The inspector found that visible mould is evident and confirmed through bulk sampling and airborne testing. Elevated airborne mould concentrations exceeded the Alberta Health Services Guidelines, therefore actions are required.

The root causes of the Mould, the inspector's report concluded, are likely a combination of condensation, materials in direct contact with the soil, past roof leaks, and poor localized site grading/drainage.

RH Services Inc. recommends that site access should be prohibited to persons that are immune compromised, allergic to mould, have other respiratory issues such as asthma, or infants and elderly. If this is too difficult to assess and control, they recommend closing the site until remediation can be completed.

Signage posted at the site indicating the presence of Mould is also suggested. The company recommends that remediation should be completed as soon as practical (spring/summer). The remediation of mouldy materials should also be done following Moderate to High Risk procedures as described in the Alberta Government Best Practices -Mould at the Worksite document.

The needed and planned repairs are as follows: Mitigate condensation and hazardous mould issues. Remove affected items and replace with new, treated and appropriate material. Replace ceiling and insulation. Improved cleanliness and air quality by removing side wall lumber panels and replacing with metal cladding, while also replacing dirt floor with new and clean dirt material. Installing an air exchanger to improve circulation and reduce condensation. Finally, install new seating areas for safety and functionality.

After obtaining numerous quotes for

the project, the YAS Board has decided to use Richard's Carpentry at their meeting on August 17, 2022.

The Yellowhead Agricultural Society is currently securing funding of \$456,226.75 from ATB Financial for the project. The lender requires a limited guarantee for the loan, preferably from a municipality. The formally requested support is as follows: Shared Limited Guarantee for the ATB loan and \$100,000 commitment towards the project expenses.

During the presentation to council, Davis said that the arena is already prebooked for 30% of the coming year. Since the October to May season is their busiest season, they would need the repairs completed fairly soon. Alward added that lots of local business is staged out of the facility, adding, "This is all we have, if we do not repair this arena we

Councillor Krystal Baier asked if they have a breakdown of who uses the facility. Davis replied that about 65% Yellowhead County residents and 35% from the town. Councillor Baier also asked if they had been to the County with their request. "We will be. We have requested a date to meet with them again and they haven't provided one to us yet, but we are hoping to meet with them soon," responded Davis.

"We will be unable to give you a decision tonight," said Mayor Kevin Zahara. "But I understand you are on a strict timetable. Would you be able to continue without a guarantee from a municipality?" Davis replied, "The funding from the bank is not dependant on your funding to us. However the guarantee is very important."

Council will deliberate further on the matter at a future meeting.

School / Playground Zone Changes



It is time to revisit resource corridors

dramatically. Even the Liberals are saying so. Resource corridors could be the catalyst to getting something done.

One of the best ideas that has gone nowhere is the creation of resource corridors for long-distance transportation infrastructure using routes where land-use and development issues are resolved in advance.

Historically, the path of transportation infrastructures like railroads, highways, power lines and pipelines has been "map and ruler," a straight line at the lowest cost. Geography, like lakes and mountains, was the main reason for route changes.

Fortunately, most of Canada's longdistance infrastructure was built well before the population grew significantly. The national railroads are a perfect example.

Many communities only exist because the railroad came first, sparing seeking permission to knock down houses and buildings to run a rail line through town.

Since then, building anything extending beyond the property line of your backyard has become increasingly difficult, if not impossible, be it pipelines, power lines, or even roads.

Not In My Backyard. More obstacles led to BANANA, Build Absolutely Nothing Anywhere Near Anybody.

In Canada, so many projects have been studied, delayed, cancelled or prohibited that we have rightfully earned an international reputation as the country that can't build anything.

This is counterintuitive because longdistance infrastructure is the only reason our nation exists in its current form and is wealthy enough to obstruct continued development.

A determined creator of infrastructure conflicts has been Canada's landlocked oil and gas industry, with enormous resources and no access to tidewater.

New pipelines to the Pacific and Atlantic Oceans and the Gulf of Mexico have been proposed then opposed by environmentalists, landowners, municipalities, provinces, states and countries.

Billions of dollars have been vaporized on uncompleted projects.

Montreal, Vancouver, Montana, permanent. Minnesota, Nebraska, and the U.S. government are also opponents.

An innovative solution to resolve the pipeline wars was the creation of resource corridors, pre-arranged rightof-ways over long distances that would be wide enough to accommodate power lines, pipelines, railways and even roads.

