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Town of Edson updates social media policy

Town considering the potential removal of X [formerly Twitter] for Town information

During the Town of Edson Council meeting on April 1, Communications Coordinator Steve Bethge presented updates to the Town's social media policy.

"With the speed of changes in social media platforms and technologies, and with the current Social Media Policies being passed in 2018, a review and update to better reflect current practices was identified," stated Bethge.

During the March 11th Committee of the Whole Meeting, Council requested a stronger tone for disinformation/defamation comment moderation. "We have reviewed some social media page rules and best practices from other communities. Some minor changes have been made to Schedule A of Procedure IT-I-6-C-P to tighten up the social media rules/code of conduct and to allow more flexibility in moderation," stated Bethge.

"We've increased our engagement in our social media in the hopes to add some more context and clarity to reduce some misinformation out there. We think that's been going really well," said Bethge.

"We discussed the potential removal of X [formerly Twitter]. It's still under review. If we do stop using it, we will maintain our username and our page, in case we need it for emergency purposes. I think in the last month, we've had six likes on all of our posts that we've done on X," Bethge said.

The policy also states the Town reserves the right to remove any posts or content deemed to constitute a breach of the policy including:

- Comments that are offensive to an individual or organization, profane, hateful, insulting, rude, abusive, aggressive, or violent.
- Content that promotes, fosters, or perpetuates discrimination on the basis of race, national or ethnic origin, age, creed, gender, marital status, socio-economic status, physical or mental disability, or sexual orientation.
- Negatively targeting and personally identifying, either about the poster, Town employee(s), elected official(s), or a third party.
- Unproven or inaccurate accusations against individuals or organizations. Unproven or inaccurate factual claims.

Along with other content that may be deemed in breach of the policy.

Mayor Kevin Zahara said, "I do think that there are a few individuals, and thankfully it's not a lot, that do sometimes go over the line and start making accusations that are completely false, and that certainly should not be tolerated. Not to say that people can't have their own opinions on policy or decisions that are being made, but when you're basically slandering members of Council, I have a big problem with that."

Councillor Peter Taylor said, "We value people asking questions and questioning. Those are important aspects of a thriving democracy, but

we also can't be the microphone for disinformation. A vast majority of people are very respectful on the page, and we'd like to see that to continue. I like the changes that have been made here."

Council voted to accept the revised policy.

Councillor Krystal Cacka, who chairs the Physician Recruitment and Retention committee, spoke about the motion. "We [the committee] have been trying to find a way to position our region in a competitive and desirable fashion so that we do not find ourselves in the situation of desperation that other communities in Canada currently find themselves. So this would be very helpful towards that assessment."

Mayor Kevin Zahara added, "This is our Town Council taking a stance in supporting our physicians, our medical community, and our community as a whole. We realize that healthcare is in a bit of a shambles in our province, and throughout the country, so we are stepping outside of our lane here. This will hopefully provide some stability to physicians that are currently here, as well as those that are currently looking to move to our community."

Councillor Cacka made the motion for Council to direct that the lease for the Medical Centre Corporation be reduced from \$137,000 to \$0 for the next 5 years, as of April 1, 2025. Council voted unanimously in favour of the motion.

For a donation of their choice, anyone could take any number or variety of items. All proceeds will go directly back into the library.





Edson Citizens on Patrol presents a review of 2024

For the Edson Town Council meeting on April 1, Doug Wagstaff, General Manager, Community and Protective Services offered a prepared report reviewing the activities of Edson Citizens on Patrol for 2024.

Julie Vanderhoek, President Edson Citizens on Patrol, stated in the report, "would like to thank Edson Town Council and the Town of Edson for their continued support of our program. The grant funds provided allow us to focus our efforts on crime reduction and prevention activities for both the Town and Yellowhead County."

The Patrol's total volunteer hours have risen from 943hrs in 2017 to 1124hrs in 2024.

