Province downloads more costs onto local municipal taxpayers

Approximately \$1M. That is the known amount Town Council and Administration needs to raise to cover recent provincial government cuts and funding changes in order to maintain current service levels.

The funding changes have been rolled out by the province as ways to reduce government spending, cut red tape, and show fiscal responsibility. Consequently, many of those funding changes mean the cost of programs, services, and capital funding must be either borne by the municipality or result in a loss of service.

The rule of thumb for the past number of years has been a 1% increase in property taxes by the Town results in an additional \$100,000 of funding. That number has shifted slightly and now a 1%

increase in taxes raises approximately \$110,000 in revenue. As the province alters funding models and downloads costs, which equally impacts both capital and operational funding, it appears the Town must find an additional \$1M which would (following the same taxes to funding ratio) represent a potential 9%-10% property tax increase.

What has changed?

Grant funding in lieu of taxation on provincially owned property has been reduced resulting in a revenue loss of approximately \$90,000 this year. "They [the Province] tell us we have to get that from taxation. We must collect that money from the rest of the tax payers," said Sarah Bittner GM of Corporate Services.

Instead of paying the province 26% of all revenue accrued from fines issued in the municipality (including provincial fines and photo radar) the Town is now required to pay the province 40% of the collected revenue. The result is an annual \$250,000-\$300,000 loss for the Town. As fine revenue directly funds policing costs, and contributions to emergency services such as STARS, this loss represents the salary for 2-3 local RCMP members.

The province does provide some small grants for municipal policing costs. Minister Madu has accurately stated that the province has not cut policing grants however, the eligible amount for those grants has not changed in more than a decade. The provincial government does not provide funding for bylaw or photoradar but now receives a larger portion of the proceeds.

Additionally, municipalities

are now required to pay for any criminal lab work conducted in their area. As this funding cut was done with little notice or consultation the Town is unclear as to what the budget impact will be. However, the municipality has received a 16,500 bill in 2021 – for one invoice.

The province has announced it will discontinue the current MSI (Municipal Sustainability Initiative) funding model and instead implement the new Fiscal Framework Funding. change in funding model is expected to result in a further \$500,000 reduction in municipal funding.

Funding for the ParentLink program was cut in March 2020 which resulted in a \$110,000 loss in funding.

The province has eliminated the ability of a municipality to

require an additional 5% for municipal reserves on subdivisions over 30 units/hectare of developable land.

Those are the known costs and funding changes. There are unknown costs and cuts that the Town is aware will be coming but with little to no consultation the impact to the municipal budget is still unknown.

One such change on the horizon is the elimination of funding for the Household Hazardous Waste program currently run by the province. The cost to the Town has not been determined but is expected to be significant. The alternative would be to have household hazardous waste returned to the landfills which could result in waste leeching into the ground and streams.

"It is unbelievable, really, how much downloading they've done without consultation," said


Check out our new mobile-ready website at: www.weeklyanchor.com Councillor Baier, "Not only have they decreased the funding but with the household hazardous waste program I would love to ask the minister 'Would you prefer that to go in the creeks and the rivers? Or how would you like us to deal with that - if you want us to take this on - if you want to take that financial obligation off yourself and put it onto us?' Because, in my mind, it is completely unacceptable what the government has done."

Mayor Zahara said the Town is looking at a 5% increase just to cover costs on the operational side. "These are back door government downloading policies," said Mayor Zahara, "We get the hits and blame for tax increases when it's coming from our provincial cabinet."

The cuts and funding changes are split nearly 50/50 between operational and capital budget impacts.

Mayor Zahara and Council said they are thankful for area MLA Martin Long who they all agreed is engaged, listens, and is understanding and clarified that their frustration is directed at the provincial cabinet level.

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Step-2 "Open for Summer" changes for Edson

(Town of Edson) June 9, 2021 – Step 2 of the Alberta Government's "Open for Summer" plan comes into effect June 10th. The following is how the changes impact the Town of Edson operations, as well as a detailed list of the overall Provincial changes.

Repsol Place is scheduled to open on June 14th. Hours and capacity will still have limitations as staff are brought back in and restrictions are eased. Monday to Friday the hours will be 6am to 1pm and 5pm to 9pm. Weekend hours are 9am to 6:30pm. For the full programming schedule and how to register, visit www.edson.ca/repsolplace. Pre-registration will still be required for some programs.

Other Edson Facilities

With great care for public safety protocols, other Town facilities will also be reopening to the public.

