leasing buildings is outside of AHS' mandate. According to AHS, the operating costs are approximately \$210,000 annually. Additionally, Town Administration advised, "There are millions of dollars of deferred maintenance relating to this building, along with some old/failing internal infrastructure and asbestos."

In 2016, Alberta Infrastructure estimated the abatement and demolition costs of the building to be \$3.4 million. AHS has not included the demolition of the building in their budget for the foreseeable future.

The letter to Minister Shandro said, in part, "It would not be financially prudent for our municipality to take on an additional \$210,000+/year within our operating budget for a facility that would add very little value to our taxpayers. Further, we fear the operational costs would only be the start of the expenses needed to keep this building operational. We understand that there are millions of dollars in deferred maintenance, along with antiquated internal infrastructure, a failing foundation and asbestos. Given the age of this building and all of the issues that accompany it, the structure is truly at the end of its life."

The Edson Friendship Centre's Kristie Gomuwka represented one of the community groups that considered renting the old hospital to use for transitional housing and emergency shelter space. Gomuwka said they determined using the building would not be viable. Exorbitant utility costs and the maintenance required, including the cost of replacing the aging boiler system, were prohibiting factors.

The old hospital, which was built in 1968, was most recently used as a senior's lodge while the new Parkland Lodge was under construction. Residents moved into the new lodge on November 20th, once again leaving the old hospital building vacant.

The Evergreens Foundation CAO Kristen Chambers said, "When we agreed to move into the building [the old hospital] we knew it was at its end of life. The state of the building was as expected but we knew going in there was approximately \$11 million in deferred maintenance that needed to be done."

Chambers said the risk of having something fail was a risk the Evergreens Foundation was willing to take as it was a short term move, it reduced construction time on the new lodge by approximately eight months, and it meant residents did not have to live in a construction zone.

When asked if it would have been feasible to remain in the building Chambers said, "We feel we exhausted the useful life span of the building." It was also noted that the design of the building does not allow for the isolation of one wing.

Chambers confirmed their basic utility bills

were approximately \$200,000 per year, and said those bills could have been much higher as the foundation qualified for a very low negotiated rate that would not be available to the average business or group.

Chambers added that in addition to mechanical issues, plumbing issues, and the presence of too many hazardous materials to make renovating feasible, AHS identified geotechnical issues as well.

The letter to Minister Shandro also states, "It should not be the onus of the citizens of Edson to take responsibility for another government organization's failing building or the consequences that will result should the building remain standing and uncared for. Edson Town Council is asking your Government to take responsibility for its building."

MP Soroka discusses vaccine rollout and constituency concerns

In an interview with The Weekly Anchor, Yellowhead MP Gerald Soroka discussed the challenges that our region has seen in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition to the challenges seen across the country, Soroka noted that it has made fighting for his constituents on other issues even more difficult.

"At the same time COVID is happening, our oil and gas sector is suffering immensely," Soroka said. "Try to get any leeway or progress on the oil and gas side when you've got a Federal government that does not support the oil and gas sector. They give the lip service saying they do, but they truly do not."

"Besides oil and gas, it's also the small businesses like restaurants and small clothing stores, these kinds of businesses. That's also a struggle, trying to fight for them as well," Soroka continued. "I know some of these restrictions are Provincial so it's out of our jurisdiction, but yet that's the challenge with this whole COVID, how it's had such a detrimental effect on our whole economy."

As a member of the Transport Committee, Soroka used airlines as an example of the trickledown effect creating issues within the economy. "It's not just Air Canada and West Jet, it's 20+ other small providers, travel agents, staff at airports, staff at parking places, and it just goes on," he said.

Soroka, who was elected in late 2019, said that his job, like many others, has also been changed in a big way. COVID has disrupted the typical MP schedule, which involves "going to the House every day for question period, having your committees, meeting with constituents or different organizations." "I can honestly say I've experienced that for three whole weeks," Soroka said. "That's how different it's been compared to how we've run Parliament for the last 100-and-some years already." Still, Soroka continues to fight for his constituents however he can,

try to get your message across," he said.

One issue felt across the country is the delay of vaccinations and whether the Federal government is doing their best to procure the doses needed.

"I think the big problem is the fact that the Liberal government hasn't really done as well of a job as they could have," said Soroka. "We're basically a year into it now, and now they're imposing these heavy restrictions for travellers that are coming back to Canada."

"We're doing all these severe lockdowns now, and yet the Liberals were counting on these vaccines, which they haven't been able to supply according to what they wanted," he explained. "Their attitude is, 'Don't worry, it'll still happen. Just have faith, we've done it right, it's all good.""

