32-unit self-contained seniors' apartment building is owned by the Province of Alberta and managed by the Evergreens Foundation.

Evergreens Foundation CAO Kristen Chambers said that the fire was contained to one unit, and that the prompt response of the Edson Fire Department meant that minimal damaged was sustained by the facility.

"With heavy hearts, we regret to confirm, that the sole

occupant of the suite passed away as a result of the incident," Chambers said in a release. "The remaining 30 tenants were quickly evacuated and relocated either

Fire claims life of elderly man in Edson



A fire claimed the life of an elderly man at the Heritage Court Seniors Apartment Building in Edson. continued from front

with family or within vacant units in other Evergreens Foundation facilities in the community."

Alberta Minister of Seniors and Housing Josephine Pon also released a statement on social media. "I am saddened to hear that a senior died following the fire at the Heritage Court Seniors Apartment in Edson and I offer my condolences to family and friends," Pon wrote. "My sincere thanks to the Edson fire department for its quick response, and to the Evergreens Foundation, as well as Edson residents and businesses for pitching in late at night to help displaced residents."

Pon also assured the public that the matter is of high importance. "My ministry staff is working with the housing management body and we will continue to provide support, as appropriate. The safety and wellbeing of seniors is my top priority," she said.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara thanked the Edson Fire Department for their quick response, as well as

the staff at the Parkland Lodge and "all others who have assisted." "An incredibly difficult day for our community," Zahara said. "Our thoughts and prayers are with the family of the individual who passed away as well as to all the other residents of Heritage Court."

Chambers also expressed her gratitude. "We would like to acknowledge the incredible community of Edson, including businesses that opened up in the wee hours of the morning to provide beds for the displaced tenants, as well as bussing," she wrote. "We would also like to thank all of the first responders and The Evergreens Foundation site staff for working tirelessly to ensure the tenants were looked after."

Chambers said that the investigation into the fire is ongoing and that they do not know when tenants will be able to return to the building.

A later RCMP News Release specified that the cause of the fire does not appear to be suspicious in nature. Police also said that, while an autopsy will be completed to confirm the man's identity, his next

of kin has been notified. No further updates are anticipated.



NEWSPAPERS MATTER NOW MORE THAN EVER

Time to Act on Online Harassment

Canada's news publishers, who employ 3000 journalists from coast to coast to coast, believe that free speech, journalistic freedom, and a strong, healthy, commercially viable, and fiercely independent media ecosystem are all vital to our democracy.

Canadians rely on their newspapers and news media to be their trusted sources of information, helping them make informed choices and holding people and institutions, including governments and corporations, accountable.

We hope that Parliamentarians will come together and take meaningful action to combat hate speech and other kinds of harmful content online, while ensuring that freedom of expression and free debate are recognized, preserved, and protected.

We are among the country's leading defenders of freedom of speech. At the same time, as employers, we strive to provide a safe, healthy, and inclusive work environment for our journalists. As businesses who supply news and analysis, we also strive to protect our customers: the public who read our news and engage with us and their fellow readers. We listen to our customers. We take our responsibilities to them and the broader public seriously. We try to build a better common future for all. And we are accountable for both our actions and inaction.

As a business, the news publishing industry remains under threat from unregulated and unchecked social media and online communication service providers. At the same, our journalists and readers face online harm constantly. Ask any journalist, and they'll tell you that criticism comes with the job. And rightly so. But hate, harassment, and online and physical harm shouldn't. It comes from the right, the left, and everywhere in between, and its victims are all too often women and racialized journalists.

We are united in supporting our journalists and newsrooms against those who seek to silence them and threaten their safety. Together, we will continue to advocate for industry-wide responses to end this behaviour.

Across the globe, journalists face physical, judicial, and online harm. In addition to harassment from individuals, journalists face sophisticated defamation campaigns to discredit them. These threats, and their potential impact on journalistic freedom of expression, have detrimental implications for society at large.

The findings of a survey conducted by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the International Center for Journalists about online violence against women journalists are alarming: 73 per cent of women respondents said they had experienced online violence; 20 per cent said they had been attacked or abused offline in incidents seeded online; and 41 per cent said they had been the targets of online attacks that appeared to be linked to orchestrated disinformation campaigns.

The impact of this violence on mental health is sobering: 38 per cent missed work; 11 per cent quit their jobs; and two per cent abandoned journalism altogether. It also impacts journalistic practices and audience engagement: 30 per cent self-censor on social media; 20 per cent only 'broadcast' and avoid all interaction; and 10 per cent avoid pursuing particular stories.

Like news publishers, online platforms curate content. They reap all the benefits of being a publisher, albeit on much more commercially favourable terms. At present, however, they do not have the same responsibilities and are not held accountable in the many ways that news publishers are in Canada. Indeed, they have allowed fake news and disinformation to proliferate around the globe, and they have profited from it handsomely.

