under an evacuation alert upon their return. Residents east of the McLeod River will remain on a 30-minute evacuation notice in case conditions change. These areas will only allow local traffic to enter due to the active wildfire and the hazards that currently exist in the area, such as dangerous trees and potentially downed power poles.

The recent change in weather, including some much-needed precipitation, has the many crews and organizations working in the wildfire complexes feeling cautiously optimistic. They will continue to make strategic decisions to take as much advantage of these conditions as they

Structural protection will be removed from some areas in Yellowhead County over the next week. This will only be done in areas where crews are confident that it is safe to remove. It is important to have this equipment available for areas that need it.

Do not tamper with, move, or remove firefighting equipment that is strategically placed throughout the County. Doing so will not only hamper firefighting efforts, but it can also result in theft and/or mischief charges, which are serious offences under the criminal code and can result in a criminal record.

Yellowhead County would also like to request the cooperation of residents when it comes to the safety of our crews, staff, and for residents themselves. Drive safely and for conditions, and be aware that crews will be in areas throughout the County. Treat these crews with respect and kindness when you see them. Harassment will not be tolerated.

Thank you to the fire crews from across North America, as well as the many staff members who have worked tirelessly throughout this situation. Yellowhead County thanks those residents who have worked alongside us, those who have stepped up to help their friends and neighbours, and those who have continued to show cooperation and kindness throughout this difficult time.

Shiningbank residents ESTS helps with wildfire evacuations

The Edson Seniors Transportation Society (ESTS) drivers worked around the clock assisting with the wildfire evacuations and giving evacuees rides to ensure they could get their errands done.

Dawn Mitchell, Executive Director for the Edson Seniors Transportation Society, said, "The ESTS has been honoured to provide daily shuttle services on behalf of Yellowhead County to Wildwood and Evansburg evacuees. We did our very best to make residents feel safe and cared for during that difficult time. It was a very scary time for our seniors. We were extremely honoured to have been able to provide emergency evacuation transportation services for Parkland Lodge and The Evergreens Foundation residents on May 5. Residents were safely transported to Hinton, Jasper and Grande Cache."

"While stationed in Hinton during the Town of Edson and Yellowhead County evacuation, the ESTS shuttled all evacuees, who were without transportation, wherever they needed to go. If they needed to do banking or pick up items, we made sure these individuals felt they could get their needs met," said Mitchell.

"Through this recent emergency wildfire evacuation we learned a few things. We realized there are no other lift buses for hire in Edson and surrounding area. Our ability to provide lift

services for Edson and Yellowhead County residents with mobility issues has been an essential service," said Mitchell.

"Securing safe, affordable transportation is a very real challenge that many Edson and Yellowhead County residents face. This challenge intensifies for them when mobility issues are at play during an emergency situation. We were glad we could help ease some of the stress during this very trying time. I am just so proud of the services we offer and the spirit and integrity with which we offer those services," said Mitchell.

'With this wildfire people did what they do best, and that is come together and help each other. When Parkland Lodge Administrator Greg Pasychny called to ask if he could put the lift buses on alert to get the seniors out, I said absolutely, and they became a priority —this was around 5:30pm on May 5," explained Mitchell.

"The drivers had already been shuttling evacuees from neighbouring communities around to pick up items they needed. I call my drivers to see who can help out. I no more than hang up and I get a call from [Edson] Counsellor Gean Chouinard asking if we needed his help driving bus as he had his license. That man came down and volunteered his time. All my drivers came together to do what needed to be done with very little sleep," added Mitchell. "I also have to give credit to the ESTS Board, who always wants to go above and beyond."

A local resident's wildfire encounter

The wildfires so far this season have been unprecedented in the Edson Forest Area with many fires burning at the same time across the region.

Yellowhead County resident Karen Whitnack Ahlskog spoke with the Weekly Anchor on May 22 about her recent wildfire encounter on May 19, just south of the Beaver Meadow Hall.

"We knew the fire was coming and we were getting prepared. Pat Van Koughnett had gone to help our neighbour move a couple of horses to safety. My grandson Brycen and I had gone into Edson to pick up a few groceries and his graduation suit for his big day next weekend," began Ahlskog.

"Meanwhile, Pat received a call from a neighbour saying he thought our place as gone. Pat immediately called to inform me that our house was on fire. We were so worried about our pets. After Pat was able to get back home, he called me back saying no, the house was not on fire it was still standing," explained Ahlskog.

"By the time I was able to make it home after being rerouted due to smoke and fire, locals had the fire extinguished and under control. The fire went through so fast. We knew the day before they were predicting the winds to change in our direction, so we knew we were in danger. I just didn't realize how fast it was

coming. I got a call from my other neighbour letting me know they had our dog. I just didn't know which dog, as we have two plus a cat. My grandson and I were worried about the other pets, and Pat, as we knew he was back at the house. It's hard to put into words all the emotions a person goes through," said Ahlskog.

"I'm overwhelmed, thankful beyond words, and humbled and amazed that we still have a home. We had firemen here putting sprinklers on our house about 11:30 a.m. and by 1:30 p.m. the fire was ravaging our place. It even burnt the pump that was supplying the sprinklers. Everyone thought our house was gone. When they realized it wasn't, they all jumped in to help save it," continued Ahlskog.

