Men's mental health is crucial, but often overlooked due to societal expectations of masculinity. Many men face stigma around expressing emotions, which can lead to untreated mental health issues.



# **Spring Toxic Round-Up 'hugely successful'**

The Toxic Round-Up at the Edson & District Recycling Society is a community event organized for safely disposing of hazardous household waste like electronics, paint, and used oil. This critical initiative helps keep the environment clean by promoting responsible recycling and disposal.

The Annual Spring Toxic Round-Up took place on May 24, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Edson and District Recycling Society, Yellowhead County in Evansburg, as well as in Hinton.

Recycle Depot Manager Anne Auriat, said, "The events were hugely successful. It was busier than normal. We even ran out of food despite having extra food at all three of the sites. So it was way busier for sure on the food side of things."

"On the material side of things, Evansburg was the busiest I have ever seen," said Auriat. In the past 10 years I've been doing this I've never seen Evansburg that busy."

"The name of the event has changed with the government, but the toxic roundup was for paint, electronics, oil, and tires —the four main streams. But we also, because of our contract with the town, include household hazardous waste," Auriat

#### explained.

The materials are hauled down to Lethbridge. "We use a contractor from there called DBS environmental. He's been with us for about 25 years, so he does all of this region including the Jasper and Hinton landfill. He does an awesome job. They work onsite in Evansburg, so it all works out good."

Each of the locations had free burgers, hot dogs, donuts, beverages, and door prizes. Each location had two bikes to give away —one adult bike and one kids bike.

Auriat was pleased with the good response at all of the locations this year. "The weather was good, so that helps. We also had lots of phone calls beforehand along with information gathering, so that was good to see. We will have another toxic roundup in the Fall around the third weekend in September."

Recycling toxic items is crucial to prevent environmental contamination, protect human health, and conserve resources. Improper disposal of hazardous waste can lead to pollution of soil, water, and air —impacting ecosystems and human health. Recycling also allows for the recovery of valuable materials and reduces the need to extract new raw materials which minimizes environmental impact and conserves resources.

The Edson Community Garden is getting a facelift with some new metal planters and fresh soil. The garden not only offers the community an opportunity to grow their own fresh produce, it's also a place to connect with others and nature.

Anne Auriat with the Community Garden, says, "It's been a big year with transformation here at the garden. We have added new container bins which will make the weeding and appearance a lot better. The older planters were allowing a lot of grass to come into the plots. The grass won't be able to creep in so easily in these new metal planters which will make it much nicer to care for." Due to a breakdown at the manufacturing centre the bin shipment was delayed. "We're about a week late in getting them ready to go," said Auriat. "We got some funding through the federal government, through seniors accessibility, to help with easy-access planters for our seniors. They are easier to get around and work in," explained Auriat. "We're also going to be planting potatoes in the extra bins for the food bank."

"We have a huge response from the schools again this year. The grade nines from Parkland Composite High School are helping to fill all the planters," said Auriat. "Our school tours have really booked up for the year. We have two school tours on Tuesdays and Thursdays for now, plus we just opened up Wednesdays." "We have a summer student and she is really on top of everything. She will be offering bird houses and bad houses sessions again this year along with a bracelet making session made from recycled materials," Auriat said. "We also added some wood carvings that look like butterflies or bees or flowers that kids can paint, and then we're going to start decorating the outside of the fences with them." "We've applied for another grant to help with finishing off our display board, and we are adding name plates by the plants and shrubs. It's a beautiful piece of nature. You can sit here and listen to birds, galore. The birds have just moved in and it's really kind of neat to see and hear them," said Auriat.

### Confirmed cases of measles in Alberta prompts public alert

(AB) Measles is spreading in Alberta. This disease, once rare in Canada thanks to measles vaccines, is now circulating in several areas of the province. It's a highly contagious illness that spreads quickly, especially in close-knit communities where people gather frequently and where immunization rates are lower.

AHS states, Measles is an extremely contagious disease and the virus spreads easily through the air. Symptoms of measles include:

- Fever of 38.3° C or higher; and

- Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes; and

- A rash that appears 3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see.

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest risk.

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immunization program. The recommended schedule for measles vaccination is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline for more information if these situations apply to you or your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.

The measles hotline connects you to a professional who can assist with accessing your immunization records or offer general information; provide advice for those experiencing measles symptoms and are feeling unwell; and assist with booking measles immunization appointments or locating a public health clinic offering immunization in your area.

You can also text 'Measles' to 88111 to get measles health information texted to your mobile device.



### **Regulatory reform key to Canada's energy future**

Canada has the resources to lead globally in energy, but outdated rules and investment barriers are holding us back

Canada stands at a pivotal moment. A new federal government offers an opportunity to rejuvenate the economy and rethink our approach to natural resource development.

Prime Minister Mark Carney's plan to build Canada into the bestperforming economy in the Group of Seven (G7) is achievable, as is his ambition to build from this country's energy resource-rich foundation. This aligns with the oil and natural gas industry's calls to play to our strengths in responsible energy development and exports. To succeed, we need a clear, practical strategy that reflects the realities of investment capital in today's unpredictable global economy.

