Repair and replacement of portable radios and batteries. And replacement of Duty 1 command and control vehicle.

"There is other gear that's being replaced. We lost hoses, we lost axes, we lost different equipment, some of them burnt up, some of them washed away in the floods. But these are the ones that are affecting day to day operations," said Bahri.

The financial request for the repair and replacement of the equipment totalled \$553,334.45.

Chief Administrative Officer Luc Mercier explained, "As a CAO who's somewhat new to the community, I came here with the expectation that we would have been the Taj Mahal of fire services and we would have had too much equipment for what we needed. I went through with GM Albert Bahri about two, three months in and realized the thought process behind the equipment levels that Yellowhead County has was very thorough, very thought out. There was no extras just because we wanted a nice shiny truck or this or that. It was functional and especially how they work together. I

give credit to Albert Bahri and the previous councils for those decisions and how it was done."

Councillor Shawn Barry said, "When I look at the total number of doing all of this, it has to be done in my mind. It's not a very big total of a little over \$500,000 and I think that's well spent money based on the services this equipment rendered here in the fires. Thank you."

Mayor Wade Williams said, "We have a fire season coming up very, very shortly. It's going to be upon us before we know it. These requests that are in front of us today are emergent and in my opinion need to be done, so I will support the motion."

Councillor Penny Lowe said, "I just want to make it clear to a lot of people that having all the equipment in the world is wonderful. But if you've got no one to run that equipment, you have nothing. I think this council, previous councils, and Albert Bahri have done a very good job setting up the municipality's ability to fight fires. But we can't do it without the people to run the equipment."

Councillor David Russell added, "People that chose to badmouth our firefighters and all of our responders that were out there doing their best to try and save our residents and our residents' properties, we are now seeing a significant reduction in volunteer firefighters. So next spring, it's entirely conceivable we may have fire trucks parked with no one to get in and drive them. Constructive criticism is always welcome. But foul-mouthed criticism of people who are out there trying to save your bacon is not welcome and now we're paying the price for it. Thank you."

Council approved the unbudgeted repair and replacement of the bodies on SSV-1,2,3, pumps 45,50,55,60,65,75, and replacement of YCF-66 (Duty 1) at a total cost of \$367,632 from the Equipment Replacement Protective Services reserves. Council also approved the unbudgeted repair and replacement of portable radios and batteries at a total cost of \$185,702.45 from the Equipment Replacement Communications System Reserve

New Fire Station in Niton moves ahead

During the Yellowhead County Council meeting on September 26, Council discussed plans for the new Fire Station in Niton.

In the 2023 budget, Council approved the replacement of the aging Niton Fire Station with a newly constructed building. The current building is at it's end of life.

Requests for the design, tendering, and project management were released in January of 2023. The 'Request For Quotes' was issued to several architectural firms.

BR2 Architecture was the successful proponent at a cost of \$73,920. "BR2 Architecture will proceed with design of the new station and all applicable design and permitting requirements. County Fire staff reviewed the design and noted it met all requirements. BR2 Architecture then proceeded to the tendering process," stated General Manager of Protective Services Albert Bahri.

"The request was posted on APC, in local papers, and the County website meting all requirements for advertising, said Bahri.

Niton Fire Station replacement project budget was estimated at \$1,634,840 including 10 percent contingency, design costs, construction, and demolition.

Six tenders were received two being from the same company: Vantage Builders at \$2,024,000; Whiston Contracting at \$2,546,200; Jen-Col's first submitted bid was 5,000,000 and their second



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submitted bid was \$2,981,735; Johnston Builders at \$3,067,177, and Bird Construction at \$3,391,000.

The tender from Vantage Builders of \$2,024,000 plus fixed design costs and 10 percent contingency comes to a total of \$2,307,690 an overage of \$672,850.

"Although Vantage was low bidder their cost exceeds the project budget of \$1,634,840. There were no local contractors that tendered. Although the tenders are all over budget the Architectural Consultant advises that the cost for this project will continue to increase over the next several years, and recommends that the project move forward to save additional cost increases.," said Bahri.

Councillor David Russell stated, "I'm a little concerned that perhaps this isn't going far enough. Given what we've gone through this year as far as fires. Will this station suit the needs of our firefighters and our Administration looking into the future? Because, as you say, and as our architect recommended, costs are only going to go up. So should we be looking at spending a little bit more money and building a station that looks to the future?

Bahri replied, "The fire station that's been proposed for Niton will meet and exceed any needs of that community in the following years. Where the community goes, nobody knows, but we built-in functionality. So we've got a very functional fire station that can house a day crew, if we need to do that. You could have somebody at night depending on the shifts. It's large enough for expansion. The old station has two bays, the new building has two bays. It has decontamination and a shower. So we've built it to the specifications that we built our other buildings, to be well suited for that community."

