimes, and new approaches like this will help deliver on that promise."

The program launched last month and, by early next year, local surgical teams expect to perform up to 16 orthopedic surgeries every month.

"We are really excited," says Crystal Browne, AHS Director of Clinical Operations for Hinton and area. "Our team in Hinton has done a great job in launching this program; it's just a great success story all around.'

Hinton partnered with Grande Prairie Regional Hospital to identify the first four patients on the wait-list who were willing to travel to another hospital for their surgeries.

Denise Cook became the program's first patient when she opted to have hip replacement surgery in Hinton rather than in Grande Prairie, where she lives.

"I was impressed with how all the departments in Grande Prairie and Hinton worked together," Cook says. "Everyone from physio to the bone clinic here in Grande Prairie, the surgeon's office, the hospital in Hinton telling me what to expect. They had everything arranged for me to get the equipment I needed at home. It all happened quickly. I was thoroughly impressed.'

Cook's surgery was done on a Monday morning and, by Tuesday at noon, she was discharged and on her way home to Grande Prairie, where she is now recovering.

"It was a remarkable experience," Cook says. "I really want to give a huge shoutout to the staff at the Hinton hospital. They were all amazing. I'm a cancer survivor, so I've had experience in the hospital and that care was great, and this was unbelievably amazing, too."

"We are a very strong surgical site, and that echoes out into other areas of care in the hospital," adds Alana Larson, assistant head nurse for the operating room at Hinton Healthcare Centre.

In 2019, AHS and Alberta Health began developing the Alberta Surgical Initiative (ASI), a plan focused on reducing surgical wait-times for Albertans. Through the strategies under the ASI, AHS continues to increase surgical activity in the province to get Albertans the surgical care they need within clinically recommended wait times.

Alberta Health Services is the provincial health authority responsible for planning and delivering health supports and services for more than four million adults and children living in Alberta. Its mission is to provide a patient-focused, quality health system that is accessible and sustainable for all Albertans.



### **County's OHV Bylaw receives updates**

### **Changes to Yellowhead** County's Off-Highway Vehicle Bylaw (Bylaw 18.22) recently received approval by County Council.

(Dec. 5, 2022) - Yellowhead County's Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) Bylaw defines where OHV users can and cannot use any type of offhighway vehicles within Yellowhead County, including municipal highways.

Following a review of the previous bylaw, it was clear that OHV use in hamlets and on County roads is done in a very responsible manner. However, that bylaw only allowed travel from a residence to a trail head and didn't allow for operation throughout the hamlet for extended periods or on a regular basis. This resulted in

daily violations of the bylaw.

The changes in the new bylaw allow operation of OHVs in hamlets and on County roadways on a regular basis, but in a safe and controlled manner to include proper operation in County ditches.

On November 22nd, Off-Highway Vehicle Bylaw 18.22 received all three readings from Yellowhead County Council and is now in effect. Major changes include:

- OHVs are no longer restricted on which highway routes are used within hamlets (for example: using the most direct route to a residence when either entering or exiting the hamlet).

- Rules for OHV operation on municipal highways have been made clearer: In hamlets, OHVs must be operated in the parking lane or far right-hand side of the roadway.

- Outside of a hamlet, OHVs may be operated on the right-hand side of the roadway or they may be used in the municipal highway ditch if: It is safe to do so.

- The ditch isn't in a condition where damage to the highway is likely to occur

- It isn't prohibited by signage.

- Operators travel single file and in the direction of travel required for that side of the highway.

- The OHV stops before crossing intersecting roads, which includes driveways and approaches. Other rules remain the same as the previous bylaw.

This includes:

- Compliance with the Traffic Safety Act, its regulations, and other applicable provincial legislation.

- Use of OHVs in hamlets during the hours of 11 PM to 8 AM is prohibited.

OHV speed limits remain 30 km/hr in a hamlet and 50 km/hr outside of a hamlet.

- OHV usage in parks, playgrounds, and school yards is prohibited.

- OHV users must operate in single file in the direction of travel required for all vehicle users.