The world has changed Corridor project, which describes itself as a "... neutral national entity championing the development of a resilient network of corridors that can link Canada's economic opportunities, help create more resilient supply chains and support access to global markets."

Founded in 2018, C2C2C's idea is to change the channel on development applications from "why" to "what and where" by dealing with economic, land use, environmental and social impact issues in advance.

The first question is fundamental. Should the country's population and economy continue to grow? This answer is invariably yes, if for no other reason than even development opponents dare

Then the next step is what, how and where. It is at this step where everything bogs down.

The C2C2C approach is materially different from the current process, whereby a developer wants to undertake a multi-stakeholder project. The sponsor's interests, most often commercial, are clear. But the benefits to those affected are not.

What makes C2C2C relevant today is that world events have finally put the need for development before the project itself. The narrative on oil and gas development, in particular, has finally changed.

Due to a worldwide energy shortage and the invasion of Ukraine by Russia, New acronyms emerged. NIMBY, or Finance Minister Chrystia Freeland uttered words not spoken outside of western Canada in years: "(Canada has) a lot of energy. I think it is a political responsibility for us as a country to support our allies with energy security. This is a very tough moment for many European countries right now as they shift from their dependence on Russian oil and gas, and I think it's very important for Canada to step up and say, 'We're going to help you."

This is exactly C2C2C's purpose.

The organization has an experienced leadership team, including Jerry Demchuk, who has a long career in major oil and gas project development. He is supported by industry veteran Bob Steele, Indigenous leader and energy advocate Chris Sankey, and former B.C. attorney general Bud Smith.

Advisors include Preston Manning, a tireless supporter of responsible but continued resource development.

The event included bareback, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, tie-down roping, ladies barrel racing, team roping, bull riding and novice saddle bronc.


Some of the youngest cowpoke enthusiasts entered in the mutton bustin' event and got right up there for an unforgettable ride.

Jasper welcomes back visitors with end of fire threat

Jasper Mayor Richard Ireland stated, "We are able and eager to safely welcome visitors back to the community."

Line transmission power has been restored for Jasper and the Chetamon Mountain wildfire poses no risk to the town site or surrounding communities. The town was switched to generators due to transmission lines being taken out by the wildfire. Residents were asked to conserve electricity amid intermittent outages.

The wildfire, which ignited September 1, was estimated to be around

14. About 100 firefighters and five helicopters were working on the fire.

Despite dry conditions over the weekend, Parks Canada deputy incident commander of the Chetamon Mountain wildfire. Landon Shepherd stated they were able to keep the fire growth limited on both the critical north and south ends of the fire.

Reservations for Whistlers Campground through the Parks Canada system was to resume on September 20, with bookings available until October 10. Parks Canada will be



Canadian canola production estimates vary

"The latest estimate from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada released August 22 is for an 18.4 million tonne crop, based on average yields," says Neil Blue, provincial crops market analyst with Alberta Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development. "Other government and private market analysts are projecting a crop of between 19 and 19.9 million tonnes."

Weather conditions have been much better than last year, but certainly not perfect. The spring was cool and dry in much of the Western Prairies, and cool and wet in the Eastern Prairies. Parts of Alberta were overly dry for most of the season, and that led to some production losses.

In most of Manitoba, canola crops are late, were hampered by overly wet soils, and are subject to frost damage. However, the hot August weather is pushing maturity along and harvest will soon become general.

What about market prospects? Canola carryover into this crop year was low. At the end of July, the

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Canadian Grain Commission reported that 566,000 tonnes of canola were in commercial storage. There was also some canola left on farms, either committed for delivery or just being stored.

Therefore, the canola carryover, although implying that the 2021 production was higher than earlier estimates, was likely under one million tonnes. That equates to less than one month's usage and compares to the record carryover 3 years ago of over 4.4 million tonnes.

"Canola has well developed markets, both for seed exports and products of our domestic crushing industry," points out Blue. "With the renewed supply, it is likely that domestic canola crushing will approach or exceed the record 10.4 million tonnes of the 2020-21 crop year."

Although a repeat large Australian crop could provide more competition to Canadian exports, Canada's 2022-23 canola exports could rebound to 9 million tonnes, which is only the 5-year average level. Even with a 20 million tonne crop, those canola usage numbers would result in another year of tight ending stocks.

"There are many factors that affect canola prices. Although canola prices have dropped from spring highs, they are still historically high. Input costs have risen, but with average yields, the potential margins are still very profitable," says Blue. -**AgriNews**

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

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
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
