which reflect recent events won't be available until early in the new year," said Zahara.

"Historically crime is cyclical, when certain repeat offenders are in jail, crime is down and when they are out, it goes up," said Mayor Zahara, "Property crime is often driven by addictions and/or mental health issues and as such we continue to lobby the government for more addictions and mental health treatment supports in our region. We also continue to call on the Federal Government for tougher sentences for repeat offenders."

There has been a noted increase in visibility regarding the homeless population in the community. With the Out of the Cold shelter a recent topic of conversation at Town Council's committee of the whole meeting some citizens have taken to social media platforms to specify concerns surrounding the Shelter Pods and at the Edson Recycling Centre.

From June 1st to November 16th RCMP received 3429 calls for service. There have been 12 calls for service to the Shelter Pods since its opening in June with the majority of those being for well-being checks or disturbances between the people using the pods.

According to Edson RCMP S/Sgt Delisle three of those calls resulted in unwanted males being removed by the RCMP.

Once a citizen reported hearing yelling at the pods, however, police were unable to confirm or find anyone in distress when they arrived.

There were two calls for a well-being check in response to a female yelling. Police responded and were able to confirm with the female that she was safe/unharmed on both occasions.

One call resulted in a male being transported to hospital as he was discovered passed out.

Twice the RCMP responded to a call regarding a couple fighting at the pods and intervened both times.

An altercation between two males resulted in a call to RCMP but police assistance was declined.

One citizen, who was at the recycling centre, called RCMP as a homeless male attempted to get in the citizen's vehicle. The suspect was not located.

Other calls to the nearby area in recent months have included one mid-afternoon call to put out a bon fire which was lit by two females by the road. The Recycling Centre was broken into and the Take it or Leave It building was set on fire during this same time period.

RCMP were advised people were sleeping in the flower beds, garbage was being left, and some Provincial building employees were scared to go to work due to the homeless people on the property. The request was made for police to patrol the area each morning.

In addition to patrols in the vicinity of the Provincial building and Recycling centre, RCMP have increased patrols in residential neighborhoods in the last few weeks.

Detachment Commander S/Sgt Christian Delisle is scheduled to host Town Hall public information session at the Friendship Centre on November 24 to provide up to date stats, discuss strategies, and answer questions from the community. If possible, the Town of Edson is hoping to stream the event live for those who are unable to attend in person, wish to avoid a crowd, or prefer to view the event from the comfort of their own home.



# **STARS** requests funding from Yellowhead County

At their November 16 Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting, Yellowhead County Council heard a presentation from the STARS Foundation. Glenda Farnden (Senior Municipal Relations Liaison) and Jon Gogan (STARS Pilot and Provincial Director for Central and Northern Alberta) presented on behalf of the organization

Farnden opened the presentation with STARS' response to the pandemic. "We are all well aware of COVID times now. It's been upon us for quite a long time, and so STARS' number one priority has been to maintain uninterrupted operations," she explained, noting that there has been a "significant increase in mission rate."

Farnden said that STARS remains under strict protocols, and that approximately 1 in 5 (about 23%) of their current missions involve COVID-related cases. "We only carry very, very sick, very ill patients. You know, intubated patients, that type of thing," Farnden said.

STARS Transport Physicians are also continuing to assist rural communities and rural doctors with critical care guidance, airway management, and ventilation/resuscitation procedures.

COVID has also had a significant impact on STARS' funding. With restrictions and safety in mind, they have had to cancel many of their fundraising events. 20% of their funding comes from the Alberta government, however the remaining 80% relies on fundraising.

"It forced us to think outside of the box, and to be proactive in our actions so that we could do things to also support our mission. And so we identified efficiencies, operational and fundraising, as well as we suffered the heartache of having to downsize staff members in affected areas, like events," Farnden explained.

The STARS Lottery continues to be their single-largest funding source. "We did go ahead with the 2021 lottery," Farnden said, "And

Albertans continued to stand by our side as that lottery did sell out, providing very much needed funds, especially with these extra missions that were happening." The 2022 Lottery will launch in January.

The STARS Calendar Campaign has unfortunately "suffered significantly" because of the organization's "inability to travel and have a presence within rural communities." In response, they decided to reach out to municipal partners, and this year the calendar will be for sale in "a lot of town offices across the entire province."

STARS also did what many other organizations have done throughout the pandemic and shifted to safe, online fundraising events like online 50/50s and raffles in place of their normal events that could not be held.

