## Town of Edson Fire Ban

Edson, Alberta, May 8, 2025 – The Town of Edson is instituting a full fire ban, effective May 8, 2025, at 9:00AM. The fire hazard rating for the Town of Edson is currently VERY HIGH.

"This ban is based on the current and predicted weather conditions, and to align with the current bans in the forest area surrounding the community. While we're currently seeing some rain in the area, conditions still need to improve dramatically across the region." -Edson Fire Chief Brad Milton

Any Existing Fire Pit Permits AND Open-Air Burn Permits for the Town of Edson are now suspended until further notice. No new permits will be issued.

This FIRE BAN includes all open burning such as outdoor wood fires, wood campfires on public lands, wood campfires on private land and provincial campgrounds, and backyard fire pits. It also includes fireworks, exploding targets, and charcoal briquettes.

Propane or natural gas-powered alliances ARE allowed, along with open flame oils devices such as turkey deep fryers and tiki torches. Indoor wood fires contained within a device with a chimney and spark arrestor are also OK at this time. All appliances must be CSA approved and used per manufacturer's standards.

The situation will be reviewed as conditions change. Please report any wildfire or fire to 9-1-1 or call 310-FIRE.


member. So, we also had some art firing. Then you have to do the by junior members in the sale as well," said Annette McGill, Education Coordinator with the Edson Craft Centre.

The items were arranged according to colour and use. These included classic pottery such as muds, bowls, and plates. It also included some niche items like figurines, platters, and knickknacks. A lot of effort and creative work goes into each of the sales. "It's not like you can make pottery overnight. You have to make the piece, then it has to dry, then you have to get enough done to do a bisque firing —which is the first

glazing and decorating, and then they go back into the kiln for the glaze firing. It takeS quite a few months of prepartation before we're ready for a sale," said McGill.

The Edson Craft Centre has been an official society in Edson since 1953. The two annual sales have become a staple in the community. This month's sale also proved to be very popular. "It went really well," said McGill, "It was well attended and everyone seemed really excited to be there."

The group will also have a booth selling items at the Edson Summer Festival. They also do pottery classes for all ages.

## First Responders Edson & Area Database launched

An informal banquet was held at the Galloway Station Museum and Travel Centre, on April 30, geared towards families raising children and youth with diverse needs.

During the event, the launch of a new program called First Responders Edson & Area Database (FREAD), was announced.

This project has been in the making for almost two years through the generous support of the Canadian Red Cross and the vision of Edson LEAP Centre.

Information was shared with families on how they can provide important data regarding family members in their household that would assist emergency responders if a medical emergency were to happen at their home.

On a personal note: as a mother and caregiver who used to support a young lady that's non-verbal and has complex needs, it is very exciting to see such a program being launched in our community.

This kind of information can save time and truly help first responders know ahead of time what could help when it comes to assisting a specific individual who may need some extra support during an emergency situation.

Fire Chief Brad Milton presented information on emergency preparedness to give families additional information and useful tips. Families then had time to create emergency preparedness lists customized for their family.

When you are raising a child with a disability there are so many additional stresses that parents and guardians face. Anything that helps ease an emergency situation would be extremely beneficial.

Anna Vander Haeghe, Pediatric Occupational Therapist with the Edson LEAP Centre, said, "We had over 60 people registered. The Edson Fire Department, LEAP, RCMP Edson detachment, and Peace Officers all took part in this launch." Associated Ambulance has taken part in the fall with a 'meet the fleet' open house

"With so many parts to this project including LEAP providing staff training on sensory processing, autism, and non-speaking for the Edson Fire Department; all department's vehicles are now equipped with a sensory box and a visual communication board," said Vander Haeghe.

Facial recognition software has been developed to help identify people who may be

unable to answer questions or communicate verbally. Families have a choice if they'd like to have their loved one added into the facial recognition program.

The Edson Fire Department recently responded to a single vehicle accident and used the visual communication board to help communicate with a deaf individual to determine if they were in any pain. That individual also used the sensory items to help regulate and calm themselves during that stressful incident," Vander Haeghe said.

"We are also reaching out to organizations in Edson that work with the disability population of all ages to offer a lunch meet and greet on May 26th from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m," said Vander Haeghe.

The idea is to bring all the organizations together so that people can connect. This will help the community become aware of services that organizations offer in Edson and area. ## Carney must act fast to keep **Canada from coming apart**

Disappointment and frustration can lead people to do foolish things.

Conservatives in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, in particular, are profoundly disappointed that Pierre Poilievre's Conservative Party of Canada was defeated by a coalition of progressive voters in the federal election. In their anger, many have lashed out and called for regional separation from Canada, despite the economic risks and political instability such a move would bring.