Starting June 10th, the Civic Centre, Public Works Building, and administrative area of the Protective Services Building (Fire Hall) will be open for walk-in customers, Monday to Friday 10am to 3pm. Prebooked appointments, virtual meetings, and online payments are still the preferred options at this time.

Outdoor Spaces

Residents are encouraged to get outdoors and enjoy Edson's many outdoor spaces and activities. Parks crews have been busy getting facilities open and ready for an increase in use over the summer months. Please help keep the spaces safe and clean for all residents to enjoy.

Alberta's Open for Summer Stage 2

Stage 2: Two weeks after 60% of Albertans 12+ (born in 2009 or earlier) have received at least one dose, and hospitalizations are below 500 and declining.

Outdoor social gatherings – up to 20 people with distancing (indoor social gatherings still not permitted)





not intend to get vaccinated are the least fearful of contracting Covid-19. Most are convinced, for various reasons, that vaccines are dangerous, and the vast majority are distrustful of public health officials and the

AHS has begun walk-in vaccination clinics in Calgary, Edmonton, and 18 other smaller communities. These short-term clinics include Drayton Valley, but not the Edson area yet. Hopefully this will come and should help significantly increase access and uptake in this region.

"Alberta's vaccine rollout continues to pick up speed every day. Every day tens of thousands of doses are getting into Albertans' arms. This is a testament to the commitment each Albertan has to putting this pandemic behind us," stated Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health, regarding the milestone of 3,000,000 Albertans vaccinated

"Every person who receives their vaccine today will help us to prevent future transmission. If you have not yet received your first dose, please book an appointment. If you have, follow up with your second dose appointment when you are eligible to do so," stated Dr. Deena Hinshaw, Chief Medical Officer of Health.

Second doses are now also available and will be administered as follows:

- Anyone vaccinated in March or earlier can now book their second
- Anyone vaccinated in April can book their second dose starting no later than June 14.
- Anyone vaccinated in May can book their second dose starting no later than June 28.

Albertans can book appointments through AHS online or by calling 811, or through participating pharmacies.

AHS states that a single dose of Covid-19 vaccine offers at least 80 per cent protection against severe outcomes, including hospitalization and death. However, second doses are needed to get the best and most longlasting protection against the virus.


Albertans who have received their vaccine are required to continue following public health guidelines, including physical distancing, practicing good hand hygiene, masking when in public, and staying home when sick. It can take two to three weeks after receiving the shot for it to build effectiveness, and two doses are needed for optimal protection against Covid-19.

containing the remains of 215 school children, was a heartbreaking reminder of the pain indigenous children, their families and their communities were subjected to through residential schools.

This is a dark reminder of the horrendous reality that was faced by many Indigenous Canadians. My thoughts and prayers are with all indigenous families as they mourn. It is our burden to carry, and we must start to ease the heavy load that has been carried by indigenous people for far too long. While communities and families grapple with this unthinkable revelation, it is time for all of us to come together and aid in the healing process.

For many indigenous people, although the discovery opened tremendously deep wounds, it was not a surprise. According to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, at least 3,200 children died while attending residential schools. We owe it to each and every one of them to redouble our efforts toward reconciliation and healing. In the

Canada's Conservatives have called on the Prime Minister to immediately implement the TRC's recommendations #71-76, which deal with missing children. We have also called for the following additional measures to be taken:

*Funding the investigation at all former residential schools in Canada where unmarked graves may exist, including the site where 215 children have already been discovered.

*Ensuring that proper resources are allocated for communities to reinter, commemorate, and honour any individuals discovered through the investigation, according to the wishes of their next of kin; and

*Developing a detailed and thorough set of resources to educate Canadians of all ages on the tragic history of residential schools in Canada.

My sincere condolences to all of those who had to endure these residential schools. It is time to act NOW for the sake of all the children we lost. Words are not enough. Action must be taken.

time art teacher Mr. Kevin Dye, students are learning techniques in both slab work and throwing on the wheel.

This year the art department invested in a shiny new pottery wheel that students will work with for years to come. This is a great new learning tool and opportunity for Parkland art students.

Mr. Dye is passionate about sharing his knowledge with his students and his art room is always full of excitement during class. The two week online learning period in May did not deter Mr. Dve and to ensure his students would have enough time remaining this semester, he labored to build each student a unique base structure (as chosen by each child) which they would then add detailing and fine tune the piece upon their return to in person learning. This required that the pieces were to be kept in wet paper towels and changed regularly to preserve the malleable nature of the clay. 



