GUEST EDITORIAL/COMMENT Kenney's last job for taxpayers: end bracket creep

By the end of this year, bracket creep will have cost each Albertan between \$105 and \$331, depending on income

As Alberta Premier Jason Kenney gets ready to step away from the premier's office, he should go out the way he came in: sticking up for taxpayers. To do that, Kenney needs to wash away the unsightly blemish on his tax-fighting record: bracket creep.

Kenney started his career roughly three decades ago as the Canadian Taxpayers Federation's representative in Alberta. He successfully fought to end the MLA's gold-plated pension, championed the Taxpayer Protection Act to defend Albertans against moneyhungry politicians eyeing up sales taxes, along with pushing balanced budget legislation and laws limiting corporate welfare.

As premier, Kenney's record hasn't been perfect. He's spending billions of dollars more than the New Democrats did in their final year. He announced billions in corporate welfare despite promising to "bring back legislation" to "get the Alberta government out of the business of business, out of the losing business of picking winners and losers."

But Kenney's work lowering taxes has been nearly spotless.

His first bill as premier scrapped the NDP's carbon tax. He accelerated his business tax cut at a time when Alberta desperately needed an economic pickme-up. Alberta now has the lowest business taxes in Canada, and its federal-provincial combined rate is lower than that of 44 American states. He showed leadership in fighting inflation by being the first premier to reduce the government's tax-take at the pumps. And he just patched up Alberta's leaky finances with the first balanced budget in seven years.

But despite promising to balance the books without raising taxes, the premier's first budget included a sneaky backdoor income tax grab known as bracket creep. That means Kenney still has work to do before

even though they can't actually afford to buy more. Bracket creep also erodes the tax-free portion of taxpayers' income. By the end of this year, bracket creep will have cost each Albertan between \$105 and \$331, depending on income. And the cost will only increase as time goes on and inflation gets worse.

Kenney knows well how bracket creep eats away at taxpayers' wallets. After all, he used to stick up for taxpayers against politicians who wanted to increase their tax take so covertly.

Bracket creep is a "hidden and regressive tax grab," wrote Kenney in a Calgary Herald column dated Dec. 10, 1997. "There is a social cost to deindexation which cannot be ignored ... For low- and middle-income families, bracket creep can suck enough money from the family budget to cause serious financial hardship.'

In 1999, Kenney stood up in question period and fired a blistering query at former federal finance minister Paul Martin.

"How can the minister continue to stand in his place and justify a tax system which taxes people without their even knowing it through this pernicious tax grab called bracket creep?" demanded Kenney.

Alberta taxpayers are now posing that same question to Kenney.

The Alberta government's current commitment to bracket creep is especially puzzling. After all, the government said it would "pause indexation of the personal income tax system until economic and fiscal conditions improve."

Kenney is now posting on Twitter about the "eighth consecutive months of job growth" and how "Alberta's Recovery Plan is working." With the government running a \$3.9-billion surplus last year, there are no more excuses for not ending bracket creep today.

Kenney built a long career centred around sticking up for hardworking taxpayers. It would be a shame for him to leave office with the huge blemish of bracket creep staining his record.

Sweet Riders Mountain Bike Courses

The Willmore Bike Skills Park was bustling with activity this week as riders of all ages came for the Sweet Riders Mountain Bike Courses.

The courses ran from July 12-16 and was available for all skill levels as well as age groups. The event was organized by the Town of Edson in partnership with the Edson Cycling Association. Classes were led by experts from Sweet Riders Mountain Biking out of Blairmore, Alberta.

Tuesday to Friday were exclusively for the kids. The days were broken up into sessions for the different age groups. Tiny Tots (ages 4-5) at 9 to 9:45am, Jr. Jumpers (ages 6-8) 10 to 11am, Sweet Shredders (ages 9-10) from 12 to 2pm and finally Youth Rippers (ages 11+) from 2 to 4pm. Saturday's session ran from 9am to 3pm with an hour lunch break, and was solely for adult beginners. An intermediate level adult course was planned for the Sunday but lack of registrations forced its cancellation.

The classes cover all the basic

moves needed to fully enjoy mountain biking. "We teach what we call the foundation skills," said Karey Lee, founder and head coach of Sweet Riders. "We make sure everybody's got what they need as a base to make sure they can build their skills above that."

When asked about the goal of events like this Krysta Hawboldt, recreation manager with the Town of Edson, said, "Just bringing out people to enjoy nature and enjoy our park, also practice safety so that when they are out enjoying the park they can do so safely."

This is the second time the Sweet Riders Mountain Bike Courses has taken place. This year's event was quite successful with two out of the four kid/youth sessions being at maximum capacity. Council approves new Galloway Car Charging Stations

During the July 19 Town of Edson Council Meeting, Council members debated and voted on whether Council should approve the Galloway Station Museum & Travel Centre as a vehicle charging station site.

