

It was 109 years of a family owned store and the past 3 1/2 years privately owned in the name of Switzer's Drugs. We would like to thank the community for their loyal support over the generations. As well, a huge thanks to all of our excellent employees who have served the pubic over the years. You all helped to contribute to the longevity of the store. Edson is our home, we were both born and raised here and will continue to make it our home in retirement. Thanks again to the Edson and district community."

"Harold and the Switzer family have been great support since I purchased Switzer's back in October 2020. I truly appreciate how they have made me feel like family, just like the drug store has for its patients for years," said Reich.

"Unfortunately, I had to make plans to transition onwards with my pending marriage and sold the store in February 2023. The new owners, I am sure, never planned to divest of the store. However, the search for my replacement has been fruitless," said Reich. "As time moved on, I believe they felt the lack of pharmacists would result in locum (travelling) pharmacists rotating through the store, decreasing patient care, and destroying the family feeling of the business."

"The difficult decision was finally made to join with Shopper's Drug Mart in Edson, where Callen and Sam are dedicated to this town," said Reich.

"Pharmacist Laurie Stuve and I will move over to Shopper's to assist in patient transition and care for at least one year," Reich concluded.

For customers that are concerned about their prescription files they will be automatically transferred to Shoppers Drug Mart, unless they desire elsewhere.

Town Council reviews final changes to Land Use Bylaw

Edson Town Council held a Committee of the Whole meeting on April 30, to discuss the final changes to the updated Land Use Bylaw (LUB). Final reading and discussion are planned for later in May.

Becky Soby, Planner with Urban Systems, the external contractor hired to help create the bylaws, outlined some fixes and updates. These revisions were defined as administrational changes, as they served to simplify language and repair small errors.

Laura Clark, Community Planner with Urban Systems, presented all the changes made directly due to stakeholder feedback. Council was given a chance to respond to each change after it was explained.

After feedback from the Yellowhead County, districts adjacent to the county boundary were changed from heavy industrial (BI-2) to a less heavy industrial (BI-1). This would reduce the amount of disturbances, such as sound and fumes, allowed on that site.

To address concerns that there was no provision for them, 'digital display' was added to the section on general sign provisions. These additions better stipulate what is or is not allowed on digital displays, plus how flashy and how bright they may be. Clayton Kittlitz, General Manager, Infrastructure & Operations, clarified that these stipulation are more to address concerns should they come in, than to police current signage.

Administration proposed changes to stipulations about Business Industrial Zone driveways. If road access is gravel, driveway will not require hard surfacing, by discretion of the developing authority.

Councillor Greg Pasychny said that he struggles with this wording a little, "I would like it to be clear." He explained that relying on human discretion can sometime lead to interpersonal and interpretation issues.

Mayor Kevin Zahara Agreed with councillor Pasychny. "We know we have a lot of dirt and dust, based off our industry. We can do what we can to minimize that. But to expect people to pay a lot of money to hard surface off of a gravel road, I don't think is wise. And I think that having some clarity within the definition of that will ensure consistency throughout the application for any future developments, be they tomorrow or 10 years from now." This was the prevailing opinion of council.

Administration has completed some additional research into residential setbacks and is proposing the side yard setback be reduced to 1.5m (5.0ft) in the R1 and R2 land use districts to address this concern. Also, the proposed LUB also includes the ability for the Development Authority (DA) to vary these setbacks up to 15% upon request and consideration.

Kittlitz added that the change was made, because it also is not uncommon to see within the community.

Paul Hanlan, General Manager of Corporate Services, voiced concerns with the 15% vary. Edson's fire response times mean that this creates fire code issues. A 1.5m setback is possible, but with restrictions, since it will need to be a firesafe wall with no windows, doors, or vents. Any less than that would be a safety problem, he commented.

Administration also heard concerns about the lots fronting 4th Avenue in the Glenwood subdivision. Feedback informed council that

there was a desire to accommodate both business and residential on the same parcel. According to the new LUB, existing residential land uses would be legal - nonconforming with no option to rebuild after a loss. After further analysis, Administration is recommending 2 options for consideration.

Option 1: change lots to R2 (General Residential) to be consistent with the remainder of Glenwood. All residential land uses would then be compliant, but the landowners would need to apply for a Home Business development permit to allow their non-residential operations to remain.

Option 2: Temporarily change lots to DC-O (Direct Control District-Open). This will remove any non-conformance issues, and give time for a full review of the area to occur. Administration will also have time to work with landowners to develop a distinct land use district that will address both the current state and future aspirations of this area taking into account the adjacent residential land uses.


Council discussed the options, coming to the conclusion that DC-O would be the better option. Both Mayor Zahara, and Councillor Pasychny voiced concerns that existing businesses may not fit the Home Business Definition.

Kittlitz explained that DC-O was probably the better option. However, the process of reviewing the area would not begin until after council has approved the new LUB. "It's very unique. In hindsight after hearing some feedback, it probably does need some more time and attention to figure out how to do it. Direct Control buys us a little more time."