For Soroka, that attitude just isn't good enough. "Every week that goes by it's, 'Yeah, I know we didn't get the doses

even if it's on a Zoom call. this week, but that's okay "You try to speak out, you because we'll still make up for it. We're still on track."

> "They're very good at the wordsmithing. But yet it's not comforting. Maybe for people in other parts of the country it is, but I know it's not comforting for people here in Alberta," Soroka said. "About the only people that it's comforting for are people that aren't interested in getting the vaccine."

> From what Soroka's seen, the "vast majority" of Canadians do want to get the vaccine, and the constant back-and-forth of when a proper rollout might happen is just causing more stress.

> "Everyone is so stressed out and confused," said Soroka, noting that the Federal government has provided too much "mixed-messaging." "It's hard to get this information for residents when it seems like even the governing party is confused," he added.

Soroka also discussed his concerns with the

worsening mental health that people across the country are experiencing. He had recently spoken in the House of Commons with NDP MP Gord Johns about the mental health crisis in Canada.

"There's probably people out there that haven't left their homes since March," said Soroka, adding that even those who are able to leave their homes are experiencing the severe effects of isolation. In addition to that, many people are in "financial crisis."

"It's a bad situation all the way around, no matter what," said Soroka. "This is the time to rely more on your family and friends, even if you can't see them or be around them, you have to try and do phone calls and things like that."

Soroka concluded the interview by expressing his "great appreciation" for frontline workers. "Healthcare professionals, teachers, first responders, and just everyone who has stepped up during this pandemic, I am very thankful," he said.

Flashing Green Light Bylaw

The Town of Edson has implemented a Flashing Green Light Bylaw. Council gave all three readings to Bylaw 2253, the Flashing Green Light Bylaw at their February 2nd, 2021 Council meeting.

The Traffic Safety Act allows for a municipal Council to pass a bylaw allowing for authorized firefighters to display a flashing green light while responding to an emergency. In Edson's case, the green lights would be used for our volunteer firefighters responding to the firehall. There are no changes to the fire apparatus, which utilize the standard red lights. The purpose of



the bylaw is to enhance public safety and awareness by identifying Edson Firefighters who are in the process of responding to the hall. The bylaw does not give any special privileges or powers to those responding volunteers, but gives other motorists and pedestrians notice that there is an emergency taking place and to have the option to yield if it is safe to do so.

Please watch for our responders utilizing these new lights and keep our roads safe for all users.



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

NO SPRAY PROGRAM YEARLY RENEWAL

Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires landowners who do not want herbicide applied adjacent to their property to enter into an agreement with the county prior to April 1st of each year. The landowner becomes responsible for weed and brush control in the designated areas, as defined by the no spray agreement.

f you cannot meet this deadline, please call our Agricultural Services Department at 780-325-3782 or 1-800-814-3935.

 Once an agreement has been completed no spray signs must be purchased at a cost of \$5.00 for two signs, at the Yellowhead County Edson or Wildwood Offices. These signs must be placed by the landowner in a highly visible area as close as possible to the property line.

 Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires each landowner who has signed the agreement to fulfill their obligations before the July 1st deadline. After the July 1st deadline, Yellowhead County re-assumes responsibility for weed and brush control and may apply herbicide adjacent to non-compliant roadsides if necessary.

 If you chose not to renew your agreement for 2021, we ask that you please remove your signs prior to the start of the spray season starting May 1st,



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Mealshare and A&W Canada announce national partnership Local participation to benefit Edson Food Bank

In what is described as a "momentous national partnership to help end youth hunger," A&W Canada has paired up with national social enterprise Mealshare to make a difference across the country.

Mealshare is a Canadian charity which was founded in Alberta in 2013, starting with four partner restaurants. Since then, the organization has expanded to 1200+ restaurants across Canada, and their new partnership with A&W Canada is their "next milestone."

Mealshare's goal is to end youth hunger. In Canada, 1 in 5 children are considered 'food insecure.' "We are committed to creating a world where it's easier to share with those in need, and every child and youth is fed as a result," a press release on the partnership read.

Since inception, Mealshare has provided over 3.8 million meals, working on a "Buy One, Give One" model. The press release explains, "Canadians can purchase a Mealshare menu item at a participating restaurant and one meal will be donated to youth struggling with hunger through our network of local city charity partners and our international partner, Save the Children Canada."

At A&W, customers can participate in Mealshare Mondays by ordering a Cheddar Bacon Uncle Burger Combo. For every one of these combos ordered, one simple, healthy meal will be provided to a youth in need.