Hospitality Despite Our Differences

Our culture is becoming an increasingly diverse landscape of personal opinions and worldviews; and those differing perspectives on human purpose and flourishing are increasingly at odds in

very public forums. Generally, there are two popular approaches

to this reality: first you have the traditionalists who proclaim, "Everyone is wrong except those who agree with me." And second, you have the progressives who tend to proclaim, "Everyone is right except those who disagree with me." Honestly, neither of these is a productive approach to community.

Believe me, I understand how frustrating it can be when the world doesn't see things your way, and I agree that we can't all be right when we sometimes believe totally opposite things.

I think we could, however, respect the idea that your convictions might be as important to you, as mine are to me. And if I want you to respect my choice to live according to my conscience, I need to respect your choice to live according to yours.

This isn't an argument for universal truth, or even the idea of spiritual 'co-existence'. I'm not arguing that "all paths lead to enlightenment". What I'm talking about is hospitality.

Hospitality doesn't mean that I have to agree that you are right, and you don't have to agree that I'm right either. And yet, in empathy, we could actually serve one another, and maybe even engage in civil

discourse as though we were actually neighbours. I don't have to feel threatened by you, and you don't have to feel threatened by me. Can we be confident enough to find a path forward where we can live alongside those whose opinions we might oppose?

For myself, I think the Bible is clear on this, Christians are to see themselves as foreigners in the land, in need of hospitality ourselves, and looking to share the hope that we have with gentleness and respect (1 Peter 1:17, 3:15).

Alberta approved farmers' markets now open

Alberta approved farmers' markets are identifiable to the public by the Sunnygirl logo

'We have more than 130 approved markets serving about 110 communities around the province that are open throughout the summer,' says Eileen Kotowich, farmers' market specialist with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry (AF). 'This includes more than 20 markets that operate year

She says Alberta's farmers' markets offer a diverse selection of goods.

'What you'll see in the markets right now are lots of greenhouse bedding plants and vegetables, early season vegetables, and lots of preserves, baking, prepared foods, and other year-round products like

meat, eggs and honey.'

Part of the success of farmers' markets is that consumers want to know where their food comes from and to make that connection with the

'It gives you a feeling of trust when you can look the producer in the eye and talk to them about how they raise their animals, grow their crops or prepare their ready-to-eat foods.

A minimum of 80% of vendors' products must be produced in Alberta to qualify as an Alberta approved farmers' market.

The markets will look a little different this year as they incorporate increased protocols and safety measures into their operations in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Vendor stalls and tables are separated within the market, increased cleaning and sanitizing of high touch point surfaces happens during the market. Crowds will be asked to use one

entrance and exit so that crowd numbers can be monitored to ensure physical distancing. Customers are being encouraged to shop with purpose so that everyone who wants to attend a market has an opportunity to support their local makers, bakers and growers.

AF introduced a mobile app for both Apple and Android devices a few years ago. This app allows users to easily find any Alberta approved farmers' markets in their area or around the province, search by day of the week or type of market.

'It is especially important this year that customers check the information online,' Kotowich explains. 'Some markets have changed location, hours of operation and opening dates for the season in order to better implement the increased safety measures. We are updating the online information as we receive it so that customers are not disappointed.'



Understanding Elder Abuse

(YC) June 15 is World Elder Abuse Awareness Day. During this time, we are asked to consider the older people in our lives, and recognize that some may be experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, elder abuse.

Elder abuse is violence, mistreatment, or neglect towards older adults. The abuse often comes from individuals in situations of power or trust. It can come from close company, such as spouses, children, other family members, caregivers, or other service providers. It can also come from more removed individuals. The abuse can occur in either private residences or outside the home.

- Common signs of elder abuse can include:
- Confusion
- Depression or anxiety
- Unexplained injuries
- Changes in hygiene
- Seeming fearful around certain people

- Fear or worry when talking about money

If you suspect that an elderly person is at risk from a neglectful or overwhelmed caregiver, or being preyed upon financially, it's important to speak up. It is best to ask questions away from the place where you suspect the abuse is happening. The person may be afraid to speak up if there is a chance of being overheard by the abuser or someone who will relay the information.

If you or someone you know is being abused and you don't know how to help, please call 2-1-1. You'll receive confidential, prompt aid and a referral to resources to help you deal with an abusive situation. If you believe someone is in immediate danger, do not hesitate to contact 9-1-1.

Everyone deserves to live in safety, and to be treated with dignity and respect. These guidelines can help you recognize the warning signs of elder abuse, understand what the risk factors are, and learn how to prevent and report the problem.

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