"Patrols include both the Town and Yellowhead County. We located impaired drivers, unsecured premises, individuals out on warrants, and provided traffic control at emergency scenes. Citizens on Patrol also launched a security check program where we check business, industrial, and municipal properties. We leave behind a card to let the owner know that it is secure and at what time the check took place. This year we upgraded our aging Sonim devices [mobiles] to improve communications with RCMP while patrolling," stated Vanderhoek.

In addition to patrolling, the group was involved in several local events and activities.

"During the year we also made efforts to

monitor speeds in areas of Town that receive complaints from the public in order to collect data and inform both the Town of Edson Protective Services and RCMP."

"As you can see, the funding you provide, allows our small group of volunteers to focus on our mandate rather than fundraising

Town Council votes in favour of letter of support for AFPA

Nition's first school was a one room schoolhouse built in 1928

Before 1928, the community of Niton Junction did not have a school, which discouraged many families from settling in the area, and even caused some families to leave altogether.

As a result of this, the community held a meeting in which they discussed how they could make a school in Niton a reality. At this meeting, many people offered to help; Louis Meropoulis donated land to build the school on, lumber camps offered lumber for the build, and some people even donated money. The ladies at the meeting also decided to make and sell items to raise money for the school, and also planned to host various fundraising events, such as card parties and bingos.

The single storey, one room schoolhouse was built by volunteers in 1928 on the land donated by Louis Meropoulis.

Former students of the Niton School recall that the school was very small, heated only by a barreltype stove that stood near the front of the room. During colder weather, students had to bring their desks in front of the stove, which meant that those nearest would be roasting and those furthest would be freezing. According to former teacher Bessie

Powers, the constant shuffling of desks would cause quite the commotion and often disrupt the

Students had to haul their drinking water from Lobstick Creek, located just across the road from the school, and in the winter students would clear the snow from the creek and play ice hockey on it during their recesses and lunch

Many former students of Niton School have fond memories of their time spent there. George Phillips recalls, "On [an] occasion at the school, a plane came flying about 200 feet above the railroad tracks. This was in 1942 so it was quite an event. We thought it was going to crash but it didn't. The teacher had us all write essays about the happening.'

Another student recalled a lighthearted joke played on one of the teachers, "I remember one April Fool's Day when about half of the students came to school early. They decided to play an April Fool's joke on her by climbing up in the school attic. She found out that they were up there and made them stay there until recess. I was the school janitor at the time and the teacher told me to stoke up the fire to keep them warm. When they came down at recess, she made them stay in and catch up on the work they missed that morning. Their little joke back-

fired on them but it was all done in fun."

Ultimately, the Niton School proved to be a success and was a deciding factor for settlers choosing to call Niton home. By 1939, there were 35 students enrolled in the school from grades one through eight.

As the population of Niton grew, the tiny school could not accommodate the volume of students, and the small school was abandoned in the early 1950's.

The school was later repurposed as a community hall, playing host to many parties, dances, weddings, and other social events, thus allowing it to continue to have a role in the social development of Niton.

The Niton School was essential for social development of the area, and without it, the hamlet of Niton and the surrounding area would not be what it is today.

Former student Alex Phillips summed up his experience at Niton School; "All in all I wouldn't change my time growing up in Niton. Associating with the children and nature in the area was a good educational beginning."

Swimming with dolphins

While Edson is lovely during the winter, I also long being near the ocean. This past



winter we were fortunate enough to spend the winter in Mexico right along the ocean.

I love whales and dolphins too, so this was a great place to be camping for the winter as we got to see dolphins on a daily basis along with the odd whale sighting.

We enjoyed stunning sunrises and sunsets, fresh ocean breezes, plenty of sunshine, and beach activities all winter long.

I found the beach to be my oasis, a place to relax and take in the sights of nature. The ocean waves seem to have a different story and rhythm each day. You could walk the same beach each day and each walk would be different.

We'd meeting different folks from around the world, different birds flying overhead, a pod of dolphins, different boats, kayaks, paddle boards, and wind surfers —the beach had something different happening every day.