In the meeting the topic was presented by Brenden Riome, the Municipal Energy Director. This topic had been previously discussed at previous town meetings in May, November, and December of 2020. The proposed site would be the Edson location for the EVenture Charging Network.

The Town of Edson has been an active member of the EVenture Advisory Committee since 2020. EVenture is a partnership between municipalities in northwest Alberta to develop an electric vehicle charging network that connects the region. The goals for the network are to enhance tourism and economic development opportunities, facilitate adoption of electric vehicles by residents, provide capacity-building and training opportunities, and demonstrate innovative solutions for greenhouse gas emissions reductions.

The EVenture Advisory Committee is pursuing external funding both through federal grants and private funding. The Committee is preparing an application to the Zero Emission Vehicle Infrastructure Program (ZEVIP) to cover 50% of the networks construction cost; the remaining 50% will be covered by a private third party selected through an RFP (Request For Proposal) process. As part of the RFP, the third party is responsible for all operations, maintenance, and utilities costs of the network. The RFP process had already begun, and is now in the evolution phase.

Administration is proposing the Galloway Station Museum & Travel Centre as the site for up to two Level 3 EV chargers. The Museum already serves as the Town's main tourist hub and travel centre, and is centrally situated in Centennial Park. There are amenities nearby, as well as easy access to the Town's walking trails. Most importantly, the building has the correct power requirements to support Level 3 charging. It is thus an optimal site both for aligning with the initiative's tourism and economic development goals as well as ensuring technical feasibility.

An alternative site had been identified in downtown Edson at 506 50 St (a Town-owned parking lot). However there is currently no power service to the lot and this site would require significant aesthetic upgrades.

Councillor Ed Moore had a few questions about the costs of maintaining and using the site. "For the Galloway location where will the money go?" Riome responded that as part of the agreement, the third party operator will both pay for the power and receive all the profits from the site. "There isn't enough uptake of that sort of transportation mode to make that a profitable endeavour for a municipality our size," Riome said.

Councillor Krystal Baier voiced her approval for the location. "I think the location is fantastic. You continually see people stopping there for lunch, grabbing either a picnic or fast food, so I think that a really nice way to highlight our community's welcome."

"How many stations are they putting in?" asked Councillor Gean Chouinard. Riome answered that currently the proposal was two charging stations.

Councillor Trevor Bevan said that the new stations will be useful for increasing tourism, and travel down the Yellowhead Highway. This would be in line with the Trans Canada Yellowhead Highway Association's desire to promote Highway 16 as a cross Canada travel route.

Mayor Kevin Zahara wrapped up the discussion by saying that, "I am very excited by this project. I know as a mayor I've received correspondence from travellers from the city and Jasper and Grand Prairie who are stopping here now because this is the central point to get a charge. And I think having a connected network in Alberta will be huge." The final vote was unanimous in favour of the proposed project.

Un-reclaimed lease site holds up development

During the Yellowhead County's Governance and Priorities Committee meeting on July 19, local resident Chris Gosling made a presentation to Council requesting an exception to allow an additional access approach off of the Rosevear Road.

His request was previously denied by County Administration as it did not meet County policy.

"I believe that what I am asking for is a temporary exemption to allow us to construct an approach before the approach owned by others is removed," stated Gosling.

Gosling's requested approach requires that Long Run Exploration's approach be removed first. He also presented a copy of a letter from Long Run stating that the lease is on their reclamation list and that their approach will be removed when they have reclaimed their constructed lease at the south end of the property.

"Unfortunately, we are in year three of waiting for that reclamation and with the current economic situation, we have no idea how much longer we will have to wait. We do not have the heavy equipment that would be required to reclaim that lease, so just releasing them from their obligations would not be a wise idea on our part," stated Gosling.

"We need to get our approach put in so we can get our driveway in, building site cleared and house etc. built before I retire in approximately 26 months," added Gosling. "This exemption would mean there are three approaches on this quarter until Long Run removes theirs, but when they do, we will be back down to the two that are allowed on a quarter facing pavement."

"We are asking that common sense and decency overrule the letter (but not the spirit) of the law,' concluded Gosling.

Councillor David Russell asked, "The information we were given says there were no wells drilled on the site. So the site is vacant?" Gosling responded that was correct and that no traffic other than trespassers are using the access. He confirmed that his family owns the property occupied by the lease.

Councillor Shawn Berry ask if Gosling has been able to determine why Long Run Exploration has delayed removing the access and reclaiming the site. Gosling responded, "My understanding is it's not high on their list. Because there was no activity on the site, there is no potential for environmental contamination, no water well to seal off, it's basically a chunk of flat land." He also stated his family does not have the heavy equipment needed to reclaim the site themselves.

Mayor Wade Williams suggested that it would be prudent to contact Long Run by letter or email stating Gosling's need to have the approach removed because it's holding up development on other parts of his parcel. The hope being that Long Run would act on it more quickly.

Council voted to bring the request back to a future council meeting for consideration.