Big Tech has a societal obligation to moderate these activities, just as any news publisher does. In the United States, section 230 of the U.S. Communications Decency Act exempts them from liability over hosting user-generated content and from liability when they choose to remove that content. However, global companies operating in Canada are subject to Canadian law and should conduct themselves accordingly.

As advertisers know, these firms have enormous and extremely sophisticated technical prowess. Why then have they failed in their duty as content moderators and allowed harmful content targeted at journalists to be amplified on their platforms?

As a matter of principle, our journalists should be afforded the same protections in the online world as they are in the offline world. Accordingly, we recommend that the Government of Canada explicitly recognize online threats to journalists directly in legislation. At the same time, online platforms should act responsibly. First, they should act upon reports of harassment from news publishers and journalists within 24 hours. Second, they should invest in technology to detect online hate against journalists. Third, they should detail online harm against journalists in their transparency reports. Fourth, they should be held accountable through Canada's libel, defamation, and hate laws, just as Canada's news publishers are. Fifth, they should face economic penalties when they fail to comply with Canadian laws. Finally, they should make it hard for internet trolls to 'profit' from the monetization of content that harms journalists.

As a society, we need to do everything we can to protect democratic expression, but that doesn't mean that we can't protect journalists. All publishers, including internet intermediaries, should be held accountable for harmful content. Canada's publishers stand with our journalists, who won't be silenced, and readers, who want to be informed. - Jamie Irving is Chair and Paul Deegan is President and CEO of News Media Canada.

Zahara re-elected Mayor

The results are in and the Council table will look different this term.

Town of Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara was re-elected for a second term. Also returning to the Council table are Councillors Krystal Baier, Gean Chouinard, and Trevor Bevan.

Taking their place around the table for the first time are Peter Taylor and Ed Moore.

Former Mayor Greg Pasychny will be returning to the Council Chambers this time as a Council member.

Voters lined up at the Edson Legion and for much of the day the line could be seen not only out the door but around the side of the building due to physical distancing requirements. Additional registration tables were set up and opened in order to help move the line through more quickly.

Despite the appearance of a large turn out the 1842 votes cast only represented 28% of eligible Edson voters.

The first Council meeting for the new council will take place on October 26 at 7p.m. at which time the new Council will be sworn in and the Organizational meeting, where Councillors will be assigned to various boards, will take place.

Mayor Zahara said he is looking forward to working with the new council, "We have some fresh faces so there will be a steep learning curve for them and we have some experience as well and a variety of differing views" and he believes that every councillor elected has the desire to "Make Edson a better place."

The first 30 days as council is expected to be busy with a steep learning curve for new councillors.

Every year Yellowhead County invites neighbouring municipal councils to take part in the George Cuff Council orientation presentation of which councillors are encouraged to attend. The Town will also host its own council orientation and budgeting workshop, and the busy first month will wrap up with the Alberta Urban Municipalities Association (AUMA) convention which is set to take place Nov. 17-19 in Edmonton.

The new council will hold a strategic planning session early in the new year to set its short and long-term goals and vision.

The hope is that the shovels will be in the ground for the multi-plex within the year which will allow Council to look forward and focus on economic development and downtown revitalization.

Roads were a constant issue during the election campaigns with every Councillor addressing the issue. According to Zahara the 2018 Asset Management plan helped guide the previous council to address

Black Knot - What Is It?

Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has received numerous calls regarding black growths on residents'

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the Prunus genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning.

Black Knot - Pruning

- Only prune between November and March.
- 2. Cleanly cut off at least 6 8 inches below the knot, better to prune back to a healthy collar, then leaving a stub.
- 3. For knots on branches or trunks that can't be removed, use a knife to cut away diseased tissue down to good wood and then 1/2 inch beyond the edge of the knot.
- 4. Cleaning your equipment properly is another good way to prevent the spread. Pruning shears should be dipped in a 1% bleach/water solution between cuts and once you are finished pruning ensure you run your tools under water for 10 minutes and dry thoroughly.
- 5. Treat pruned branches like hazardous waste, they can release spores for up to 4 months. Burn, bury, or wrap them in plastic and throw them in the trash. Do not compost.

Wade Williams elected County Mayor

The 2021 Municipal Elections have come to an end, and Yellowhead County has elected a new Council to lead the County for the next four years.

The Council is made up of six previous Councillors and three newcomers, with former Councillor Wade Williams taking the helm as Mayor.

Williams won the race with 1254 votes, followed by Doug Elzinga (954), former Councillor Sandra Cherniawsky (591), Sonja Christopher (221), and Ken Bitz (57).

"I'm very happy and very relieved that the election is over. This has been one tough way to campaign,' Williams said, noting that it was "a lot" different than the last time he ran.