The bottlenose dolphins were always my day's highlight. They were always trying to interact with people out on kayaks and boats, and even swimmers. I met a lady by the name of Susan Dawson-Cook who is a long distant swimmer. She has formed a unique connection with a pod of bottlenose dolphins, so naturally, I was interested in seeing what she could tell me.

Susan said, "I started in a swim team when I was 10 years old in Ohio where I grew up. I was involved in a lot of competitions right up through university."

Unfortunately, Susan was picked on and bullied growing up. "I often felt like a victim, weak and powerless. I was like a caught fish flopping around. This was until eighth grade when my friend Karen invited me to join the swim team. In the water I thrived. I found peace and a sense of calming when I felt anxious. The water is my sanctuary, the one place I always feel safe. It's also where I feel connected to a divine presence. For decades, swimming pools were my training ground," said Susan.

"Then I got away from swimming for awhile and I started doing triathlons for a few years. As I got older I started to really miss the water. I started back with some occasional swimming in the pool until I got hooked again. Later in life when I married, my husband and I started

living in San Carlos, México, on the Sea of Cortez, I fell in love with open water swimming," said

Susan.

"We bought a place here in San Carlos Mexico back in 2017, where I started open water swimming. These dolphins started swimming around me and I got to know them. This pod of 10 to 15 dolphins has always come to swim alongside me. I can identify most of them by their markings—different scratches on their bodies and different algae on their tails," Susan said.

"It is so special going open water swimming; it is so different from swimming in a pool. I've always loved the feeling of swimming, but swimming in the ocean is so special. It's unpredictable with the weather conditions and how many dolphins will come and interact with you. You also see other marine life like stingrays and different fish," Susan added.

"In the sea, I swim for the sheer joy of being in the water. Sea swimming has enabled me to let go of my obsession with competition and worrying about being enough —I can simply just be. I race in open water from time to time, and even win my age category, but my placing is no longer my priority. Out in the sea, I lose track of time as my body rises and dips with the waves," explained Susan.

"I have swam in different open waters like in California and my husband and I are certified scuba divers. But we both love swimming here in San Carlos with the dolphins. We love hearing the different sounds they make under the water like chirps, clicks, and whistles to communicate with each other," she said.

When asked if she has ever touched the dolphins, Susan replied, "I don't want to harm them or violate them in anyway, because we really aren't supposed to touch wild animals. I want to have a healthy relationship with them as they are very special to me. It's almost like a spiritual experience and we are communicating with each other. I sometimes think they can feel my thoughts. It's amazing to feel like you have this strong connection, but with another species," Susan explained.

I look forward to another winter along the ocean in the years to come. My birth sign is Pisces —so it only makes sense I'm part fish, don't you think?

Product requirements for setbacks in the vicinity of dwellings, aquatic environments and municipal water supplies will be met.

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The program is expected to take place from May to October 2025.

Being safe around ice during spring thaw

Just a reminder to those still venturing out on the ice in our northern areas as frozen lakes and rivers start to thaw to take extra precautions.

Although the ice may seem safe, it's not. If you are out on a lake in a vehicle trying to get the last ice fishing in, you need to know the risks. The danger of falling through the ice is very real. Going through the ice into cold water is can lead to hypothermia or drowning.

The recommended ice thickness for people walking on a frozen body of water is at least 10 centimetres and for an ATV or snowmobile it's at least 12 centimetres. Ice should be 20 to 30 centimetres thick for a car to drive on it and around 30 to 38 centimetres for a truck. With warmer temperature fluctuations, ice is not stable.

General safety guidelines include:

- Avoid slushy or thawed ice: Slush is a sign that ice is no longer freezing from the bottom and can be weak or deteriorating.
- Stay away from open water: Open water is a major hazard, especially during spring melt when ice can be unstable.
- Wear a floatation device or buoyant suit: In case of falling through the ice, a floatation device or buoyant suit can help you stay afloat.
- Never go onto the ice alone: Always bring a buddy for safety.
- Avoid unfamiliar paths and unknown ice: Stick to well-known and marked areas.
- Be aware of ice thickness: Ice must be at least four inches thick for walking or skating safely.

