to tomorrow a little more than today," said Mercier.

"The reason we asked residents to evacuate another time is that the fire is still burning in your area and with the stronger winds and higher temperatures that occurred yesterday, I can tell you that they did jump the south fireguard," Mercier said. "The winds to my understanding were picking up to about 60 km an hour last night."

"The crews were able to manage that and it didn't go very far. The crews are working actively today with a number of people on foot as well as some crews from B.C. and some from the United States, along with heavy equipment. They are re-establishing the southern guard on that fire," said Mercier.

"So, we were asking Shinning Bank residents to remain evacuated for one more night. Our intent is for tomorrow at 2 p.m. we will have some great news for you and that you will be able to return home. But at this time we are asking for one more day at minimum," Mercier said. "We don't want to send you home if there is a risk. We want it to be a positive return."

"There were two more fires we will touch base on, the one south of Edson that came up at the Brazeau dam. That fire is still getting a very positive response from the fire crews on there. They have a very good guard on the north side of it, so it's not an immediate concern for our residents. For the Wildwood fires, I can also say that we have been able to actually take some of the resources off that fire to help us fight the Shinning Bank Fire. That fire has mitigated itself or gone down in size quite drastically. We still have issues in some areas that are flaring up a little bit. Again no immediate concerns," said Mercier.

"We understand this hasn't been the first time you have been evacuated. You have been such great people to talk to. I understand you are not going through the easiest time and you are still worried. You have been polite and accommodating and you're working with our staff —I just can't thank you enough for that," Mercier added.

Yellowhead County Mayor Wade Williams stated, "Thanks to all our residents for being so cooperative. We realize these evacuations take a toll on everyone. Our crews are out doing everything they can to save as many properties as possible."

"We have [protection] sprinklers set up on a bunch more homes that are in the wildfire areas. Please, if you are seeing any of our crews or staff, thank them for all the work that they have done over the past few days —it's just amazing," said Williams.

I also want to thank our neighbouring communities; the Town of Edson, Town of Hinton, and the Town of Jasper for really stepping up and helping the evacuees. A week or so ago when the Town of Edson ended up having to evacuate as well, it was a big undertaking to send 12 to 14 thousand people to the west. Those communities really stepped up to help," said Williams.

"We do have a long weekend coming up, so keep in mind there is a OHV ban and fire bans in place. We still have huge fire risks out there because it is so dry. Please follow the bans, don't run ATVs, and don't have campfires for this long weekend," Williams said.

"There will be law enforcement out driving around checking on things. I would ask them not to give any warnings to someone that doesn't follow the rules. There needs to be a penalty.

With that being said, we still need to try and enjoy the weekend. But we need to follow the rules and keep the fire hazard down," Williams said.

During Yellowhead County's May 17 update, CAO Mercier addressed the recent Shining Bank evacuation, "The winds are still an issue. That is our biggest concern over the next 24 to 40 or so hours. The winds are still bouncing around quite a bit so we still have serious concerns with that. The evacuation zone we put in two days ago will stay in effect until Friday, is our best guess at this point in time." Mercier added that if winds die down the evacuation notice could be reviewed earlier. "We need to make sure our residents are safe first and foremost."

Local Shining Bank resident shares thoughts on recent wildfire

Many residents of Yellowhead County have been affected by the raging wildfires in the area. Bj Fuchs, a Rancher from Shinning Bank, shared his own experience and thoughts with the Weekly Anchor.

"During the evacuation order for Shining Bank, I chose to stay back along with others that felt the same way. The reason seems pretty basic to us ranchers. You work your whole life to be a rancher, you just don't abandon ship. We have way too much at stake here to just pack up and leave. Don't get me wrong, we will leave if it comes down to getting hurt. We have a great community out in the Shinning Bank area, when we first spotted some fire across the river on Friday May 5, we called it in right away. We never seemed to get any help for the longest time. So some of us neighbours got together to plan on what was needed to be done to protect, not only ourselves, but the rest of the neighbours' homes and livelihoods. The following day we had even more show up to help, some local oil and gas companies and some local logging companies brought some equipment to work on making a firebreak. Other equipment was making berms to contain the fire the best we could along with wetting down homes and stacks of straw bales with water tanks and pumps," said Fuchs.