Farnden also detailed the Emergency Link Centre (ELC) that STARS operates. The ELC provides a 24/7 immediate safety network with live access to all available resources. The ELC utilizes GIS mapping and works to determine and then dispatch the appropriate level of response for a situation. The ELC receives over 31,000 emergency requests every year.

STARS is working on a pilot project with Transport Physicians to help provide "critical care everywhere and anywhere," said Gogan. The project involves having STARS Transport Physicians in the ELC in Calgary 24 hours a day. The project started out with one day a week but has expanded to three days, and while it was supposed to end in September it has now been extended until April of 2022.

"It's likely going to be the new model as we move into being able to support both rural and urban communities right across Western Canada with a STARS Physician in real-time," Gogan explained. "Our STARS Transport Docs are always with us via satellite or cell phone and are able to communicate with the team on board the aircraft. This is kind of the next evolution where they're actually in real-time.'

"The new helicopters that we're getting... are completely Wi-Fi capable and all of the equipment on board the back of the helicopter is actually able to be sent to the Link Centre or to an iPad at the doctor's home where they can see in real-time what's going on, including body camera information," Gogan continued.

"So this is the evolution that we're trying for this year and while these doctors are at the link centre and kind of with their pulse on what's going on in realtime, they're able to call ahead to the hospitals, arrange cath labs, arrange direct transport to OR instead of going to the emergency room, and just help to be a source of that patient's journey to be as efficient as possible," Gogan said. "We've had tremendous success and the Ministry [of Health] has recognized that as such. A way to the future for us for sure."

Yellowhead County averages 35-36 missions per year, representing an approximate \$250,000 service value annually. Approximately 50% of these missions are scene calls and 50% are interfacility transfers. Yellowhead County is served by the bases in Edmonton and Grande Prairie.

From 2017-2021, the County has received STARS assistance 178 times with the following breakdown: 2017- 36 missions, 2018- 41 missions, 2019- 28 missions, 2020- 29 missions, 2021- 44 missions (so far).

When including bordering neighbor municipalities (in which incidents have sometimes included County residents), 1107 missions have been flown between 2017 and October 31, 2021.

Farnden went on to explain the importance of financial support from municipalities, with some municipalities choosing to invest with a per capita dollar amount on a multi-year pledge, and others (including the Towns of Edson and Hinton) include a fixed dollar amount within their Protective Services budget.

"We have municipalities that have committed up to \$210,000 per year,

recognizing the value of what STARS brings for their residents," Farnden said, noting that municipal funding is currently contributing over \$2 million per year. "That is sustainable operational funding that we can rely on each year."


The presentation concluded with a request for the County to "join your municipal neighbors" in supporting the foundation. She noted that since their inception in 1985, more than 45,000 STARS missions have been flown, at no cost to the patient.

"A life is saved every day. Partnerships make this possible," Farnden said. "Help us to continue to, for the future of our children, our grandchildren, to continue to have this type of service available to them."

Members of Council asked some questions of the presenters regarding funding processes, procedures, their affiliation with Alberta Health Services as well as the Ministry of Health, and

After the questionand-answer period, Mayor Wade Williams thanked the pair for their presentation. "Obviously everybody here is well aware of the good work that STARS does and I don't think there's probably anybody at this table that STARS has not affected in one way or another with a loved one," he said.

Williams also noted that Council will have discussions at a later date regarding the funding request and will get back to STARS with a decision.



With vitriol and extremism at an all time high, a new US survey by SSRS states that 75% of adults, including frequent users of the site, believe Facebook makes society worse.

The impact of online abuse is devastating for anyone, with one in four experiencing mental health challenges and worse as a result of the harassment.

Even journalists, including small town journalists like us, have borne the brunt of this animus.

The first-ever Canadian survey of online harassment against journalists and media professionals shows that attacks are on the rise and having serious repercussions on both individuals and the industry as a

The results of an Ipsos survey of journalists revealed that:

- · Harassment is prevalent and pervasive — 72% experienced some form of harassment in the past year.
- · Harassment online is most common — 65% experienced harassment online. One in five experience online harassment weekly or more frequently.


forms of harassment are sexualized messages or images, physical threats, comments related to gender identity and ethnicity or nationality, and use of people's names or images without their permission.