- New ice is usually stronger than old ice:
- Ice doesn't freeze uniformly:
- Ice formed over flowing water and currents is often more dangerous
- Specific Safety Tips:
- Check ice conditions: Before venturing onto the ice, check the ice thickness and conditions.
- Carry a safety kit: Include items like a rope, ice picks (screwdrivers or large nails work as well), and a knife.
- Wear appropriate clothing: Dress in layers, including waterproof and windproof clothing.
- Tread lightly: Wear skis or snowshoes to help distribute your weight over the ice.
- In a group, keep your distance: If someone

falls in, others are less likely to go under, too.

• If you fall through the ice: Lie on your stomach and spread your arms and legs out to help distribute your weight and stay afloat.

Talk to your children and teenagers about safety around lakes and rivers, no matter how old they are, or how many times they've heard this advice. Keep reminding them it could help save a life.

Don't mix alcohol and drug use when out enjoying recreational activities, they just don't go hand in hand. Wait until you get back to enjoy a beverage of choice, it's just the safest option.

Energy policy takes centre stage in high-stakes election

Energy policy is shaping up to be a defining issue in Canada's upcoming federal election. With climate goals clashing with economic and regional concerns, the direction taken by the next government could reshape the future of the country's most important industry—oil and gas.

Prime Minister Mark Carney, the former Bank of Canada and Bank of England governor now leading the Liberal Party, finds himself at the centre of a growing storm over emissions policy and national unity.

Last week, confusion erupted over the government's position on the emissions cap for oil and gas producers. On Thursday, Environment Minister Terry Duguid stated that the Carney government would maintain the cap. But hours later, speaking at an event in Edmonton, Carney appeared to soften that stance, saying he would work with provinces and industry "on specific ways to get those reductions, as opposed to...having preset caps or preset restrictions on preset timelines."

Then, on Friday, Carney clarified that the emissions cap would remain in place if his government is elected. However, he pledged to fast-track federal investments in carbon capture and storage technology and methane reduction to help the sector meet those targets.

"There is a role for an emissions cap—and again, emissions cap, not a production cap, just to be clear because some twist it," Carney said. He noted the government is putting a framework in place to accelerate emissions-reducing technologies.

Alberta Premier Danielle Smith, leader of Canada's largest energy-producing province, remains a vocal opponent of the federal policy. Alberta's economy is heavily reliant on oil and gas, which accounts for more than a quarter of the province's GDP. In 2022, the sector contributed over \$138 billion to nominal GDP, which is about 5.7 per cent of Canada's total GDP that year, and supports hundreds of thousands of direct and indirect jobs. Smith has long warned that Ottawa's climate agenda is economically damaging and constitutionally overreaching.

She has demanded the removal of the emissions cap, repeal of clean energy regulations and the federal ban on single-use plastics, an end to the net-zero vehicle mandate, and provincial control over the industrial carbon tax. In an email to Bloomberg, Smith said she made it clear to Carney that Alberta will not accept "an export tax or restriction of Alberta's oil and gas to the United States."

She also presented a broader list of demands, including establishing oil and gas corridors to the north, east and west, repealing legislation she says hinders pipeline development and lifting the tanker ban off British Columbia's northern coast. Smith warned that the next prime minister must act on the list within the first six months of their term "to avoid an unprecedented national unity crisis."

Carney acknowledged the need to build large-scale energy projects, including in Alberta, but stopped short of endorsing specific proposals or repealing existing federal legislation. He emphasized the opportunity for Canadian energy to reach

global markets.

"We need new customers in Europe and elsewhere," he said, suggesting that export routes through Canada's North could unlock new opportunities for Alberta producers.

Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre called Smith's list of demands "very reasonable" but declined to commit to fulfilling them.