Councillor Shawn Berry said, "I think this is a great project to move ahead with, and I look forward

to improving other old buildings."

Mayor Wade Williams added, "I would just like to say that it's nice to see a few different bidders. Honestly, over the last couple of years, any of these tenders that are coming in just shocked me. I can't believe how much the costs have gone up, and I don't understand the justification of it. We do have quite a number of bidders here, which is good. And we are looking at a functional building that is good for the community, and for those reasons, I would support this."

Council passed the motion to accept the tender from Vantage Builders of 2,024,000, which is over the approved 2023 budget amount of \$1,634,840; and that Council also approves the unbudgeted addition of \$672,850 from the Facilities Replacement Reserve to the Niton Fire Station project to allow a new Fire Station to be constructed.

HIGHLIGHTS:

Letter of Support – Council approved a letter of support for Novus Earth Energy Operation's Latitude 53 project. Latitude 53 is a proposed geothermal facility in Yellowhead County.

Public Library Request for Funding – A request for \$378,000 towards the Edson & District Public Library renovations will be included in the upcoming 2024 budget discussions. This amount is in addition to funds previously committed by Yellowhead County towards the project.

Grand Trunk School Facility Usage – Council did not approve funding assistance of \$5,000 to the Grande Yellowhead Public School Division (GYPSD) towards rental costs of the Pembina Rec-Plex. GYPSD is looking for locations and financial support for Grand Trunk High School physical education classes while their school is being renovated. The Pembina Agricultural and Recreation Society (PARS) will continue to work with the school to help meet their needs.

Public Access Policy – Council will look at options to amend the County's Road Allowance Policy (3200.04) at a future council meeting to provide road plan adjacent property owners options for their land while still allowing road plans to remain accessible to the public under a set of prescribed criteria.

Local vetrans receive Quilts of Valour-Canada

Diane Cole with Quilts of Valour Canada was at the Edson Royal Canadian Legion Branch 51 on September 23 to present some quilts to members of the military.

Cole said, "It gives me great honour to present these seven quilts here today. Quilts of Valour Canada started back in 2006. In Afghanistan there was a military incident where some military personnel perished, but three members were medevacked to Edmonton for treatment and recovery."

"There was a lady in Edmonton that was a member of the Edmonton quilt group. She always made quilts to give out to people as a warm hug, to comfort them and tell them that people care. So she made arrangements to go to the U of A hospital and give a homemade quilt to each of those three military personnel. That was the beginning of Quilts of Valour Canada," Cole explained.

"By 2009 Quilts of Valour Canada became a national organization. We have representatives from the tip of Newfoundland to Vancouver Island. And North from the Canadian border all the way into the Northwest Territories and the Yukon," said Cole.

"Quilts of Valour Canada is a volunteer based organization right from our president down to our person that puts on the labels. Each quilt is handmade, with 100% cotton products and the people who make those quilts volunteer their time, fabric, and threads. Each quilt takes between 40 and 60 hours to make. The quilts have a label stating it was handmade with love and gratitude for the sacrifice and service to Canada. To meet eligibility, Canadian Armed Forces members (veterans and serving members), regular or reserve force, must meet one of the following conditions: Have served in a combat or peacekeeping mission including theatres of war or have become ill or injured as a result of their service to Canada at home or abroad.

Only veterans who have been Honourably Discharged are eligible to receive a Quilt of Valour," said Cole.

Local members receiving Quilts of Valour Canada were Wayne Joy with 8 years of service, Wally Coes with 9 years, Kevin Costrove with 5 years, Margaret Snow with 13 years, Ed Graham with 14 years, Larry Williams with 25 years, and Eric Rawbancon with 21 years of service. Thanks to all those who have served our country.

Survivors' Flag raised in Edson to honour victims of residential schools

During the September 19 Town of Edson council meeting, a motion was made that Council authorize the raising of a Survivors' Flag.

When deemed appropriate the flag would be raised in consultation with the Edson Friendship Centre to honour important dates significant to the Indigenous people in the community.

This motion is the latest of many adjustments made as a part of the town's effort to bring Truth and Reconciliation between local government and indigenous peoples. Tanya Byers, Senior Manager of Community Services made the presentation.

In 2022, Council adopted the Town of Edson Strategic Plan 2022-2025, which included a commitment to enacting relevant Calls to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission report. The plan emphasized the need to build strong relationships with Indigenous People and organizations by working with local partners to learn of Indigenous matters, adapting Town initiatives to meet common interests, and by reviewing decisions through the lens of the Calls to Action.

On September 5, 2023 Council adopted the Land Acknowledgment Policy L-M-5, and were presented with the Survivors' Flag by Elder Frieda Maynard. The National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation states, "The Survivors' Flag is an expression of remembrance meant to honour residential school Survivors and all the lives and communities impacted by the residential school

system in Canada. Each element depicted on the flag was carefully selected by Survivors from across Canada, who were consulted in the flag's creation."