"From what we could see there were three different fires burning and had jumped the river. Unfortunately, some homes got burnt. We were fortunate enough to contain two of the three fires on our property. One being on our section 36 pasture, the other fire just yards away from my son's house. It was a pretty scary time for sure. We the community have a lot of questions, how come we couldn't get help? Why are we left out here by ourselves? We did get some folks driving fire trucks and helicopters landing multiple times basically demanding us to leave. We choose to

stand our ground to protect our homes, property, neighbours and community," Fuchs said.

"We had people hauling in equipment that we never even knew before. I'm sure after it's all said and done, we will become lifelong friends. People from Carrot Creek also hauling equipment in and put it to work. People really came together to donate equipment and fuel. Some lost their equipment, some equipment never made it out of the fire. Still so many questions, why didn't help come sooner and what happens next? Who's paying for all these expenses? Not to mention what about mental health, this was very stressful times for this whole province. On the Sunday, Mother Nature gave us our first support with a little rain, then we finally started getting some provincial help with water bombers, helicopters, and ground crews getting water from the river and Shinning Bank Lake. With hot weather in the forecast and no rain, we need all the help we can get," said Fuchs.

"I reached out to our MLA Martin Long and had a good conversation, he came out and took a tour out here with myself and another neighbour. I would also welcome a call from Danielle Smith when she has time. We still have so many questions we would like answers for," said Fuchs.

"On another note, I have had numerous good conversations with our [County] Counsellor David Russell and MLA Martin Long on discussions of

lessons learned and tabled some thoughts on how can we improve if something like this happens again moving forward," Fuchs added.

Fuchs concluded, "We all need each other in difficult times.
Between our little Shinning Bank community and other communities across the river that we were in contact with daily, if not hourly at times, is an example of communities helping communities.

Like the saying goes communities build communities. This isn't a time to blame, but now at time to learn and continue to work together to be better in the future".

NEW! Busing Distance Eligibility Update for September 2023

In April 2023, the Alberta Government approved changes to the distance eligibility for transportation service effective for September 2024.

 The eligible transportation distance criteria of 2.4 kms from the student's primary residence to the school will be reduced. New distance criteria for eligible service is:

1.0 km or more for children in kindergarten and students in Grades 1-6; and,2.0 kms or more for students in Grades 7-12 will qualify for transportation service.

As a phased approach to implementing the new service criteria, Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is moving to implement the changes for September 2023.

Families who qualify for eligible service under the new distance criteria are invited to register for busing as soon as possible.

The Division will try to accommodate as many newly eligible riders as possible. Registrations received after June 30, 2023, are subject to seat availability.

FEE-BASED SERVICES: INELIGIBLE AND ALTERNATE (SECOND) SEAT REQUESTS FOR SEPTEMBER 2023

Requests for ineligible bus service should also register by the June 30 deadline; however, please note that eligible students will have priority on all routes.

Based on increased eligible riders, ineligible riders may not receive confirmation of a seat until after September 30, 2023. Additionally, requests for alternate (second) seats on other bus routes may not be confirmed until after September 30, 2023.

The Division is currently looking to recruit and train new bus drivers in anticipation of increases to eligible student ridership once the mandatory service requirement comes into effect in 2024. Please visit the **Careers** page on the Division's website at www.gypsd.ca/working-at-gypsd.

Edson Flying Club concerned with airport fee increases

During the May 16th Edson Town Council meeting, Clem Zajic and Joe Gallant with the Edson Flying Club presented concerns on the change of parking fees at the Edson Airport.

They stated that this year the airport fees increased by 400% for small planes. Previously, parking fees were at \$50 per month and \$300 for the year for planes 2,000kg and under; and \$75 per month and \$500 per year for planes 2,001kg and over. With the new prices it will cost \$200 a month or \$1,200 a year; and \$200 a month or \$1,500 a year respectively.