· Harassment includes death threats — Just over one in ten of those who have experienced online harassment have received a death threat in the course of their work; nearly as many received threats against their family, were threatened with blackmail, or were threatened with rape or sexual assault.

· Women, BIPOC and LGBTQ2+ people are at greater risk — They face disproportionately more online harassment than others, as well as greater severity of harassment. LGBTQ2+ respondents report the highest prevalence of online harm of any group — 78% in the past year (compared to 65% for all respondents).

One of the sad consequences is that one in three journalists have considered leaving the media industry in the last 12 months.

Losing the voices of these trusted, professional Canadian journalists would not only be bad for democracy, it would create an even bigger vacuum for the unchecked, rampant spread of even more misinformation.

## **County Sand/Salt Storage Buildings tenders come in high**

At their November 9 Council Meeting, Yellowhead County Council considered awarding a tender for the construction of new salt and sand storage

After recognizing the need for new buildings, the County applied for and received a Sustainability Grant from the Alberta Government in 2020. The had originally hoped. grant, which would be used for the construction of new sand and storage buildings in Edson and Wildwood, was for the amount of \$1.2 million.

At the time, based on the Architect's estimate for the project, the County budgeted \$1.2 million in their 2021 budget, for a total estimated project cost of \$2.4 million.

The County received six tenders by their due date of October 8, 2021. The lowest tender was \$3,097,700 from PCL Construction. The other five tenders they'd be very similar," he said. were from Makloc (\$3,363,722), Milbrandt (\$3,400,000), Align Builders (\$3,445,520), Brenex (\$3,447,976) and HWD Construction (\$4,709,300).

The tender submitted by PCL Construction did meet all tender requirements, however the cost was much higher than the County's original estimates. Instead of the \$1.2 million they had budgeted, they would need approximately \$2.3 million instead for a total project cost of about \$3.5 million (including engineering and site work).

County Director of Infrastructure and Planning Services Don O'Quinn said that the increase in cost was likely due to the amount of work available, supply chain issues, and rising costs of materials, namely steel.

Administration recommended to Council that they reject all tenders and also given the option to award the tender to PCL Construction, and take the additional funds from the Transportation Reserve.

Councillor Dawn Mitchell moved Administration's recommendation to grant, such as when it has to be used by and if it could be used towards another facilities in Edson and Wildwood.

O'Quinn explained that they likely have a two-year time frame with the grant, and that if they wanted to use it for another project they would have to complete a new application. He also explained that, if Council were to reject the tenders, Administration would be looking into using materials other than steel and building the storage facilities at a "lesser standard" than what they

Councillor Penny Lowe weighed in. "The difference in the amount just floors me, that's ridiculous. Was there not one structure that was in worse shape than the other?" she asked.

O'Quinn explained that both buildings were constructed at the same time, and that size and capacity were big factors. "We've outgrown the one in Edson considerably from when we built the two storage facilities, but condition wise

Councillors Shawn Berry and Patrick Soroka asked if it would be possible to add on to the current buildings as opposed to building new.

O'Quinn said that the last inspection reports that they have give the buildings a three to four year life expectancy. "Those are some of the options we'd be looking at exploring. Adding to the existing structure, where it only has a certain life expectancy, probably wouldn't be a great idea. It would need to be replaced in some fashion or other," he explained.

Councillor Lowe said, "By no means do I want to, myself personally, be adding on to these buildings. If it's a safety feature for our employees, those buildings need to come down."

Before calling for a vote, Mayor Wade Williams shared his thoughts. "The direct Administration to explore other options for the buildings. They were cost of these buildings come in extremely high compared to what we had budgeted so to move ahead and to look at other options is definitely what I would favor," he said.

Council voted unanimously to reject all tenders and direct Administration to reject all tenders. Councillor Anthony Giezen asked for more details on the look into other options for the needed replacement of the sand and salt storage



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

Once the burn is complete, ensure it's fully extinguished by soaking it, stirring it and soaking it again until the ashes are cool to the touch. You must return to your burn site multiple times until you are sure that it's out. Fires that aren't properly extinguished can come back as wildfires weeks and sometimes months later.

Following all precautions plays an important role in reducing humancaused wildfires. This season, there were 171 wildfires in the Edson Forest Area and 119 of them were human-caused, representing 69 percent.

of 52,955 ha burnt this season.

On average, the total number of human-caused

wildfires in Alberta has been declining in the past five years, highlighting the importance of continued prevention work.