"The work of our neighbors coming together to help with the fire was truly incredible. Total strangers coming to help wherever they could. All the firefighters that have been working on the fires, some from the States, B.C., Calgary, and Red Deer—it didn't matter what time I looked out my window, even at 3:00am, there was someone on fire patrol checking for hot spots," said Ahlskog.

"My most emotional moment through it all was on Friday night when five young firefighters from B.C. came to check on things. The one young guy said to me, "You know, when I realized you still had a house I cried. It's my birthday today and couldn't have gotten a better

birthday present," Ahlskog said. "I started to cry too."

"All of our neighbours are totally astonished we didn't lose the house. It isn't about our homes or houses, it's about neighbours, livelihoods, and all the stock they have

—hundreds and hundreds of cows—they aren't just going to walk away and leave them behind. Some neighbours had to leave because of health issues, which is understandable. The rest stayed behind to fight the fires head on to save their livelihoods,"said Ahlskog.

"Some RCMP were given [#*+*] jobs, having to tell people they couldn't go home. That couldn't have made them feel very good, but it was

a job they were told had to be done. We all understand that, we know it's an evacuation order, and we know they are stretched thin," said Ahlskog.

"The community had a meeting with Martin Long the night before telling him something needs to change, this can never happen again to this extreme. I have to give Long credit, he came into a pretty hostile environment with a lot of frustrated people. Not to point fingers or put blame, because I think everyone is trying their best. But if not for locals staying behind when given the evacuation notice, more homes and livelihoods would have been lost," said Ahlskog.

Positive outcomes shared regarding Reflections and Shelter Pods

Reflections 'Empowering People to Succeed' is a non-profit society for adults. Reflections' main purpose is to act as an adult drop in centre assisting individuals in daily living to achieve more fulfilled lives.

Michele Hickie, Reflections' Nutrition Activity Coordinator, said, "Our nutrition program is a community funded program that provides members with nutritious meals and information about how to make healthy choices. We offer a safe place for socialization with our clientele. Individuals can come and hang out, meet others, freshen up with free showers, do laundry, and relax over conversations and coffee."

"We have five pods that occupy one person each per night. The person who is assigned the pod is responsible for it that night. Some mornings when a staff member goes to ensure everyone is checking out with all their belong-

ings, they have found up to five or six people in there. Depending on the night, some will allow others to come in and warm up or have a place to sleep. The pass codes for the pod doors are changed daily. If there was ever a concern or issue the combination on the door can be changed remotely right away. Individuals are held responsible for keeping it clean, not only inside, but outside around the pods as well," said Hickie. If clients do not follow through with any of the rules they can lose privileges for a certain amount of time. "If we feel they are in a better place we will give them another chance to prove themselves."

"We do have security there. Security knows who is on the list to be allowed to stay and who isn't allowed. If that individual doesn't listen the local RCMP are notified right away," said Hickie. "Once Reflections is closed for the day, we will hand out the code to those

individuals that will be spending the night. That way they don't have to linger around waiting for the pods to open."

"We offer breakfast first thing in the morning here at Reflections. Thanks to some community donations we can offer different items that have been donated such as waffles, cereal, canned fruit or boiled eggs to help kick start their mornings. Lunch is offered on Mondays, Fridays, and Saturdays then a supper on Wednesday nights," said Michele.

A Reflections client

stated, "I believe the pods have been a positive impact on my life, the same as Reflections. Both have offered me the support to help get back on my feet. I came to Edson from B.C. to work years ago. Things didn't pan out the way I thought they would. Working long hours and trying to keep going, I turned to drugs then alcohol. Both seemed to take control over my body. Before I even realized I was falling apart, the economy dropped and I was out of work. I started going to Reflections to shower as I was camping. Soon I was dropping by a lot more. I found nice people and a good place to be. They helped to point me in the right direction. There was always someone to talk to, whether it was staff or another person going through a difficult time. It was 100% positive. I'm now working part time and help out here as much as I can."

"I know a few others that used to stay in the pods and have managed to get a place of their own again. So there are positive stories out there because of the pods and because of Reflections," the client added.

Reflections currently has between 20-30 people that are homeless and another 12-20 individuals that like a place to go just to socialize and feel welcome.

Resilience Project Gala set for June 4

The Edson Resilience Project enters its final steps. Throughout 2023, the Town of Edson has been putting together a multifaceted project to celebrate resilience in our community.

In early 2022 The town of Edson applied for a grant from Commemorate Canada and Heritage Canada. The grant is designed to help build a sense of pride and belonging to Canada and support the revival of local economies after the pandemic. After receiving the grant, the Town of Edson, and CANOE (Culture and Arts Network of Edson) banded together to create the Resilience Project.

The Project has three parts. The first part was the creation of multiple murals around the downtown core. There are now five finished murals. The one on the side of Switzer's Drugs was finished first, followed by the Edson Legion, the Heart of Edson Gallery, Timberjack Home Hardware, and Henry Family Vision Care. These murals were all painted by local Edson and area artists. The Timberjack mural was painted with added assistance from local community members.