"A lot of people turned it into a COVID election," Williams said. "Some people seem to feel that Yellowhead County has ways of changing the rules of the province. which is absolutely untrue. So my message trying to get out to people was, we need to worry about things like roads and bridges and hamlets, and things that we can control, and not worry about the things that we can not control."

Williams attributed some of his success to getting that information out there. "A lot of the information I put out was on social media because it was so tough to campaign," he said. "I did not go door-knocking because I got the message fairly loud and clear that a lot of people didn't want us coming to their

doors."

Williams noted that other Councillors who did go doorknocking got "a really good reception" and commented that it likely depended on "who you ran into." "But I thought, I'm going to use social media to my advantage, I'm going to use the Newspaper, I'm going to use texts, phone calls, and emails," Williams said.

When asked about his biggest goals for the term, Williams said, "One of my very first goals is to make sure that we get this YCE Multiplex built here. That is my first priority."

"The second goal that I would like to see, is I would like to see us pick away at getting some of the roads paved," Williams said. "It's a tough thing, because money is always going to be a factor in that."

Williams said he pushed for it over the past four years, but couldn't push too hard because money had already been "committed to so many other things that I didn't even know about prior to coming onto Council four years ago."

"Like we had a roads master plan that they were in progress trying to finish, we had hamlets' amenities that a lot of money went into trying to get our hamlets up to a standard, but those things are just about complete now so I'm hoping that we're going to have some money freed up that we can start paving some of these local roads, Williams explained.

Williams also addressed the new makeup of the Council, noting that

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equipment and building issues as well as some of the underground infrastructure This term concerns. Zahara anticipates roads will be a focus as the previous council has already completed the


preplanning including 1st avenue by the Recycling Centre already part of the fiveyear capital plan.

"The issue of roads is complex," said Zahara, "You have to deal with the sewer, wastewater,

storm sewer concerns underneath and all of those areas had failing grades. We have been doing work in those areas over the past number of years.... There is no point in paving with underlying infrastructure issues, water penetration and hydrology issues because it won't last."

The last term saw Council dealing with the COVID pandemic and Zahara said while it presented challenges it also presented opportunities and highlighted the need for councils and municipalities to work together.

Zahara said, "What makes a really strong council is one that works hard, can listen to various points of view but still come together in the end."

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they "lost a couple good Councillors," while gaining some fresh faces. "The experienced Councillors and Mayor will try to mentor these other folks as best we can," Williams said. "It was a tough thing for me to get up to speed when I was first elected, so I know what they're

going to go through. This first few months is just going to be a whirlwind of information hitting them and, yeah, the first few months is crazy."

Those newcomers include Patrick Soroka for Division 1 who won with 178 votes, beating out Dale Verbeek (150) and Celine Stevenson (95), and Ken Groat for Division 8 who won with 255 votes and took the spot over incumbent Lavone Olson (158).

Division 6 was the largest Councillor race in the County and was also won by a new member in Brigitte Lemieux who won with 301 votes over Noel Perrin (166), Wade

Magneson (80), Christal Yacke (56), and Mark Mitchell (42).

Incumbents who won the races in their divisions include Penny Lowe who received 178 votes for Division 3 and beat out Ronald Rauhut (151), as well as David Russell for Division 4 who won with 258 votes and came out ahead of Rebecca Horne (93).

Other incumbents

keeping their seats were Anthony Giezen for Division 2, Shawn Berry for Division 5, and Dawn Mitchell for Division 7. All three ran opposed so won their seats by acclamation.

Yellowhead County noted that, out of 9015 eligible voters (based on AB Municipal Affairs), 3168 valid votes were cast for a 35% turnout rate.

nity support to fight month, approximately 160 households per month are getting hampers from the Food Bank.

> "Compared to last year in November and December we served 171 and 165 households respectively so we are on a similar track this year so far. This could increase due to restrictions falling back into place akin to what we saw last winter, it could also mean more people moving away as a result of job loss, or cost of living increasing with less financial support in place this year," Kemp-Cox explained. "We will be ready to help anyone in

need." The Food Bank's volunteer base is made up of about 25 people who help on a once-per-month basis. "Not including board members, about 5 of those volunteers help more than once a month or make themselves available on a call-in basis, or spares list, if we are short one week," Kemp-Cox said. "We are always looking for enthusiastic people to join the team." Volunteers with the Food

Bank can take on either a Tuesday morning or Thursday evening openday shift where they help give out hampers to clients or can help out on the non-open days where they re-stock groceries, pick up grocery orders and donations, and prepare for the next open day.

Kemp-Cox noted that open-day shifts are best for those who enjoy fastpaced work while staying organized, while nonopen days are most enjoyed by those who want to help but would prefer to work quietly at their own pace. "There is opportunity for any kind of volunteer that wants to

donate some time to us," she said.