They don't seem to care that the move would be disastrous economically, almost certainly leading to a deeply diminished standard of living. Nor do they seem to care that such divisive talk feeds into the Donald Trump playbook of divide and conquer, making his dream of seeing Canada as the 51st state more achievable.

Part of what hurts so much, it seems, is that the Conservative Party won a higher per cent of votes than it had even when Stephen Harper formed government. The party broke through in Ontario's 905 belt, snatching seats away from the Liberals. Had the NDP and Bloc voters not shifted en masse to the Liberals in a "stop Poilievre" movement, we would have a Conservative government today (albeit without an elected leader, since Poilievre lost his own seat). They can thank Trump for that.

The worst form of heartbreak comes from watching certain victory snatched away at the last minute.

Liberalism, for many prairie westerners, is a trigger word. Mere mention of the L-word triggers vitriol in some circles, closing off the opportunity for a rational discussion about how the West might be able to work with a governing party they did not choose. Memories of Justin Trudeau, the archetype of the arrogant Laurentian elitist, are so fresh they feel like an open

This is the daunting conundrum Prime Minister Mark Carney faces as he walks a cat's cradle of tightropes—negotiating with the erratic Trump, seeking to avoid conflict with pipeline-averse Quebec, mitigating the impact of an oncoming economic recession and, somehow, finding a way to build bridges with those angry westerners who aren't interested in talking right now.

It also doesn't help that Alberta Premier Danielle Smith, aided and abetted by the perplexing Preston Manning, is in effect giving purchase to separatists by, on the one hand, claiming she favours a united Canada while, on the other, giving separatists an audience and making it easier to hold a separation referendum.

But there are also positives for the pro-Canada crowd. First Nations are furious over separation talk. The Sturgeon Lake Cree Nation and Blackfoot Confederacy have written to Smith, calling on her to cease and desist from separatist actions that they say are "illegal."

It also helps that Carney did not grow up in Quebec, the entitled child of a rich intellectual. Born in the Northwest Territories and raised in Alberta, Carney at least is starting from first base. And, so far at least, he has shown humility, humour and sensitivity to regional

Importantly, in spite of a recent surge in separatist talk, not everyone in Alberta and other prairie provinces is excited about the prospect of western separation. In fact, the Liberals earned nearly 28 per cent of votes in Alberta, which is the best showing since the heady days of (Pierre) Trudeau-mania in 1968. (Yes, it's true, the West briefly was in love with the senior Trudeau.) Recent polling has also found that nearly twothirds feel Alberta would fare best economically as part of Canada.

So, if Carney can use his considerable personal charm to cool the fires, there just might be a path to keeping the country together. It will, however, require a willingness to consider concessions to the West that his predecessor would never

It starts with clearing a path to approving pipelines and energy projects. The staggering final cost of the Trans-Mountain pipeline expansion (\$34 billion) illustrates how Canada's regulatory framework has made future developments

Carney has said he wants to turn Canada into an energy superpower, and, like it or not, in the near term, some of that will involve fossil fuels. It will also involve accelerating the development of nuclear power and, of course, a deeper commitment to renewables.

In a perfect world, he would also find a way to convince Quebec to allow the Energy Eastern pipeline to travel through that province. That's a tough sell that would require a level of magic no previous federal government has been able to achieve. But don't rule it out.

Carney also needs to find a way to make peace with China. The 100 per cent tariffs the previous Liberal government imposed on the import of Chinese vehicles (a move in part intended to mollify U.S. interests) have led to devastating retaliatory tariffs from China on Canadian pork and canola. That cannot continue.

It also comes down to showing respect to provincial jurisdictions, treating provinces as true partners rather than ill-behaved children that need to be brought into line. More than one in five of Albertans polled recently said the federal government must more closely listen to the province. Regular first ministers' meetings would be a good place to start.

It's an ambitious to-do list, for sure Expectations of a leader have never been higher: corral Trump, make trade peace with China, unite Canada and save the economy—all before lunch.

Can Carney make a difference in his first 100 days? He has to, and I wish him Godspeed in his efforts. I shiver at the prospect of the country's future if he is unable to deliver.

## **Community Care Foundation: A lifeline for rural health**

For over four decades, the Community Care Foundation of Edson and District has quietly but significantly shaped healthcare in the region.

Committed to enhancing and supporting rural medical services, the foundation plays a vital role in ensuring the wellbeing of area residents, especially those who rely on continued care close to home.

The foundation's volunteer board meets monthly at the Edson Hospital on the last Wednesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. These meetings are open to all, and community members are warmly encouraged to attend. Whether you're curious about how to get involved or looking to contribute to local health initiatives, the foundation welcomes fresh faces and new ideas.

Marsha Jensen with the Community Care Foundation, said, "Over the past five years, the foundation has funded numerous impactful projects that have directly improved the quality of care in our area."