In consultation with the Edson Friendship Centre, it was determined flying the Survivors' Flag from September 20 to October 1 would be appropriate this fall. They also recommend fluidity in this matter "To be cognizant of the ongoing discovery of our buried children and that there may be future discoveries that may spur us to raise the flag again. In addition to that, we also have local survivors that may need to be honoured in bereavement."

Councillor Greg Pasychny, asked for clarification on what times would be deemed appropriate. Would it just be the month of September? Byers answered that the consultation recommends fluidity based on the ongoing and changing nature of the situation. "And so for this year, just for this fall we would raise it tomorrow [September 20] and leave it up until the end of the month. But I would expect that next September we would raise it up for the full month."

Councillor Peter Taylor, "I appreciate the fluidity because things change and we don't know when issues might arise. The continual discovery of unmarked graves and these sorts of things has to give us that flexibility, so it's not coming back to council every single time we want to put up that flag."

With no more questions the motion was put up for vote. It was then carried unanimously by council.

Edson Food Bank extends hours due to increased need

The Edson Food Bank has extended their hours to try and accommodate those in need.

Amy Pillage, the Program Coordinator for the Edson Food Bank Society, said, "We recently helped 212 people in just one week. That included 86 children and handing out 94 hampers. That's close to double what we usually see. We've decided to expand our hours to help alleviate the bottleneck that seemed to happen on Thursday evenings."

"Our hope is that by being open every Thursday evening from 6:45 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. as well as every Tuesday morning, we'll be able to better plan and meet the needs of the community," said Pillage.

"With the new hours, we're reaching out to our incredible volunteer base to fill those extra roles. The response has been incredible so it should be a seamless transition for us all," Pillage said. "Also new, we are seeing an increase in the amount of reclamation donations from our local Walmart store. This up-tick has helped us immensely during this busy snap we're experiencing. The increase in reclaim has allowed us to keep our shelves fuller for longer."






The Town of Edson plans many events for families, but now they are trying to provide opportunities for an older demographic. "We're trying a few different things like that this year,"



Left crushed by her loss, but relieved that her suffering has ended are her dear husband, partner in crime, and caregiver, Roy, her daughters Natasha (Dwayne) and Anna (Darryl); her stepchildren Becky (Greg,

daughters Sarah and Caitlin) and David (son Tyrone); her sister Jennifer (sons Mark and Mike); her sister-in-law Susan (daughters Lauren and Traci); and many beloved family members and friends. Beverley was predeceased by her parents, Arthur and Joy Rae, and her brother David.

Beverley was born on October 22, 1948, in Paterson, New Jersey. When she was young, the family moved to Font Hill, Ontario. They relocated to Scotland after Beverley finished high school, and she completed her teacher training at the University of Aberdeen. Beverley spent 2 years in Ghana, Africa, as a volunteer instructor at a teaching college. This experience changed her, and she cherished the memories and knowledge she collected during her time there. After returning to Canada, Beverley completed a Master's Degree in Counseling. Later she worked for the Hudson Bay Company as a staff trainer, and supported the opening of a number of stores, including the West Edmonton Mall location. The couple bought and moved to a farm, where they laughed, grew, played, and worked together for twenty years as they raised their daughters. New survey spotlights Canadians' perspectives on Bill C-18

Leger has released some interesting results coming from its latest survey that asked Canadians about their perceptions of Bill C-18 and its implications on their news consumption habits.

Overall, the findings show that awareness of Bill C-18 is high among Canadians, with about three-quarters of Canadians being aware of the legislation. Also, nearly half of Canadians (47%) have seen changes in their online feed since Meta blocked news content. This proportion is higher among respondents who mainly get their news via social media (59%)

In response to the Canadian government's Online News Act (C-18), Meta blocked links to all Canadian news outlets.

Facebook and Instagram pages for small town newspapers all the way up to the big metro papers and media outlets have been blocked.

Meta's actions are an attempt to inflict maximum damage on the industry, rather than paying their fair share for profiting from news stories created and paid for by the Canadian news media.

At its core Facebook is an advertising company. It profits from selling advertising beside the free content written and posted by its users (you).

Apparently, Meta believes this free content should extend to Canadian news created by working journalists and paid for by news outlets. Somehow, Meta feels entitled to profit from this news, without compensating the news outlet.

In response, the federal government, along with several provinces and major companies, discontinued advertising on Meta platforms.



Local news needs to be supported

Every week about 30 million newspapers are delivered across Canada. More than four out of five people in Canada read newspaper content each week. Why do they read print and digital news sources? The answer is simple:

Canadians value and trust fact-based, fact-checked journalism. Journalists hold the powerful to account. They cover city hall, the courts, and the police. They also keep communities connected by reporting on everything from the high school football team to 100th birthdays.