Canada has all the ingredients to become the next global energy superpower. What's missing is the right recipe. Over the past decade, a layering of policies has reduced investor confidence and made Canadian projects less attractive than those in other countries. Billions in capital have shifted to places like the United States, Brazil and Norway, where regulatory processes are clearer, faster and more investor-friendly.

It's time to rebuild investor confidence and demonstrate that Canada is open for business. That begins with overhauling the regulatory and fiscal frameworks that govern major energy projects. Current regulations are too often unpredictable, excessively long and vulnerable to legal challenges. For example, some Canadian energy projects can take seven to 10 years to gain approval, compared to three to five years in competing jurisdictions. Approval timelines must be firm, reliable and competitive. Projects of national significance need clear, coordinated assessments that uphold environmental integrity while respecting the jurisdictional roles of provincial governments and Indigenous communities. And we must take the politics out of the regulatory process.

natural gas-producing nations. A model tailored to regional realities and industrial needs, and one that respects provincial jurisdiction, could restore both flexibility and investor confidence. A national policy should drive investment into emissions reduction, not through production caps, but by simplifying regulation, creating an attractive fiscal environment and protecting export industries while enabling innovation and growth.

Let's be clear: this is not a call to abandon climate goals or environmental commitments. Canadians care deeply about the environment. But they also care about job security, affordable living and Canada's place in a rapidly evolving global economy. These values are not in conflict. In fact, the Canadian way—our high standards, our innovation, our sense of fairness—can show the world a model of responsible oil and natural gas development.

We must also ensure Indigenous communities are true partners in growth. Expanding Indigenous loan guarantees at scale will help create infrastructure ownership opportunities that generate long-term prosperity. These guarantees enable First Nations to access affordable financing to invest in projects like pipelines and power generation. But such programs will only succeed if Canada is seen as a competitive place to invest. That foundation must come first.

The mood across Canada has shifted. There is broad public support for oil and natural gas development, not just because of the jobs and revenue, but because Canadians understand the role energy plays in our national and economic sovereignty. Recent polling shows most Canadians believe energy development and climate action can go hand in hand, especially when projects support economic growth.

Amid growing instability in the United States-Canada's biggest competitor for capital-we have a chance to stand out as a stable and trusted economic partner. But this window of opportunity won't stay open for long.

We must act decisively. That includes eliminating unnecessary barriers such as production caps and embracing investment in technologies that reduce emissions while growing output.

Canadians are ready. Industry is ready. The time has come to build.



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### Alberta's Certified Weed CEAT in Action in the Community! Free Forage Program

Hay you! Are you a producer of weed free forage in your county? Better yet, would you like to be?!

Yellowhead County: Invasive species such as terrestrial invasive plants are detrimental to Alberta's environment and can cost an estimated \$2 billion each year. Contaminated hay is one means by which invasive plants are spread.

To address this, the North American Invasive Weed Management Association has set industry guidelines and maintains minimum standards for Certified Weed Free products in Alberta, which are recognized across North America. As a participating county, we intend to promote this program to potential buyers and help producers certify and sell their Certified Weed Free Forage!

It's twine to get your fields inspected! Here are some guidelines for forage producers that are interested in inspections to certify their forage as weed free:

- Be grain-ful there's certified inspectors to help! Inspections must be conducted by a Certified Weed Free Forage Inspector with authority under the Weed Control Act (e.g., Weed Inspectors) within 10 days maximum prior to cutting. If the crop is not cut within that timeline, a new inspection must be conducted.

- Inspectors may certify all or a portion of a field as weed free so it's not too mulch to handle.

- It's not the last straw if invasive species are present, a field can be certified as weed free if there are no propagative plant parts present.

- Now you can rest and hit the hay, the Alberta Invasive Species Council (AISC) will take care of the rest! They maintain a publicly available list of contact information for producers with inventory of Certified Weed Free Forage. This list is updated frequently and can be found on their website, abinvasives.ca. Please let us know if you would like to be added to that list.

Let's get this bale rolling and protect Alberta from the harmful impacts of invasive species by letting others know about Alberta's Weed Free Forage program! #### **Mercoal Creek Wildfire (EWF030)**

May 28, 2025: Alberta Wildfire firefighters, helicopters, and heavy equipment continued to respond to wildfire EWF030, located 6 km west of Mercoal and 16 km southwest of Robb. The wildfire was classified as out of control.

Firefighters continued working to contain the wildfire with the assistance of heavy equipment and helicopters. They were searching for and extinguishing hotspots which often involves digging deep into the ground and dousing the smoldering fire with water. Airtankers are available if required.

Yellowhead County Fire Department firefighters completed setting up Structural Protection Units (SPU) in Mercoal and moved to Robb to set up sprinklers for buildings in the hamlet. Six four-hundred barrel water tanks were set up strategically throughout Robb to provide water for the Sprinkler protections systems. Over one kilometre of hose had been laid down throughout the community to feed the sprinklers. The sprinkler protection system was set up as a precautionary measure to reduce the threat of wildfire damage to the hamlet.