"These projects include essential equipment such as air beds for palliative patients, a neonatal incubator, and enhanced tools for ophthalmology. Among its proudest achievements is the development of Edson's Ophthalmology and Cataract Program. This initiative allows patients to receive both pre and post operative cataract care without the need to travel to larger urban centres, transforming the lives of many seniors and those with limited mobility."

"Beyond infrastructure and equipment, the

foundation also supports the emotional wellbeing of healthcare staff through appreciation events and investments in healing spaces such as raised gardens and wellness areas. As healthcare needs evolve, the Community Care Foundation continues to stand as a pillar of support, compassion, and forward-thinking in Edson and surrounding communities," said Jensen.

Some of their projects include a calming mountain-themed mural painted around the glass railing and wall in the Continuing Care area to enhance the healing environment.

Other projects include: an Arjo sit and stand chair; An Advanced Labour and Risk Management (Alarm) Course; Evacuation Go Bags - emergency bags prepared for each Continuing Care resident; surgical carts and advanced diagnostic tools for the ophthalmology program; Wireless Uroflow Meter-Uro/Gyne for the surgical program; dual exercise bike for rehab and physical therapy; and more.

"Some projects that are still in progress, include a neonatal incubator that has been ordered. It provides stable temperature, humidity, and oxygen support for premature or critically ill newborns. And the raised garden area to be installed in May. It's a therapeutic space with medicinal and edible plants for use with Recovery Alberta programs," said Jensen.

"The Wellness Common Area with an unveiling in June. It will be located near renal dialysis. This calming, inclusive space will feature local Indigenous artwork and artifacts, promoting rest and reflection," Jensen said.



DID YOU KNOW? Although the Weed Control Act (part 3, section 12) automatically grants an Inspector right of entry onto private land, Yellowhead County chooses to utilize a "door knocking" program to make contact with landowners before a weed inspection takes place.

You may see a white County vehicle near your property and an inspector in a high visibility vest performing weed inspections. Please be considerate of their safety.



WHAT TO EXPECT

If home, you will be informed of the approximate date and time of the inspection. Inspectors can address any questions or concerns that you may have at that time.

If not home, a placard will be found on your door or gate letting you know that an inspector was there and that you can call for more info before the inspection.

The results of the inspection(s) and weed information sheets will be mailed out to the landowners within a couple weeks of the completed inspection(s).

# V-E Day remembered at Edson Legion

The Edson Royal Canadian Legion Branch # 51 held a memorial ceremony in recognition of V-E Day (Victory in Europe Day) on May 8th, at 11:00 a.m.

On May 8, 1945 people around the world celebrated Germany's surrender to the war. The End of World War II.

Wayne Joy, a Veteran of the Canadian Armed Forces 1 P.P.C.L.I and part of the 1st. Canadian Brigade Group, said, "We have memorabilia inside the Edson Legion in remembrance of V-E Day. Crystal Chaluk did a lot of research on the history of V-E Day that we feel is important for the community to know and remember. It's important for our younger generations to know about the history."

Crystal Chaluk sourced some of the history: "When the news was given —people danced, kissed strangers, waved flags, and threw streamers. They crowded outside newspaper offices to hear the latest news, flocked to city hall, and they all celebrated in their own way the end of the war".

"V-E Day, the end of the conflict with Hitler's Germany, came first. Germany surrendered on May 7, 1945. In Toronto, and all cities in Allied countries, people streamed out of workplaces and schools to celebrate. May 8, 1945 was declared the official day of celebration, with the City of Toronto organizing concerts, parades, religious services, and fireworks in the parks."

"Three months later came V-J (Victory over Japan) Day, the end of the Pacific conflict with Japan. The news came in the evening of August 14, 1945. Across the city, but particularly in Chinatown, the revelry began again —this time celebrating the final end of six long years of war. Years later, we remember the war and commemorate its end with exhibits featuring images and other materials," stated Chaluk.

"The announcement that the war had ended in Europe was broadcast to the British people over the radio late in the day on May 7. The BBC interrupted its scheduled programming with a news flash announcing that Victory in Europe would be a national holiday. Newspapers ran the headlines as soon as they could, and special editions

were printed to carry the longawaited announcement. The news that the war was over in Europe spread like wildfire across the world."

"In the United States of America, the victory was tempered with the recent death of President Roosevelt, who had led his country through the war years. His successor, Harry S. Truman, dedicated the day to Roosevelt and ordered that flags be kept at half-mast, as part of the 30-day mourning period. Despite this, there were still scenes of great rejoicing in America. In New York, 15,000 police were mobilized to control the huge crowds that had massed in Times Square."

"Amidst the street parties and rejoicing, many people mourned the death of a friend or relative, or worried about those who were still serving overseas. For many of the widows the war had produced, the noise and jubilation as people celebrated VE Day was too much to bear and not something they could take part in."