Administration will take these discussions into account as they finalize the LUB. The document will be brought to council in May.

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

A Provincial Example, A Federal Necessity

The 2021 tragedy in Hinton, where we lost 16month-old Noah McConnell and



his mother, Mchale Busch, has left a deep scar on our community. This horrific event not only brought grief but also a pressing call for tangible measures to prevent such occurrences in the future.

It was in this context that I came across an OP-ED by the MLA for Camrose, Jackie Lovely, detailing Alberta's legislative response to cases like Noah and Mchale's.

In response to the loss suffered in Hinton and similar cases, Alberta's government has introduced significant legislative changes, aimed at tightening the reins on violent and sexual offenders. The new measures include a provincial ankle bracelet monitoring program, targeting repeat violent and sexual offenders, as well as individuals on bail who pose a clear risk to public safety. These steps are a decisive move towards enhancing the security and wellbeing of our communities.

While Alberta has taken commendable steps, it highlights a


highly-likely-to-repeat sex offenders. Noah's Law would extend reporting obligations to 30 years for highlylikely-to-repeat sex offenders and mandate completion of a rehabilitation program before any easing of reporting requirements can be considered. Additionally, it proposes stricter requirements for offenders to report any change of address and makes failing to report a criminal offense.

The actions taken by Alberta in response to these types of tragedies serves as both a blueprint and a call to action. It is imperative now more than ever for the federal Liberal government to follow suit. We have the responsibility and the means to ensure that the lessons learned from past tragedies translate into stronger protective measures nationwide. Let us honour the memories of those we've lost by ensuring a safer future for all Canadians.

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Locking down repeat offenders

(AB) Far too often, police services in Alberta issue bulletins about the release of offenders who are at a high risk to reoffend. Just as often, there are news stories about Albertans being victimized by offenders who should not have been released. Under the proposed Public Safety Statutes Amendment Act, 2024, individuals subject to a court-ordered electronic monitoring condition would be required to wear a Global Positioning System (GPS) tracking device on their ankle. This device would be monitored 24/7 by a centralized monitoring unit within Alberta Correctional Services. Ankle bracelet electronic monitoring would protect Albertans and communities by helping to secure offender-restricted areas, such as victims' residences, places of employment or any other area deemed off-limits as part of an individual's bail or communityrelease conditions. "The federal government's bail policies are failing to keep people safe. We are taking an important step toward combatting rising crime, creating safer streets and

neighbourhoods, and protecting our communities. Ankle bracelet electronic monitoring is another tool in the toolbox for courts to hold highrisk and repeat offenders accountable for their actions while out on bail," stated Mike Ellis, Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Services.

Currently, people in Alberta who are subject to provincial communitybased court conditions and bail

supervision are monitored by staff within Correctional Services, primarily within regular business hours. Once operational, the Alberta ankle bracelet program would provide more supervision of repeat offenders and those on bail who require aroundthe-clock monitoring as a condition of their community supervision. This program would also align Alberta with jurisdictions across Canada running similar programs.

Alberta's government allocated \$5.25 million in funding for electronic monitoring through last year's budget. Of that funding, \$2.8 million will cover implementation costs for this 2024-25 fiscal year, with the full funding of \$5.25 million to begin in the 2025-26 fiscal year.



History of Yellowhead County highlighted with Heritage Detour

Yellowhead County invited everyone out on May 3, to learn a bit of history at the Heritage Detour. The event, which took place at the Galloway Museum, started at 7pm and was free to attend with no pre-registration.

At the Heritage Detour, Madison Sharman, Heritage Coordinator for Yellowhead County, presented a 45 minute overview of the history of Yellowhead County. "It is everything you need to know about the Yellowhead region, from glaciers to highways. So we cover ancient travel, the receding of the glaciers, and how that developed this area. Then we jump ahead to the fur trade and David Thompson coming through the area. And then the first settlers, and the two railways, Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific, and then finally Highway 16 development," explained Sharman.

The Heritage Detour events have taken place at locations across Yellowhead County for the past nine months. Past locations include Hinton, Wildwood, and Brule. The goal in going to these different locations was to help as many people as possible learn about their community.

Unique to the Edson event was a presentation by Galloway Museum assistant manager, Cassie Kushniruk. She took a few moment to talk about Edson's history specifically. After both presentations, the floor was opened for questions from the audience. "There were really great discussions. People asked questions about things that they never really thought about prior to the presentation," said Sharman.

The Galloway event also featured beverages and small snacks such as cheese and crackers, and a

couple of prize giveaways. Attendees were also welcome to tour through the museum. Over 35 people came out to enjoy this overview of the region's history. "It was our largest turnout," added Sharman.

The Edson event was actually the last Heritage Detour planned for this year. However, if you want to learn more local history, Yellowhead County has three heritage bus tours planned for the summer months. The first of these will be on June 22. The bus is going to east end of the county. Other tours will be going to the south end near the Coal Branch and a west end tour exploring the area around Brule.