This new cost includes electricity, but does not change for planes that do not require being plugged in. Not all plane parking spots at the Edson Airport have access to power. "We believe the rate increase was unreasonable, it doesn't make sense. The fees are not really in line with what we believe are comparable airports," said Gallant. Previously, power was added onto the cost for those who needed it. This is the system that the flying club would like to go back to.

Gallant stated that the Edson Flying Club was unaware of the price changes until they received their February 2023 invoice. "We thought it was a mistake to begin with," stated Gallant. "When we first inquired about it, we

is and you need to pay the bill." The club said they have researched other airports with similar usage as Edson, to compare prices. For example, they stated the town of Rocky Mountain House charges \$211 a year and Slave Lake charges \$400.

"The overwhelming point here is, all these decisions were made without us knowing about it or being able to give an opinion," said Gallant. The group asked council to review the new rates and maybe change them to be more in line with similar airports. "Make it fair and equitable for all of us. That's our request," said Zajic.

After the Flying Club's presentation, Mayor Kevin Zahara thanked them for the presentation and apologized for the issue. "Without question, I think there has been occasion here that we have dropped the ball a little bit." He noted that council would not be making a decision tonight, but the issue would be presented to Town Administration for review and a response would be determined at a future council meeting. Councillor Gean Chouinard asked if the flying club was more concerned with the cost, or with the fact that they had not been notified. Gallant responded, "The cost is the main concern, communication is the second issue. We hope that it can be reviewed and we can get back to the same as we were

Mayor Zahara then asked if Gallant could give council a little history of the Edson Flying Club and its participation at the airport, "I know you have been in existence for quite some time and I don't know if people are aware of that history." "I've been the director of the club for 25 years now, "Gallant responded. "It started in 1961 and over the years there's been about 200 pilots that have come and gone." The club has had three different airplanes over the years as well as personal aircrafts owned by

Fears and distress around evacuations linger

When the evacuation order hit Edson on May 8, it also brought out real fear for most people. None of us will fully understand the fear that others went through or may still be dealing with. Every one of us handles things differently.

Please remember to be kind, just because someone looks calm or even happy, doesn't mean they are not struggling on the inside. We all have different health concerns or worry about someone who does. We also count on income to survive, and each person has their own personal thoughts and fears around their income.

Local senior citizen, Fred Kuzmic, said, "When we heard that the wildfire was getting close to Edson and the surrounding area and the evacuation was announced, there was a sharp rise in mental health issues of our citizens, including myself. Stress and anxiety levels were experienced by the seniors. For many of us, we were scared, confused, and not sure of what to do. Are we going to have transportation safely out of Edson and

where will they take us?"

"Will they take us to our families, to another lodge or a hotel, what will happen next? It was unknown. What about our pets? Where will they go? And what about our medication, who will look after this for us?" said Kuzmic. "We don't want to be alone. It is very frightening when you are not sure who will look after you."

"It was a huge challenge, but Edson residents, companies, police, firefighters, health officials, the Town of Edson, and many others came to our help. They ensured we had everything that we needed. On behalf of myself and other seniors I would like to say thank you Edson, Hinton, Jasper, Grande Cache, and others," said Kuzmic.

Crystal Metzger, who has a special needs son, said, "We were able to book a room as soon as the alert went off. Had we not gotten a room, we would have been heading to B.C. because Kieran (my son) couldn't have stayed in the Evacuation Center. My son has autism and does not handle change well, he needs a place that is calm along with routine.'

"I am very grateful for everything Nicholas Harbour did for us. He was calm and level headed. As the alert was going off my brain seemed to freeze. He managed to help not only me, but my two boys as well. Then after things were settling down, I had a breaking point and became very emotional. The anxiety I went through was not over the fear of losing my home, those things can be replaced. It was the unknown and the fear and stress my kids were having. I never want to do it again. Everyone in Hinton was fantastic. While it was the most stressful thing I think I've ever been through, I was amazed at how

calm, organized, and welcoming everyone was," said Metzger.