"There was also an air of anticlimax. The hardships of the war years had taken their toll on many people and left them with little energy for rejoicing. In Britain, the strain of air raids, the strictures of wartime life and the impact of rationing all left their mark on a weary population who knew there were more difficulties yet to endure."

"It was not the end of the war for members of the Allied forces who were still serving overseas on VE Day, and the occasion was bittersweet. Although it meant victory in one theatre, the war was not yet over in the Far East and Pacific. The battle conditions there had been some of the toughest of the war. In May 1945, thousands of Allied servicemen were still fighting in the East and thousands more were held as prisoners of war in terrible conditions. The final months of the war in the Pacific saw heavy casualties on both sides, but ultimately ended in victory for the

"For people in Britain, the end of the fighting didn't mean an end to the impact of the war on their lives." Although many things slowly began to return to normal, it took time to rebuild the country and shortages were still felt for many years.

## Town deems 14 Ave sanitary sewer line upgrade unnecessary

The Edson Town Council was given the opportunity to make adjustments to the scope of the 2025 B1 Sanitary Rehabilitation Project. The project was created to resolve flooding within one of Edson's north neighbourhoods.

According to research done by the project management group, McElhanney, 14th Ave does not require a full upgrade. Therefore, during their May 6th meeting Council discussed whether or not to upgrade the 14th Ave line.

The Sanitary Rehabilitation Project was approved by Council in 2024. The project began with work on 18th Ave line and was completed that same year. The 2025 B1 project will continue this work by following the sanitary main alignment along 52 Street, 54 Street, 13 Avenue, 54 Street, and 14 Avenue. These pipes will all be upgraded from 200mm, to 375mm in diameter. McElhanney consulting, was contracted to complete the design, tender, and construction management for the project.

While preparing for this project, all sanitary lines were investigated using CCTV footage. Upon reviewing this footage, Administration discovered that the sewer pipe along 14th Ave is in sound structural condition. McElhanney's findings indicate that the flooding can be most likely attributed to downstream blockages or constrictions. Therefore, upsizing or replacing the 14th Ave line would not resolve the problem. That, coupled with the fact that line is still proper capacity for the number of houses it serves, is what prompted administration to consider removing 14 Ave line from the B1 Sanitary project.

"As Administration, we do acknowledge the concerns that council and residents have regarding the recommendation to omit this from the project considering all the flooding issues in that area. But we do feel, that with our operational information and data, confident that the line is sound," said Donna Cross, Infrastructure Manager. "It is also a significant cost savings. And I know it's not all about cost saving, but there is a lot of infrastructure that does need to be replaced and other areas of the town that money could go towards. It's approximately between \$900k and \$1M in savings if we omit that line."

"So if we are upsizing the 13th Ave line, what is that feeding into?" asked Councillor Gean Chouinard, "If we upsize that do we have a guarantee that far end is going to be able to take this upsizing?"

Jeff Amundson, with McElhanney, explained that

the project was organized to avoid that issue. The work completed last year is downstream from this year's project. "If we had started from the top, we would have just been moving the bottle neck, but we've essentially opened it up so that we won't see a bottleneck in the downstream."

"So by not doing 14th, and then doing all the other stuff around it, can you guarantee that 14th will never flood again?" asked Councillor Ed Moore.

"There can always be a reason that it might flood, but it would never be a result of that line not being upsized," answered Amundson, "You can never say never, but this project should eliminate all risk of flooding. I personally have no concerns that excluding this from the project is going to be a problem."

Councillor Krystal Cacka asked clarification as to why 14th Ave had been considered for the project in the first place. "By my understanding it was done, kind of arbitrarily, because the houses were flooding on that line and not because of how the piping system is designed."

"Because of the flooding, yes," answered Amundson. "It wasn't a function of the hydraulic calculations, it was a function of just so many people reporting flooding."

After the presentation and discussion, council put the decision to a vote. The official motion was that Council authorize the removal of 14 Avenue sanitary sewer line upgrade from the B1 Sanitary Rehabilitation Project scope of work. That motion was carried. Council directed that the Sewer Backflow Prevention/Sump Pump Installation Program be brought back for further review at a future meeting.

Council approved a 4% tax levy increase on November 13, 2024.

However, based on the current property assessments and increased amounts required by the other requisitions, administration has made adjustments to help reduce that amount and offset the overall impact to taxpayers.

Due to accounting changes, yearover-year comparisons are not directly aligned. However, when these accounting adjustments are excluded, the municipal portion of the tax levy reflects an actual increase of \$146,794, or approximately 1%, from 2024 to 2025.

For an average residential property assessed at \$350,000 (with no change in individual assessment), this equates to an estimated increase of \$7.87 per month.