The Town of Edson is also creating a commem-

orative book and a documentary featuring residents of Edson and Yellowhead County who exemplify what it means to be resilient. Both of these projects are being created by local businesses.

The finished book, photographs, and the documentary will be presented at the Resilience Project Gala on June 4 at the Edson Legion with doors open at 6:30pm. "Its a chance for everybody to get together and celebrate our resilience," said Diana Inscho, Community Development Coordinator with the

Town of Edson and member of CANOE.

The premier gala was originally planned for May 13 but had to be postponed due to the wildfires. "At this time it's quite poignant that we are looking at resilience and hope. Hopefully, this also inspires us coming out of this current disaster," said Inscho. "Life can sometimes be uncertain, so we're highlighting just how strong we are as a community."

The Gala will be free to attend, just RSVP with the Town of Edson at edson.ca/CANOE to reserve your ticket.



The age requirement is 65 and above, however, additional tickets may be acquired for accompanying persons.



Totem Poles near Lions Park Hall taken down

For those wondering why the totem poles that stood in front of the Lions Park Hall were removed on May 19, Arden Lohner, Vice President with the Lions Club of Edson, said, "The reasoning for the removal of was due to the poles being quite rotten and becoming a safety concern. No amount of money would have prevented the inevitable."

"Totem poles are not native to this area. I have been told they were carved by a German fellow here in Edson and that they make no sense to anyone who can read poles," added Lohner.

While they offered a popular spot for tourists to stop and get a photograph, the Lions Club felt they now could be considered an inappropriate copy of aboriginal art culture. "We are hoping in time to put something more appropriate in their place," said Lohner.

The Weekly Anchor spoke with Indigenous Elder Gauchier, in regards to the totem poles coming down to see how Aboriginal people may feel. "My understanding is they were built in 1967 by a German man, but I'm not sure what his name was. Totem poles aren't as common in Alberta, but you find them in B.C. I always liked the totem poles and I wished somehow they could have been saved, but I was told it would cost too much to repair."

The Weekly Anchor reached out to the Galloway Museum to find some more answers. Staff at museum and archive looked back into the records. What they discovered was that Helmut Schmidt originally from Germany created the poles for Canada's Centennial back in 1967.

This reporter recognized the name of Barbie Brown as Schmidt's granddaughter. "My grandpa was originally from Germany but was very drawn to Aboriginal Art," said Brown. "Some of his paintings were done on wooden panels and hung on the walls of the auditorium at Central School. When he passed away in 1976 the school honoured him with a plaque and presented my grandma and mom with a certificate in his memory calling him the Gentle Artist."

Barbie Brown is well known in

the community for her paintings, so we asked her if she learned how to draw from her grandpa. "Sadly, I was only nine years old when he passed away, but I definitely inherited his artistic talent."

"It's kind of sad knowing the poles are no longer standing, but I know they were in bad shape. I actually painted a picture of them when I was in the Art Club so I have that hanging in my house," Brown added.





NEW! Busing Distance Eligibility Update for September 2023

In April 2023, the Alberta Government approved changes to the distance eligibility for transportation service effective for September 2024.

• The eligible transportation distance criteria of 2.4 kms from the student's primary residence to the school will be reduced. **New** distance criteria for eligible service is:

1.0 km or more for children in kindergarten and students in Grades 1-6; and,2.0 kms or more for students in Grades 7-12 will qualify for transportation service.

As a phased approach to implementing the new service criteria, Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is moving to implement the changes for September 2023.

Families who qualify for eligible service under the new distance criteria are invited to register for busing as soon as possible.

The Division will try to accommodate as many newly eligible riders as possible. Registrations received after June 30, 2023, are subject to seat availability.

FEE-BASED SERVICES: INELIGIBLE AND ALTERNATE (SECOND) SEAT REQUESTS FOR SEPTEMBER 2023

Requests for ineligible bus service should also register by the June 30 deadline; however, please note that eligible students will have priority on all routes.

Based on increased eligible riders, ineligible riders may not receive confirmation of a seat until after September 30, 2023. Additionally, requests for alternate (second) seats on other bus routes may not be confirmed until after September 30, 2023.

The Division is currently looking to recruit and train new bus drivers in anticipation of increases to eligible student ridership once the mandatory service requirement comes into effect in 2024. Please visit the **Careers** page on the Division's website at www.gypsd.ca/working-at-gypsd.





County gives extra month to pay taxes in light of spring wildfires

They were the lowest bidder, were found to be fully compliant, and best satisfied all the terms and conditions of the tender documents.

2023 Final Budget -Yellowhead County adopted the 2023 Final

Budget in the amount of the 2023 Taxation Year. \$180,322,089.00. The 2023 Interim Budget had planned a 2% increase for the municipal mill rate, however after seeing the overall assessment Yellowhead County will have a 0% increase in the mill rate instead.

Bylaw 01.23 – Bylaw to Authorize Rates of Taxation for the 2023 Taxation Year


1. Council provided first, second, and third readings to Bylaw 01.23, authorizing Rates of Taxation for