But real journalism, created by real journalists – rather than by artificial intelligence – costs real money. If we want to sustain it, we must support it. One of the best ways for the local community to support local journalism is to take out an ad. When you buy a newspaper ad – whether print or digital – those dollars stay in the community and allow the publisher to employ journalists. Conversely, when you buy an ad from a web

giant, those dollars flow south to California to companies that don't employ a single journalist.

One thing government can do to keep scarce advertising dollars in Canada is establish tax measures to incent businesses to advertise with private sector Canadian news outlets and bring fairness to the different tax treatment of advertising purchased from foreign websites.

Governments – municipal, provincial, and federal – also have a role to play when it comes to their own advertising spend. It makes no sense that the federal government was spending almost twice as much on Facebook/Instagram – which are now blocking news in Canada – as they were on all print publications combined. Governments – at all levels – should earmark 25 per cent of their advertising spend toward trusted Canadian news sources. And the federal government should end the 'double dip' by eliminating commercial advertising associated with CBC News, the public broadcaster.

National Newspaper Week is a time to reflect on the Champions who report the news without fear or favour, and it's a time to remember that local news needs to be supported by the community.

Parent and Child Assistance Program

Fetal alcohol spectrum disorder (FASD) and Parent-Child Assistance Program (PCAP) mentors for Edson, Yellowhead County, Hinton, and Jasper had an open house on September 12 from 12 to 2 p.m. in the Edson Provincial Building.

PCAP is for individuals in childbearing years who either have the capacity to get pregnant or have been pregnant and maybe dealing with substance use issues. Their main goal is to get individuals connected in the community to ensure they have the supports they need.

FASD/PCAP Mentors Tanya Dehmel and Natalia Callihoo were hosts during the open house. Dehmel said, "Our Open House is basically about FASD Awareness. September 9 is FASD Awareness Day, so in honour of that, we decided to do an open house where we have information to hand out to people."

"We are letting the public know what types of supports we offer for individuals with FASD, what the intake looks like, what the referral looks like, and the assessment process. As well, we are connecting with people, offering some light snacks, and letting people know we have started a new support group," said Dehmel.

They initially ran a Zoom caregiver support group which was doing well during Covid. "Now we are offering a support group for both caregivers as well as individuals over 18 with FASD, as an opportunity to come together each month with peers. We will have focused topics that they want to address and see if they can collaborate and work

around that," Dehmel added.

Callihoo is based out of Hinton and tries to do two days a week in Edson as well. She also covers the Hinton and Jasper areas.

During the open house, the two mentors engaged in conversations and ensured those that stopped by received the information they needed.

School Boys Alumni Band visits Edson

It was a great performance from the Edmonton School Boys Alumni Band on September 21 at the Edson Legion.

The band held two performances, one in the afternoon for the schools and another in the evening for the public. Despite the name, there were women playing too.

Ian McGill from Edson, who is a part of the band, said, "The Edmonton School Boys Alumni Band was formed in the 1990's. The [original] Edmonton School Boys Band was formed in the 1930's by a group of businessmen who bought instruments to keep kids off the street. They had a marching band that actually came and played in Edson in the 40's, and used to do the Stampede Parade all over the province. The band shutdown in the late 60's. Then in the 1990's a group of some of the former members got together and thought we should play music again."

"The band is now open to seniors. We practice every Thursday in Edmonton. At age 70 I'm one of the youngsters in the group. It's a group of people who range from being professional musicians all their lives to people who played in high school and didn't touch an instrument for 40 years, then pulled it out of the closet and started playing again, explained McGill.

"Tonight we have 38 members here to play. The band is usually 45 people, but some of our members are in their 90's, so to leave Edmonton at 9 a.m. and return at 11 p.m. is just too much of a day for them," McGill said.

"This afternoon we had over 300 school kids here. It went very well and the kids enjoyed it. Watching them do YMCA was fantastic. It is a rare opportunity to get a band of this size and calibre in Edson and for free," said McGill.

Yellowhead Koinonia Christian School, École Westhaven School, Vanier Community Catholic School, and Parkland School all supported the band by attending the afternoon performance.

McGill added, "We thank the Legion for donating the facility and a hot dinner for the band between our concerts. Galloway Museum donated free entrance to the museum along with

refreshments and snacks. Another group went to the Heart of Edson Gallery and Studio for a tour and they were treated to beverages and cookies. It's so nice to have these local businesses support the band."

'While I was dropping off posters to local businesses about the upcoming performance, individuals shared that they used to play in a band, or played during high school or junior high. It is my dream to start a community band here in Edson and get those people to bring their instruments out of the closet and get back to making music. Once music is a part of your life it stays with you for the rest of your life," said McGill.