One "silver lining" that the Food
Bank and their volunteers have
experienced, despite all the difficulties
of working through a pandemic, is the
"much-needed" renovations completed
in their building. "It is set up in a much
more conducive way now, and brighter
and lighter feeling too. We are all
enjoying the changes so much!" KempCox said.

She also spoke of how important the dedication of their volunteers is, as the client-facing work as well as the "behind-the-scenes work that goes into getting ready" wouldn't be accomplished without volunteers. "Without the donation of time, it wouldn't be possible," she said.

Other important support comes from many individuals, businesses, and organizations within Edson and area. "It has been nothing short of amazing, the support we have received from our community. In such a difficult time, where job stability isn't guaranteed, companies aren't certain of what the future might hold coming out of a pandemic, and people still find time, they still find resources and money, to help others," Kemp-Cox said. "We are so very fortunate to live in such a loving and generous community."

For the second year in a row, the Food Bank has not been able to run

their annual food drive in order to help protect the health of their clients and volunteers, however they are always accepting donations.

Some of their much-needed items include non-perishable food such as beans with or without pork, macaroni and cheese, pasta and sauce, canned fish or meat, peanut butter, powdered milk, soup, canned pasta, canned fruit or vegetables, granola bars, baby food or formula, and juice boxes or other items for school lunches.

Non-food items needed include diapers (sizes 3,4,5), toiletries, dish and/or laundry soap, and hygiene products such as body wash, deodorant, and shampoo/conditioner.

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Enhanced COVID-19 protection for continuing care

(AB) October 19, 2021: Alberta's government is strengthening health measures for continuing care facilities to help protect vulnerable Albertans from COVID-19.

Thanks to vaccines, COVID-19 outbreaks in continuing care facilities have been smaller and fewer COVID-related deaths have been reported than in previous waves. However, residents in

these facilities remain uniquely vulnerable to severe outcomes, including hospitalization and death.

Effective Oct. 25, masking will be required for visitors at continuing care facilities at all times and residents will be required to quarantine after being admitted to the facility or returning from hospital until they test negative for COVID-19.

Health officials are strongly encouraging unvaccinated family and friends to not visit residents in person at this time. Facility operators are also able to implement additional rules, such as requiring proof of vaccination, as appropriate.

"Protecting vulnerable Albertans is always our top priority. Even with remarkably effective vaccines, residents in these facilities remain at risk, which is why we are increasing the protection around them. We will continue doing whatever it takes to protect vulnerable Albertans and slow the spread of COVID-19."—Jason Kenney, Premier

Starting Oct. 25, all visitors must wear masks in all indoor areas of all continuing care facilities, including while in residents' rooms. Masking is mandatory for all visitors regardless of vaccination status. Residents are not required to be masked at this time.

The only exception to this mandatory masking measure will be in cases where there are communication challenges with residents who may be hard of hearing or have dementia. Any exceptions will be determined by the facility staff.

In addition, all residents who are transferring to a continuing care facility from hospital or returning from a hospital stay longer than 24 hours must stay in quarantine until they test negative for COVID-19. A PCR test must be used, with testing conducted by Alberta Health Services.

Facility operators have the authority to implement additional COVID-19 measures in their

facilities, after consulting with residents and their families. This includes actions such as requiring visitors to show proof of vaccination or undergo rapid testing.

RCMP warns consumers of online hay sale scam

Alberta RCMP are warning rural and farming communities to be aware of fraud that affects consumers looking to purchase hay. Due to extreme drought conditions this past summer, there is now a high demand for hay which is being sold at increased costs. This may cause farmers and agricultural workers to make purchases without taking time to properly verify or research production sources.

Across various RCMP jurisdictions this year, various groups have scammed victims of approximately \$64,000. With many cases potentially not being reported, this figure could

Recently, fraudsters have been placing listings for hay on social media and buy-and-sell

platforms, requesting immediate payment before buyers have the opportunity to research the producer, see the product, or receive delivery. This summer, both Evansburg RCMP and Grande Prairie RCMP received similar reports of transactions on Facebook Marketplace for a purchase of hay where a quantity of money was sent through an e-transfer, but no hay was delivered, and the funds were lost.


In all reported cases of hay fraud, the maximum individual deposit sent to scammers was over \$5,000, and the minimum was \$1,000. For consumers, it is valuable to note that those who avoided being scammed had refused to give deposits in advance, insisted upon speaking on the phone, and had paid cash upon delivery of goods.

The following key indicators can help you to identify a potential scam across online selling platforms:

- · Typically, sellers will only communicate through text messaging and avoid phone conversations.
- · Sellers can be located anywhere in the world and will get the attention of buyers by having a specific or specialized knowledge of hay
- · Pricing will be attractively low and will be consistent with the previous year's market price.
 - Often, there will be an insistence of a 50%

deposit but once the deposit is received, there may be excuses about delayed delivery and then communication stops.