Customers can also "Make it a Mealshare" any day of the week, simply by adding \$1.00 to their order. Doing this will also provide one simple, healthy meal for a youth in need.

Meals are provided through Mealshare's network of 450 local charity partners across Canada. 80% of Mealshare's financial support stays in local communities where the Mealshare item was purchased. 20% goes internationally to Save the Children.

In Edson, the organization supports the Edson Food Bank Society. "Both Mealshare and A&W wanted to ensure a local charity was involved in each community," said Shree Govindarajan, Edmonton Community Leader with Mealshare. "Whenever we're looking for a new charity partner in an area, we look for community hubs that have a good impact, and a food component to their offering - the Edson Food Bank Society definitely offered that."

Local A&W Franchisee Stacie Eldstrom spoke about the partnership as well. "Any time that we can support local charities and help children or help anyone in this aspect is a great idea," she said. "This is what we do for a living so what better way to do it."

All A&W locations are participating in the program, with over 1,000 across Canada and 201 locations in Alberta. The goal for the program is to share 1.25 million meals per year, and the hope is that 241,200 of those will be shared in Alberta.

Currently, there are not any other restaurants in Edson working with Mealshare, but the organization made it clear that they would be thrilled to add to their list of partner restaurants. "We hope that this partnership with A&W will inspire independent restaurants to reach out to be part of our program," said Govindarajan. "We have been wanting to make a bigger impact in smaller communities across Alberta and Canada but didn't have the resources to do so prior to this partnership."



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County's Ag Services receives field visit report

Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Supervisor Jennifer Benson met with County Council at their January 19 Governance and Priorities Meeting to present their field visit report. The report was received in December of 2020, although the field visit was held on June 4, 2020.

The Agricultural Service Board (ASB) Program conducts field visits annually to ensure that ASB Grant dollars are being used appropriately to support the objectives of the ASB Grant Program.

Information gathered from field visits is used to assist other ASBs in the development and delivery of programs related to the ASB Grant and to provide evidence to the Office of the Auditor-General that ASB Grant dollars are being used effectively and efficiently to support programs related to the ASB Act and environmental extension and awareness.

In 2020, Alberta Agriculture and Forestry (AAF) selected 15 municipalities in 2020 for the



field visit program. Yellowhead County was one of the three selected from the Northwest region. Benson estimated that they are selected for the field visit approximately once every five years.

Agricultural Service Board Program Manager Doug Macaulay met with Benson on June 4 and reviewed the programs and projects implemented under the various Acts the ASB is delegated to enforce.

The report's executive summary read, "Yellowhead County received funding under the Legislative and Environmental Funding Stream of the 2017-2019 ASB Grant. They were able to demonstrate that they had programs related to each of these funding streams indicating effective use of ASB Grant dollars to support activities related to the administration of legislative requirements under the Agricultural Service Board Act and enhanced environmental awareness."

Macaulay's report also notes that "The partnership between the Ag Fieldmen, their management team, the ASB and Council is strong and the County is engaged and supportive of programming.'

The report cites the development of a new Agricultural Services Bylaw to re-establish their ASB and appeal committees as an example of this strong partnership, which had its first reading only two weeks after the visit on June 23, 2020.

The Yellowhead County ASB team's pest surveillance program is described as "proactive and effective." The report says, "It is impressive to see their surveillance system includes a 12-point matrix system that they use to manage and survey for issues in the entire County."

The report also discussed the Animal Health Act (AHA) and referred to the County's Livestock Emergency Response Plan and their work with the SPCA. The County was recommended to continue maintaining their relationships with the SPCA and local vets to support the Animal Health Act.

It was noted that the County does not have their own emergency carcass disposal site because "assessment work indicates that the municipal water table is too high." The report recommended exploring options for an emergency carcass disposal site in a neighboring municipality.

Benson discussed her good working relationships with Fieldman from other municipalities, and Councillor Penny Lowe asked if they might be willing to let Yellowhead County use their facilities in the event of a large-scale livestock emergency. Benson replied,

"Absolutely."

Councillor Dawn Mitchell commended Benson and her team on their hard work. "Ag Services is one of the hearts of Yellowhead County, and I love this report because I think it's your report card. Your team did a really good job," she said. "It is mentioned in there numerous times that suggestions were made and you jumped on it and got it done ahead of expected schedule, so congratulations to you. That was a job well done."

Overall, the report found that "the scope of the work that the ASB delivers meets the requirements of the ASB Grant Program."

Editor's Note: Fieldman is a term referencing county-level agricultural extension staff, a role increasingly held by women.
