Edson Traffic Bylaw 2291

The Town of Edson would like to inform all our residents that effective Sept 5, 2023, parking of travel trailers not attached to vehicles on the roadways will no longer be allowed. With the reduced threat of wildfire and the return of school we can no longer allow residents to leave their trailers unattached on the roadways. We appreciate your help in the matter. Please see the attached section of the traffic bylaw for information.

Traffic Bylaw 2291

For clarity, within the Bylaw "Highway" means any throughfare, street, road, trail, avenue, parkway, viaduct, lane, alley, square, bridge, causeway, trestle way or other place, whether publicly or privately owned, any part of which the public is ordinarily entitled or permitted to use for the passage or parking of Vehicles.

8.10 Unattached Trailer - No Person shall park any Mobile Unit upon any Highway unless the said Trailer is attached to a Vehicle by which it may be propelled or drawn and when so attached, the Trailer shall be deemed part of the Vehicle and subject to the regulations under this Bylaw pertaining to Vehicles.

8.14 No Person shall store a Vehicle upon a Highway, unless authorized by a permit issued pursuant to section 8.25. If a Vehicle is left standing for more than seventy-two (72) hours consecutively at one location upon a Highway it shall be deemed to be stored thereon.

9.1 A Recreational Vehicle shall not be parked on a Highway for more than seventy-two (72) consecutive hours, upon which time the Recreational Vehicle must be moved from the Highway for a period of not less than forty-eight (48) hours.

9.2 A Recreational Vehicle parked on a Highway shall not be occupied.

9.3 No Person shall Park a Recreational Vehicle upon a Highway unless it is attached to a Vehicle by which it may be drawn.

With that, the Town of Edson would like to remind all residents about the playground zone regulations in effect.


To keep students safe, and to simplify the rules for motorists, all school zones were changed to playground zones in 2022.

Recent Development Permits approved by the Development Authority, under the Town of Edson Land Use Bylaw 2070 as amended, can be found at <u>www.edson.ca/departments/planning/development-permit-applications</u>. Additional information can be requested from the Planning Department at 780-723-4402 or engineeringandplanning@edson.ca.

Any person who is deemed to be affected by the issuance of any one of these permits may appeal to the Subdivision and Development Authority by 4:00 p.m., on the 21st day after the date of issue as published on the Town's website. On Permitted Uses, grounds for appeal must relate only to interpretation, variance, or relaxation of Land Use Bylaw 2070. On Discretionary Uses, all aspects of the proposed development may be challenged upon appeal. Written notice of appeal, accompanied by the appeal fee as established by Town Council, must be filed through the Office of the Secretary of the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board at Box 6300, Edson, AB T7E 1T7. Direct Control District Approvals cannot be appealed.



Edson FCSS hosts Slay Saturday event

Edson Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) helped teens get ready for the school year with the first ever Slay Saturday event.

Teens were welcome to come out to the Kinsman Shack on August 26 and get free instruction on proper makeup techniques along with hair styling and nail care tips. The event ran from 10am to 3pm to give enough time for experimentation and one-on-one teaching.

Slay Saturday was put together by FCSS in partnership with Grand Yellowhead Public School Division's BEST program. This is the first time that these two organizations have partnered to create and event like this. "Today's event was really focused on how do we get teens feeling like their best selves before they head back to school," said Marsha Shack, with FCSS.

Professional makeup artist Shiralee Rondeau was brought out to walk each teen through the makeup process. This event was specially for teens ages 13 to 17. Six teens participated, which was a perfect number for this kind of event. All attendees got time for one-on-one advice and also got their own tools and products, which they could take home at the end of the day. The Town of Edson also supplied free pizza for lunch along with refreshments throughout the day.


Slay Saturday is just one of the many teen oriented events that have taken place over the summer months. "We've really been carrying the momentum from the mural painting that happened towards the end of June. We've been hosting teen drop-in groups every Thursday from 11 to 3pm. That has turned into a great group of kids who come out and play Dungeons and Dragons. And also some teens come out to do some intentional hanging-out," said Shack.

This safe space is especially important right now since the Edson Public Library is working with limited capacity during their renovations. Both FCSS and BEST hope to keep these programs going into the school year. Tara Burdock with BEST said, "We are looking at things we can do with this building during lunch hour to give teens places to be that are safe and inclusive —and offer them the ability to hang out and just be themselves."

Both the drop-in group and other special events will continue into the school year.

Youth pays it forward by raising funds for Stollery

Two motivated young children opened a lemonade and ice cream stand in Wildwood to help raise money for the Stollery Children's Hospital.

Carter Hollman now 11 years old was diagnosed at just six months of age with Severe A-Typical Congenital Nystagmus, which is a shaking of the eyes.

Carter's mom Jennifer Hollman, said, "we learned that he is legally blind. He visits the Stollery every year and because of the incredible doctors and nurses that we have, and knowing the work and comfort that they provide to the children and families, Carter started selling lemonade as a fundraiser with his sister Chloe."

The lemonade was a good start, but Carter and his dad Jody thought that it would be better if Carter could sell ice cream too. Jody went and bought a little mini freezer and filled it with a variety of different frozen treats and began selling them at the Leaman Exchange during Open Farm Days and in Wildwood during the Wildwood Fair.

Each year Carter sets a goal to beat the previous year's donation. "When we attend the Stollery for Carter's yearly check up we present the donation and they do the formal cheque presentation. This will be Carter's third year of fundraising. His motto is 'if I could do something to help someone else why wouldn't I'. He knows what it's like to struggle at only 11 years old, he knows that without the Stollery he wouldn't have received the help that he has," said Jennifer.

Over the last three years Carter has raised over \$1100 for the Stollery.