"You'll have to see the rest of our platform roll out in due course," he told reporters in suburban Ottawa. Poilievre characterized Smith's move as a tactical effort to force clarity on federal energy positions.

Meanwhile, leaders from Canada's oil and gas sector weighed in with an open letter to federal political parties. As reported by Calgary Herald columnist Chris Varcoe, an alliance of CEOs from top petroleum producers and pipeline companies urged Ottawa to declare a "Canadian energy crisis" and set firm six-month timelines for approving major infrastructure.

"We are at a turning point in Canada's history and national interest. There is increasing public support to urgently grow our energy sector and build energy infrastructure," the letter stated.

The group—which includes members of the Pathways Alliance—called for eliminating the emissions cap, repealing the federal carbon levy on large emitters, simplifying federal environmental assessments and lifting the B.C. northern coast tanker ban.

Even Quebec, traditionally opposed to pipelines, appears to be shifting. Premier François Legault acknowledged that public opinion is changing.

"Given what Donald Trump is saying, the opinion is changing right now," he said after a meeting of provincial premiers and Carney last Friday. "We're open to these kinds of projects," he added, in reference to new pipeline discussions.

Ahead of the premiers' meeting, federal Finance Minister François-Philippe Champagne met with his provincial and territorial counterparts in Montreal to discuss large-scale, nation-building infrastructure. He said Ottawa is open to interprovincial hydroelectric transmission initiatives and other economic growth efforts.

Ontario Finance Minister Peter Bethlenfalvy highlighted the Ring of Fire mining region in Northern Ontario as a top development priority.

"The status quo is no longer an option," he said.

British Columbia Finance Minister Brenda Bailey said her province has identified 18 priority projects, including clean energy, mineral extraction and LNG.

"Minister Champagne has challenged us to identify more projects, and I'm very hopeful that on the other side of this trade conflict, Canada will be so much stronger," she said.

With provinces signalling openness, industry leaders pushing for action and the public watching closely, Canada's energy stakeholders must seize this rare window of opportunity. The path to growth—and national unity—may well depend on it.

Be a host farm for Alberta Open Farm Days 2025

BUY CANADIAN movement makes Open Farm Days more important than ever

Registration is now open for farms and ranches to be part of the 13th annual Open Farm Days on August 16 and 17.

Alberta Open Farm Days is an annual 2-day summer event that presents Albertans with an opportunity to experience the farm firsthand from farmers and ranchers. The program started in 2013 and has encouraged Albertans to engage with their local communities and experience agri-tourism.

In 2024, over 150 farms participated in Alberta Open Farm Day, welcoming over 52,000 Albertans to their farms and ranches. Host farms have included traditional farms, livestock (bison, cattle, alpaca, sheep, llama, goat, poultry) farms and ranches, organic operations, corn mazes,

wineries, craft distilleries, meaderies, craft breweries, stables, petting zoos, along with honey, fruit, vegetable, grain and u-pick farms.

Since 2013, Open Farm Days has seen over 235,000 people visit over 1,200 farms and ranches, injecting over \$1.7 million into the rural economy through on-farm sales. In 2024, reported on-farm sales surpassed \$300,000 for the first time.

Over the years, Alberta Open Farm Days has also evolved to offer professional development opportunities for hosts, helping them build successful ag-tourism programs. Training sessions were provided to equip farms with valuable insights on marketing, ticketing, food planning and booking, as well as insurance.

Participating farms and ranches have had very positive experiences being part of Alberta Open Farm Days:

"The important factor was having people learn first hand about bison and having a First Nations representative to speak to the importance of the bison to their culture." – Glengary Bison Ltd.

"Visitors were genuinely interested and engaged with what was being shared. Many visitors had never heard of flower farming or alpaca raising in Alberta, so it was a new experience for many."- Blooms on 7 Flower Farm

"Many people were exposed to animals and the rural way of life. They were able to interact with producers and find that they were educated, responsible, articulate and caring people regarding the welfare of their animals and the environment." - Big Country Agricultural Society