CRAA meets with CN Rail to advance regional transportation priorities

On August 22, the Community Rail Advocacy Alliance (CRAA) and its membership met with representatives from CN Rail in Grande Prairie to discuss ongoing concerns regarding rail service throughout Northern Alberta.

Mayor Kevin Zahara, who sits on the Alliance board, said, "The meeting was very productive with both sides sharing a desire to improve service to communities and customers. From an Edson perspective we talked about the need for consistent service and the challenge local industry has faced with rail car availability in recent years."

"CN assured us that rail car availability is improving and they have taken a number of steps in the last year and half to improve service. They have had challenges recruiting staff and have a number of job openings in our region. We will work with them to get the word out. We look forward to future dialogue on these issues," stated Zahara.

Since January 2023, CRAA has advocated for government and railway providers to address rail challenges experienced by local communities and industries. Railway services throughout Alberta need sufficient seasonal service, consistent capacity levels, and evenly deployed resources. Members of CRAA

The library is the second most used facility in Edson, making this project much needed to maximize space and give new life to the current building. Construction was scheduled to commence on August 28, 2023.

The library's temporary location will have five public-access computers, printing services, a bookable meeting space, exam invigilation, and a carefully curated collection of books for the public to browse. Yellowhead County Council Highlights

(August 22, 2023) West Central Airshed Society – Councillor Lemieux was appointed to represent Council as a board member of the West Central Airshed Society. The society is one of ten provincial not-for-profit airshed societies comprised of independent, multi-stakeholder members responsible for monitoring regional air quality.

Letter of Support – A letter from Council will be sent in support of the Pembina Valley Golf Club's provincial Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) grant application in the amount of \$21,199.50. The provincial funding, which the golf club will be required to match funds, is for several infrastructure repairs and upgrades at their facility. **Land Management and Sales** – Council adopted the Land Management Policy (6100.02) and Procedure (6100.02A) and the Land Sale Policy (6100.06) and Procedure (6100.06) documents. These policies and procedures help provide fair and consistent controls and procedures when selling or leasing county-owned property.

Intermunicipal Plan Negates ASP – Bylaw 5.23, which will repeal the Hinton West Urban Fringe Area Structure Plan (ASP), was given first reading by Council. In 2019, Yellowhead County and the Town of Hinton adopted an Intermunicipal Development Plan, which supersedes the ASP,



A Public Hearing is scheduled for September 26, 2023. **Rezoned to Protected Area** – Final reading was given to Bylaw 02.23 for the Land Use Bylaw amendment to rezone Plan 7622234 Block 4 Lot 1 from Country Residential District to Protection District. The rezoning will reduce the development options for the Lobstick Resort property to help keep it as a park.

Evansburg Community Bulletin Board – Yellowhead County will enter into a License of Occupation with the Evansburg and Entwistle Chamber of Commerce to replace the existing community bulletin board and planter on the County's road right-of-way.

Grazing Lease - Council approved a five-year lease to Jody and Donna Karlzen for grazing purposes for the 9.07 acres of land for \$326.52 yearly. The lease opportunity was advertised in the local media.

County Waives Taxes on Residential Portion of Homes Lost in Fires – Council approved the waiver of Municipal Property Tax on the residential portion of homes for the 36 properties destroyed in the 2023 Spring Fire. The next regular Council Meeting are September

12 & 26, 2023 at 9:30 AM. The next Governance and Priorities meeting is September 19, 2023 at 9:30 AM.

Schools are playground zones...

With school supplies loading into backpacks, kids from all around the area will be biking,

bussing, boarding, or walking their way back to school soon ---marking the end of summer vacation.

What also must to come to an end is our bad habit of driving faster through school zones.

The 30 km/h zone around schools and playgrounds is not a suggested limit —it's the law.

To keep students safe, and to simplify the rules for motorists, all school zones were changed to playground zones in 2022. These zones are in effect from 7:30am to 9pm every day, year-round. Keep in mind that schools don't shut down when the last bell rings. Kids regularly use school playgrounds outside school hours and often attend after-school programs in the evenings.

When hundreds of students and vehicles converge on school zones, traffic can be hazardous. This congestion can get even worse in bad

weather when more parents are driving kids to school. Separating automobiles and children can be a real

challenge for schools and the 30 km/h zones are a big part of getting kids to school safely.

However, they are not the only part! According to safety experts, many of the traffic problems around schools are caused by parents.

Sometimes we ignore the safe pickup zones, double-park, or block buses. One of the most dangerous practices is dropping children off on the wrong side of the street leaving them to jaywalk or cross alone at the busiest time of day. Young kids are unpredictable around traffic. They simply have not developed the skills to estimate how fast a vehicle is going and whether there's enough time to cross.

We all need to get somewhere, but planning for a few extra minutes to slow down in school and playground zones from 7:30am to 9pm every day, is a small price to pay to keep kids safe.

Local small business 5S Farms took a moment to thank the community with a Customer Appreciation Pig Roast on August 26.


From 3:30pm to 6pm, everyone was welcome to come out to the farm and enjoy free food and beverages.


5S Farms has been in business for many years. The Farm Store, however, officially opened in January of this year.

In the short time they've been open, they have received overwhelming support from the surrounding community. "The pig roast was mostly for a big thank you to the community," said Shelby Shelton, who owns and operates the business alongside her husband Burke Shelton. "Honestly, the amount of support that we've had has been astonishing. They've helped us so much in every way, and so we just wanted to say thanks. I couldn't have picked a better place to open a business."

The pig roast was an amazing success. Over 200 people arrived throughout the event to enjoy good food and great conversation. The main course was the titular pig roast with all the fixings.
